Good morning! I hope this finds you all doing well and rested after the holiday weekend.

In October 2023, we wrote to you and submitted a petition in support of preserving the stadium court at Riverside Tennis. At that time, we had collected just over 325 signatures. I am reattaching that petition below again as we have added a few pages, the signatures now totaling 410.

We've heard that the stadium court will not be converted to pickleball but that others at Riverside, Park Center (Merry-Go-Round Griffith Park), and Echo Park Tennis are being considered for pickleball conversion. As many of our public tennis courts seem to be under threat of pickleball conversion, we started a new online petition in support of preserving and better maintaining all of our city's public tennis courts.

To Whom It May Concern at the Department of Recreation & Parks,

We have recently learned of the city's plans to convert tennis courts at Riverside Tennis Court to pickleball courts.

This letter is in support of preserving all of the tennis courts at Riverside Tennis Court. Court 12, especially, is historic and significant to the tennis community for being the only standalone court with stadium seating that can accommodate tournament and/or other exhibition play. Permanently removing the bleachers and converting Court 12 to pickleball courts would be a mistake, and an enormous loss for Los Angeles' many tennis players and enthusiasts.

We are not against pickleball but urge the city not to take over existing tennis courts. Though we acknowledge that pickleball is experiencing a boom in popularity, participation in the sport should not come at the expense of tennis, an already popular sport that draws interest at every skill level, age and background. Preserving Court 12 and others at Riverside ensures that Angelenos of all socioeconomic backgrounds continue to have access to play and compete in a sport that promotes physical and mental health, and that would otherwise be inaccessible without membership to expensive private clubs. During peak hours in the mornings, evenings and on weekends, publicly accessible and affordable tennis courts are already scarcely available. We urge you to find a separate solution for pickleball enthusiasts to avoid displacing tennis players citywide.

Please accept this letter and the attached signatures as formal petition against the City of Los Angeles allowing pickleball courts to permanently replace any existing tennis courts at Riverside Tennis Court/Griffith Park. The 325+ signatures here represent just some of the growing number of stakeholders who are against this conversion. We know that the petition will grow as we raise awareness.

Thank you for you and your office's prompt attention to this matter and petition. We kindly request a response.

### **Dear RAC Commissioners:**

Amendment 1 to Agreement Number 3947, first paragraph of Section 3 entitled "Premises", reads in part:

"The First Amendment also expands the facility's premises to include Easter Field, a field within Griffith Park generally utilized for over-flow LAEC parking and event staging purposes."

"The use of Easter Field shall be limited to use for overflow horse trailer parking during events or parking for basecamps for filming activity; any other use of Easter Field must be pre-approved by the RAP General Manager or his/her designee."

I am writing to request you modify Amendment 1 to Agreement Number 3947, first paragraph of Section 3 entitled "Premises".

The proposed language ignores the current Equine usages of Easter Field; and they should be included. These usages include but are not limited to:

- Exercising of horses, both in saddle and from the ground;
- Using the Field as a horse trail to other points within Griffith Park
- Coaching of riders, both during horse shows and at other times

Additionally, Easter Field should be restricted to horses with the exception of horse trailers or cinema related trucks and cars with issued daily permits only. Two or three wheeled vehicles should NOT be permitted, including scooters, bicycles, and tricycles, motorized or not, on Easter Field.

Many Glendale and Burbank Rancho residents, as well as LAEC boarders use Easter field daily - to work horses, lunging, riding, and hand walking. Multiple trainers use this area to give lessons, riding, roping, rails, and even low-level jumping. For those who have horses in the neighborhood, Easter Field is the pathway to the perimeter, the swinging bridge and Griffith Park.

This field has been used by the community and for the benefit of the community for decades, including Equine Community events for Easter, Halloween, etc. Transferring management under this would create a huge disruption in the use and access of this facility by the entire community. This would be done to allow for filming companies and events to come in and use the facility for parking and staging. I envision that what used to happen maybe once or twice a year to happen as frequently as they can get them to come in an film and therefore opening up the City to immense liability from suits to displaced people, people trying to use the facility which the staging and vehicles are there (creating a huge potential liability of mixing horses with cars, trucks, vans, staging equipment, etc. which dramatically increases the chance of accidents and injuries for all parties). My name is Catie Rossi and I am a Burbank Rancho resident, with my horse in my backyard. I am writing to address the proposed amendment to expand LAEC to include Easter Field. This proposition has significant potential to displace current land use, and must not be approved.

My personal experience as a user of this land includes a safe place to exercise horses not boarded at LAEC. Many backyard horse-keepers like myself have horses whose health and safety depends upon continued free and unrestricted access to this land, without any alternate non-explicit equestrian uses going on simultaneously. Many local horses who are too sensitive for the fast paced environment of LAEC are more at ease at Easter Field. We cannot lose this safe resource for our horses.

This proposition parallels displacement trends across Rancho community horse keeping where options for boarding and safe public equestrian resources are growing scarce. Examples include the many closures of public boarding stables, and the development of condos which will inhibit safe access to the Mariposa Bridge and Griffith Park trails/Martinez Arena. The loss of Easter Field's current land use could threaten a functional elimination of this historic and special residential horse keeping community that is bigger than just LAEC. Many community stakeholders who are not affiliated with LAEC but depend upon Easter field land use may even be unaware that their continued safe access to community equine exercise facilities is currently in jeopardy.

Despite ASM Global's stated commitment to honor the local horse keeping community, the management implementation has given me pause and concern that predates this amendment proposal. I formerly depended upon LAEC facility ride-ons to exercise my horse prior to the management transition, and after multiple unanswered inquiries, was informed by security that ASM Global does not currently allow ride-ons. I did not see mention of implementation of a monthly ride on program on ASM global's list of upcoming projects either. It would be seriously helpful and a show of support if ride-ons could be reinstated such that local backyard horse-keepers could register, presenting any and all all necessary veterinary information to be able to utilize the facilities again. To be clear, I am suggesting a return to former access to LAEC facilities as well as unchanged use of Easter Field. I am not suggesting adding ride-ons while changing Easter field land use.

This meeting is at 9am, which is during work hours for most, so I hope that you will give emailed comments the same weight as those expressed in person. # Response to Board Revenue and ASM Global's Operational Oversight

Dear Board of Commissioners,

Thank you for continuing Board Report 24-259, to allow for a full review of all revenue streams.

In my previous email, I had included response to the line items that ASM Global presented regarding their support for a board increase.

Additionally, I have addressed Joe Saliaces' comments focused on revenue, as outlined below along with additional revenue opportunities that ASM Global is failing to capitalize on.

While board revenue is certainly important, there needs to be a plan as the Commission said, and part of that plan, as far as boarding fees is concerned is some certainty of costs. We had certainty of costs when the board fees were linked to the CPI, and occurred at the same time each year. What we are boarders, and I am sure you do not want to do, is have this same discussion each year.

Below are the key concerns and observations:

# **Overall Concerns:**

### 1. Vacant Stalls:

- A number of rentable stalls remain empty and locked, representing an untapped revenue source.
- Several potential boarders have attempted to contact management over the last six months without receiving responses to calls or emails. This lack of communication is not only frustrating for customers but also reflects poorly on management's ability to engage with potential revenue streams.

### 2. Potential Boarders Leaving Due to Increased Fees:

- While Mr. Saliaces stated that a board increase would not cause people to leave, this claim is inaccurate. Many current boarders will be forced to leave if the board increase is implemented.
- While an increase in board fees can be understood, the added charge for feeding cubes is excessive. Per Mr.
  Saliaces' comments, which suggest the fee increase is aimed at those who do not use cubes, the real question
  was whether there will be a discount for those who purchase their own feed. Charging for cubes while offering no
  clear alternative for hay storage and feeding is a poorly thought-out plan. How will the hay be stored? Who will
  feed it? These questions have not been addressed.

### 3. Omission of Boarding-Related Revenue Streams:

- ASM Global's financial reporting omits significant boarding-related revenue streams, such as:
  - o Ride-on fees
  - Trailer space rental
  - Polo seasonal boarding
  - Trainer and TES fees per horse
- This omission distorts the financial picture, leading to an inaccurate representation of revenue and profit.

### 4. Event-Related Revenue Streams:

• ASM Global has failed to generate substantial revenue from events. A comprehensive audit would reveal the underperformance in this area.

- While they claim that they needed to address operational issues before bringing in events, this is not true. Under
  previous management, numerous events, including weddings, film shoots, and corporate functions, were held
  regularly with no major capital investment in event spaces.
- There hasn't been one wedding this year.
- Where are the holiday parties?
- Where are the production rentals?
- ASM Global's reliance on sponsorships for events, such as those held at the Greek Theatre, is misplaced. The
  venue's appeal to corporate sponsors is weak, and the lack of a clear strategy here has led to missed
  opportunities.
- Their request for management over Easter Field, a recreational space, just proves they are grasping for anything to add to their bottom line. They have yet to have an event that even warrants spill-over parking.

# 5. Spending on Maintenance and Remodeling:

- A full audit of maintenance spending is required to gain clarity on expenses versus profit.
- Initial investments, such as remodeling the ASM Global office and maintenance facilities, raise questions about prioritization.
- The investment for the Blenheim show, despite no signed contract for future events, is particularly concerning.
- The ABC barn remodel is significantly behind schedule, with only half of C barn completed. There are growing concerns that there will not be enough funds left to complete the B and A barns. Furthermore, the DEF barns remain neglected, and a site visit would confirm this oversight.
- The Saloon and Rein Café remodels, which commenced prior to securing a proper liquor license, are another issue. Without a functioning liquor license or a plan for operation, the Saloon remains unused, representing a wasted investment.
- Additionally, the Rein Café sits empty. Renting this space to a third-party restaurant may be a viable solution, given the lack of a clear programming schedule for these facilities.

#### 6. Staff Audit:

- Given the operational challenges, a staff audit is necessary to determine whether current staffing levels and roles are appropriate.
- For example:
  - Catering: With no active catering business and no liquor license for the Saloon, it's worth questioning whether the number of staff in this area should be reduced.
  - **Events:** If events are not a current focus, the necessity of a full-time event coordinator should be reevaluated.
  - Security: The current security contractor, Allied Security, may not be the best use of funds, as their high
    turnover rate is concerning. Aside from one longstanding employee, Jesse, who engages with boarders, the
    guards appear to lack knowledge about horses and cannot identify distress in animals. They do not patrol
    the aisles effectively and merely make rounds in a golf cart, scanning QR codes. This raises concerns about
    the safety of boarders' horses. Additionally, there should be someone responsible for ensuring that stall
    gates are locked.

In conclusion, while ASM Global is focused on increasing board fees, they are overlooking critical areas for revenue growth and operational efficiency. The absence of events, the lack of engagement with prospective clients, and unaddressed operational inefficiencies are areas that demand immediate attention. I strongly urge the Board to consider these concerns in the upcoming discussions regarding the board increase and ASM Global's overall management strategy.

Thank you for your time and attention to these matters. I look forward to the opportunity for a more thorough review.

### **Dear Board of Commissioners.**

I am writing on behalf of the LAEC boarders to formally request that the board **rejects** the proposed amendment to the ASM Global contract for a 15-month extension and **rejects** the expansion of their services to include Easter Field.

# Opposition to the Proposed Assignment of Easter Field to LAEC for Parking Lot Use:

- For the proposed assignment of Easter Field to the Los Angeles Equestrian Center (LAEC) for use as a parking lot, as outlined in the proposal under item 24-259. I urge you to **vote "No"** or **continue the discussion to a future date** for further review and community input.
- The proposal includes converting Easter Field for overflow trailers during LAEC horse shows, as well as using it
  for movie/TV base camps without requiring permits from Recreation & Park. Additionally, the proposal could
  expand the parking lot's use to include non-equestrian events. This plan would have serious implications for
  local equestrians, pedestrians, and the broader community who rely on Easter Field as a vital public recreation
  space.
- Easter Field is heavily used every day by local equestrians, pedestrians, and various community groups, including minority populations, who meet and engage in recreational activities there. The loss of this space to a parking lot would displace these established user groups and reduce access to this important neighborhood amenity.
- The proposal does not appear to have included adequate community consultation or stakeholder input, which is critical for decisions that impact local residents and public spaces.
- If additional parking is needed for LAEC events, appropriate permits should be obtained for temporary use of Easter Field, rather than permanently expanding the facility's operations into an area that falls outside its original scope of management.

# **Opposition To The Proposed Contract Extension:**

ASM Global is seeking a 15-month extension to their contract. This request is unwarranted for the following reasons:

- Contractual Obligation: The original contract was for two years, and ASM Global was aware of the timeline when they agreed to manage the facility. With a 15-month delay to their start date, did that reduce the two year timeframe or their contract? it is important to understand how this impacted ASM's ability to meet the agreed-upon objectives within the given timeframe. e.
- Issues with Facility Management and Communication:
  - Horse Rental Operations: The proposal to reintroduce horse rentals was raised in the first boarder meeting and should have been a priority for generating income. It is unclear when this will happen, or where the horses will be housed. This issue should have been addressed earlier and should not be delayed further.
  - Continuity of Service to Boarders: The implementation of QR codes for maintenance requests and the Barn Manager for invoicing are welcome additions. However, boarders still feel that communication with management is insufficient. The majority of interaction happens via the weekly newsletter, with little face-

- to-face communication or proactive outreach from management. Boarders feel less prioritized than other groups, such as the horse show participants or training barns. Effective management of a facility like LAEC requires in-person communication and relationship-building on the ground.
- **Communication and Engagement:** There should be a designated point of contact between boarders and management. If no staff member is available for this role, an approved boarder could be enlisted as a liaison to facilitate communication and address concerns, questions, and complaints. This would provide a direct, ongoing channel of communication between boarders and the management team.
- **3. Facility and Event Management:** Are ASM Global's performance in improving and managing the LAEC facilities meeting expectations?
  - Capital Improvements: Significant investments have been made in the Equidome, the saloon, show barns, and trainer arenas. However, little has been done in DEF barns.
  - Rein Cafe: If ASM Global cannot make the Rein Cafe a successful venue, and the lack of a liquor license is an
    issue, it may be best to list the space on a commercial leasing platform like Loopnet and find a suitable
    restaurant or operator.
  - Event Spaces: Spaces like the Derby Room and Little White House are underutilized, with the Derby Room currently serving as a storage space for chairs. The idea that "if you build it, they will come" no longer applies. The spaces are built, but there is a lack of events. For instance, under the previous management of Calamigos, weddings were booked nearly every weekend, often with multiple events. There has been no evidence of similar success with ASM Global. Why is there no winter wedding booked this year? Where are the corporate meetings? The holiday parties? The filming events?
  - **Underutilization of Banquet and Event Spaces:** The event spaces at the LAEC have not been booked, despite significant investment in their refurbishment. It is troubling that even after substantial upgrades, these spaces remain underused. The absence of revenue-generating events points to a failure in the strategic marketing or lack of promotion.
  - ABC Barns: The renovation of the ABC Barns was a larger undertaking than anticipated, and it resulted in the
    displacement of horses and trainers for months. To date only half of C barn has been completed with no
    indication of when A and B can begin.

reported difficulty in reaching someone at LAEC to inquire about availability. This is a major missed opportunity for revenue and speaks to the customer service provided by ASM Global.

I am writing on behalf of the LAEC boarders to formally request a comprehensive audit and review of ASM Global's operating budget, as well as the corresponding documentation, in response to their proposed board increase.

In light of the lack of accurate and transparent information provided to date, we respectfully request that the commissioners delay any decision on this proposal until all relevant information is confirmed and made available.

We reject the proposed board increase and the 15-month contract extension for the following reasons:

### **Overall Concerns:**

- 1. **Unreliable Comparables**: Many of the "comparable" barns cited by ASM Global cannot be reasonably considered as true market comparables.
- 2. **Market Positioning**: LAEC is not currently below the market rate in this region, and thus an increase in board fees is unwarranted based on regional trends.
- 3. **Fee Increases vs. Service Reductions**: The proposed board fee increase comes at a time when certain services are being reduced, further exacerbating the value proposition for boarders.
- 4. **Unresolved Feed & Feeding Component**: The feed and feeding component has not been agreed upon, nor has it been thoroughly thought through. This, in combination with the proposed increase, pushes the overall rate increase close to 30%, which we find unreasonable.
- 5. **Omission of Boarding-Related Revenue Streams**: ASM Global's profit accounting report omits several boarding-related revenue streams (ride ons, trailer space rental, polo seasonal boarding, Trainer & TES fees per horse), which significantly affects the accuracy of the financial picture presented.
- 6. **Event-Related Revenue Streams**: Revenue from event-related activities has not come to fruition as anticipated, which calls into question the financial health of the operation.
- 7. **Deferred Maintenance**: Insufficient progress has been made to address the years of deferred maintenance. Another board fee increase cannot be justified until a clearer plan for addressing these issues is presented.
- 8. **Priority Spending on Maintenance**: There needs to be a priority review of maintenance investments, particularly for show barns and ABC barns, before any increase in fees can be considered. A thorough budget review is needed to ensure that these investments made were indeed needed and within budget.
- 9. **Saloon & Rein Café Remodel**: The remodel of the Saloon & Rein Café, which has been undertaken prior to the proper liquor license being in place, undermines the viability of the project and further calls into question the facility's overall planning and financial management.

### **Areas in Need of Review**

- 1. Budget Review: We request a thorough review of the operating budget and supporting documentation, particularly the \$2,915,981 in reported expenses. How are these expenses being managed? Who is overseeing the budget, and how are expenses being monitored and validated? An audit of these expenses is necessary.
- 2. **ABC Barn Expenses**: What has been spent thus far on C barn? C barn remains incomplete. Are there remaining funds allocated for the completion of B and A barns?
- 3. **Saloon & Rein Café**: A significant investment was made to remodel the Saloon and Rein Café, yet there is no liquor license, no operational plan, and no programming schedule. This has resulted in a wasted investment, and Rein Cafe should be listed for lease as a restaurant if ASM Global cannot operate it as originally planned.
- 4. Staffing Needs: An audit of staffing levels is required. Some positions may be better suited for contracted staff rather than salaried employees. Specifically, there is concern about the staffing levels for catering and event management given the lack of events, as well as the high turnover rate with security staff. We also question the efficacy of the current security provider, Allied Security, considering the high turnover rate and the lack of horse-related expertise among guards.
- 5. **Expense Management**: The fiscal deficit at LAEC is not caused by boarding fees; it is due to poor budget management and investments that have yielded little to no return. For example, the investment in Blenheim was a significant expense has ASM Global converted it into profitable events? Similarly, the Saloon was designed as an event space and neighborhood bar, but cannot operate as such due to the lack of a liquor license.

# Fiscal Impact & Projected Revenue

- 1. Revenue Projections: ASM Global's report projects a revenue increase of \$1,000,000 per year if all vacant stalls are occupied at the proposed rates. This projection places undue pressure on boarders, assuming that the primary source of income will come from boarding. However, ASM Global has been unsuccessful in generating income from other potential revenue streams like corporate events, filming, and weddings. This is a critical failure in their management of the facility as a whole.
- 2. **Manure Disposal**: ASM Global continues to pay a company to remove manure, whereas previous management generated income by having it picked up by a fertilizer company. Why is this change occurring, and is it financially prudent? Additionally, there are companies that would take the manure as is without curing for free, which raises questions about the cost-effectiveness of ASM Global's current approach.
- 3. **Revenue Streams Omitted**: Several existing revenue streams, such as trainers' fees, trailer space rentals, and ride-on fees, were omitted from ASM Global's profit accounting report. These should be factored into any financial analysis of the facility's profitability.
- 4. **Facility Issues**: Many stalls at LAEC remain empty, and at least three potential boarders have not received responses to their inquiries in the past six months. This indicates a failure in communication and customer service, further exacerbating the financial strain on the facility.

### **Board Increase**

- 1. Justification for Increase: We have seen several board fee increases over the years, yet we continue to see little improvement in the barns, particularly in the DEF barns. A reasonable rate increase may be acceptable, but the proposed increases lack solid justification and supporting documentation. The claim that boarders have agreed to the removal of cubes per feedback in board meetings is unfounded—no such agreement has been made.
- 2. **Unreasonable Fee Structure**: The proposed rate increases are problematic, particularly for DEF barns, where the cost for a double stall is proposed to rise to \$1,095/month when factoring in the additional fee for cubes. This will price many boarders out of the facility, which raises the question of whether this is the intended outcome. Additionally, comparing LAEC's fees to private, or membership-based facilities like Flintridge or The Paddock is inappropriate, as their amenities and operating models differ significantly.

### **Amenities**

- Access to Amenities: Many amenities, such as locked round pens and private sun pens, are not available to all boarders. Additionally, trainers often have priority in the arenas, which limits access for others. The Equidome is underutilized and controlled by trainers without proper oversight, scheduling, or rule enforcement from management.
- 2. Event Spaces: ASM Global has stated that event spaces are in disrepair, but under the previous management (Calamigos), these spaces were rented out consistently for weddings, corporate meetings, and other events. There is no reason why this should not continue, especially given the facility's prime location and existing infrastructure. The lack of winter bookings and the underutilization of the banquet rooms (e.g., Chivari chair storage in the Derby Room first banquet room) highlights a failure in event space management.

# **Next Steps**

In light of these concerns, we respectfully ask the commissioners to delay any decisions regarding the proposed board increase and ASM Global's 15-month contract extension until a full and independent audit has been conducted. It is essential that all financial, staffing, and facility issues be thoroughly reviewed to ensure that boarders are not unfairly burdened with the financial shortcomings of ASM Global's management.

Furthermore, we strongly recommend issuing an RFP for event management, as ASM Global has not shown ability to effectively run the non-horse events side of LAEC. Previous management, under Calamigos, was able to turn a profit in this area and effectively manage events, while ASM Global has failed to do so.

Dear Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners:

I am writing to recommend that the RAP Board of Commissioners DISAPPROVE the proposed Easter Field Expansion. That proposed annexation of additional public park land to LAEC-ASM is not transparent, it is unacceptably vaguely illustrated, and was recommended without any community engagement with Burbank and Glendale Rancho equestrian residents who have used that public park land for years.

My neighbors and I have never been engaged by ASM in a community process after they assumed operational management on February 1, 2024 even though it is a requirement of the current contract; and was supposed to have begun within 30 days of commencement of operations (see Condition #39). This is deeply disappointing. The proposed recommendation to annex Easter Field is unsupportable on its face.

As documented in this letter, the City of Los Angeles is incorrectly relying on a California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") Categorial Exemption pursuant to Article 19, Section 15301 of the CEQA Guidelines and Article III, and Section 1, Class 1 of the City CEQA Guidelines, for its environmental clearance of proposed Amendment No. 1 to Agreement 3947 ("Amendment" or "Project") with ASM Global Area Management, LLC ("ASM") for the operation and management of the Los Angeles Equestrian Center ("LAEC" or "Equestrian Center").1

Amendment No. 1 expands the facilities included under the Agreement to add an area of land known as Easter Field, which has not previously been part of the Equestrian Center lease. Easter Field is a field within Griffith Park used by the community for the exercising of horses as well as other recreational activities. Amendment No. 1 not only provides for the leasing the

Easter Field land to ASM, but allows for ASM to use the land for "overflow horse trailer parking during events or parking for basecamps for filming activity; any other use of Easter field must be pre-approved by the RAP General Manager or his/her designee."<sup>2</sup>

As shown in Attachment A, the Easter Field Property is zoned OS-1XL-H-RIO and is within the River Implementation Overlay District. Easter Field is:<sup>3</sup>

- A public park regularly used for equestrian activities by members of the public.
- Easter Field is adjacent to Bette Davis Park.
- Easter Field is part of Griffith Park, which is Los Angeles City Historical-Cultural Monument #942.
- According to the City, the Easter Field parcel is subject to Historic Preservation Review, yet the Board Report does not indicate that this required review has occurred for the proposed Project.
- Easter Field is in an Urban Agriculture Incentive Zone;
- Easter Field is in a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone;
- The parcel, that Easter Field is a part of, contains a watercourse as shown in Figure 1 which runs along the southern edge of Easter Field;

• Easter Field is in a Methane Zone.

- The parcel, that Easter Field is a part of, is in the Santa Monica Mountains Zone;
- The parcel, that Easter Field is a part, of has been identified as having Biological Resource Potential by the City. See Attachment B for a sampling of biological resources easily observed in the area.
- The parcel, that Easter Field, is a part of has been identified as having Mountain Lion Potential by the City.

These are unusual circumstances which result in the Project's potential to result in significant environmental impacts, yet the City is improperly processing the Project using a Categorical Exemption. For example, the nature of the proposed uses could result in impacts to biological resources in the Easter Field area. Introduction of a large number of vehicles onto a field in a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone could result in an increase in fire risk in the area. Introduction of these uses into a park regularly used for equestrian activities could result in safety impacts due to car/truck/horse conflicts. Introduction of a large number of trucks in proximity to the watercourse and LA River could result in increased polluted runoff to the watercourse. Use of Easter Field for these purposes would result in a reduction in recreational and open space land in the area, and a significant reduction in land available to the general public for equestrian use. The City has failed to conduct appropriate environmental review and has failed to provide the community and appropriate review agencies with notice of the proposed Project.

# THE PROJECT IS NOT ELIGIBLE FOR A CATEGORIAL EXEMPTION UNDER CEOA

The City is relying on a Class 1 CEQA Exemption. As noted in Section 15301 of the CEQA Guidelines, actions eligible for this exemption include:

# **15301. EXISTING FACILITIES**

Class 1 consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, **involving** negligible or no expansion of existing or former use. . . The key consideration is whether the project involves negligible or no expansion of use.

# The Amendment Would Result In a Significant Change In the Use of Easter Field

Easter Field is part of Griffith Park<sup>4</sup>, and is used by the community for passive recreation and for the exercising of neighborhood horses as well as for an annual Easter neighborhood horse gathering. Regular use of Easter Field for overflow horse trailer parking during events or

for parking for basecamps for filming activity would constitute a significant change in use and would displace existing recreational use of this area of Griffith Park.

There has been no showing by the City that use of Easter Field for overflow horse trailer parking during Equestrian Center events or for parking for basecamps for filming activity constitutes an existing or former use of the property and no documentation has been provided regarding the frequency of these specific uses of the property either currently or in the past on the Easter Field site. No limitations have been placed on the nature of the additional uses of Easter Field which could be approved by RAP under the agreement, so as to limit any additional uses to only uses which have occurred in the past. Since the proposed Project would result in a significant change in use, the proposed Project is therefore not eligible for a Class 1 CEQA Exemption.

# The City Has Failed To Show That the Leasing of Easter Field Would Result in Negligible or No Expansion of Use

The Amendment fails to provide any limitation on the number of times per year that Easter Field can be used for overflow horse trailer parking during events or for parking for basecamps for filming activity. In addition, the Amendment provides for no limitations on the nature or number of the additional uses of the Easter Field by ASM, other than to require preapproval for other uses by the RAP General Manager or his/her designee. The Amendment therefore does not qualify for a Class 1 CEQA Exemption since it provides for more than a negligible expansion of use, as well as for a change in use.

# <u>Unusual Circumstances Preclude the Use of A Categorical Exemption for the Project</u>

CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2 provides for exceptions to the use of Categorial Exemptions. Guidelines Section 15300.2(c) specifies:

(c) Significant Effect. A categorical exemption shall not be used for an activity where there is a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment **due to unusual circumstances**.

As previously noted, there are a number of unusual circumstances that apply to the Easter Field site, and which combined with the effects of the propose Project, have the potential to result in significant effects on the environment. The courts have found that effects on aesthetics, cultural resources, water supply, health, and safety are among the effects that fall within the concept of 'unusual circumstances'. The proposed Project is not eligible for a Categorical Exception due to unusual circumstance which result in the Project's potential to result in significant impacts.

# **Cumulative Impacts Preclude Use of a Categorical Exemption**

Guidelines Section 15300.2(b) specifies:

(b) Cumulative Impact. All exemptions for these classes are inapplicable when the cumulative impact of successive projects of the same type in the same place, over time is significant.

The change in use of Easter Fields combined with other projects in the area such as 901 S Mariposa will result in a cumulative loss of facilities for equestrian use in the Project area and reduction in days Easter Field is available for equestrian use by the public. The City must analyze this potentially significant cumulative recreational impact. Use of a Categorial Exemption is not appropriate given the potential for significant cumulative equestrian recreational impacts.

We urge the Board to reject approval of Amendment 1 as currently written and to required that Easter Field be removed from the agreement. Thank you for your consideration.



# Bette Davis Picnic Park and Glendale Narrows Riverwalk | Trip Report 13 Jan 2024

"Fasten your seatbelts; it's going to be a bumpy night."

Bette Davis in All About Eve



Nestled between the low mountains of Griffith Park, the eastern San Fernando Valley city-suburbs of Grandview and Glendale, the Los Angeles River, Riverside Drive, Victory Blvd, and – last but not least – the #134 and I-5 freeways, what could be a more quintessentially Los Angeles birding spot than Bette Davis Picnic Area, named for the major film star of not so long ago. The park was a gift to the public, carved out of her property of roughly one square mile. Jutting eastward from the southeast corner of the park is the Glendale Narrows Riverwalk. The narrows refers to the purportedly narrowish bend in the Los Angeles River where the bottom is unpaved, making it

popular with diving ducks and wading birds, especially Black-necked Stilts. You can vaguely see it in the Google satellite view above. The paved sidewalk runs alongside the river for about 1.5 miles before the path turns east alongside the Verdugo Wash. A small group of intrepid birders – some of us old enough to know full well the truth of the above statement – gathered at the crack-of-dawn 8am starting time. We were almost immediately knocked out of our socks by really loud squawks. We quickly determined that it was a pair of parrots – Lilaccrowned Parrots *Amazona finschi* – investigating a potential next hole, located at the end of a snaggy trunk in a large sycamore tree. It featured two entrances, one below and to the side of the other. The parrots might have thought this a defect, as eggs have a way of rolling. We noted the way that all Amazona parrots fly – fast wingbeats in a narrow vertical range of motion – and that (generally speaking) parakeets have long pointed tails, parrots have flat blunt tails. This species turned out to be a life bird (countable (https://www.californiabirds.org/checklist.asp) by rule-conscious listers) for some of us. Awk! Beautiful plumage, eh, eh?






We birded our way through the trees, finding a lot of Yellow-rumped Warblers, then went to the river through one of the many gaps in the fence. Here we found a nice assortment of ducks and two geese, along with a lot of Black-necked Stilts, herons and egrets and a few passerines in the trash-laden river islets.

We passed a *lot* of Black-necked Stilts. The list below records only 100, but off in the distance at both ends of the walk we could see many, many more.

Along the chain-link fence line, we ran across several of a lesser-seen sparrow species, feeding on grass seeds. In alternate plumage their caps are rustier and their supercilium whiter.

On our way back to the cars, we spotted this raptor, well hidden in a tree in a home's front yard across the street. Chris snapped this photo while it was in the process of dropping onto a hapless mammal on the lawn.

We hopped in our cars and drove the immense distance of nearly 1/4 mile over to the southeast corner of the park, across Victory and to the south end of Garden St. This is the major access point to the Riverwalk. As small as the portion of the picnic park located here is, it had even more birds than the larger section we'd just left. House Sparrows are typically the opposite of a big deal to birders, and I doubt that 1% of field trips reports *anywhere*, *ever*, bother including a photo of one, but this bird was doing something interesting.

We had four species of woodpecker in this section: Acorn, Nuttall's, Northern Flicker and Downy, the smallest of our American woodpeckers. At 6 1/2", it's not much larger than the diminutive Chipping Sparrow we'd just seen.

The best way to separate them from the very similar Hairy Woodpecker is the tiny bill, noticeably shorter than the front-to-back width of the head. The Hairy's bill is about the same length as its head, front-to-back.

As you can see from the photo above, Downy Woodpeckers are lighter-than-air, like tiny feathered dirigibles, and could walk upside down on your ceiling if they had a mind to. Well...maybe not. Maybe it's those clawed toes.

Just before we got onto the Riverwalk proper, we found some sparrows on the shady ground, pecking away. Among them were several Lark Sparrows, one of our fancier LBJ's (Little Brown Jobs).

In response to a query – "Is it a lark or a sparrow?" – we briefly discussed the presence of the word "lark" in a bird's name. It means it has white outer tail feathers, as do the mostly Old World family of Larks (*Alaudidae*). Hence Lark Sparrows, Lark Buntings and Meadowlarks are not Larks, but are respectively members of families *Passerellidae*, *Passerellidae* (New World Sparrows) and *Icteridae* (Blackbirds).

We had the occasional raptor overhead and sitting on the very high electric wire pylons, usually at enormous distance from us. I'd hate to see this Osprey take a dive at a fish in this part of the river. It's pretty shallow.

We crossed underneath the I-5 or Golden State Freeway. The sound of the cars overhead – and I have omitted until now the fact that it's actually quite noisy throughout the park due to the adjacent freeways – was like walking through the now-closed tunnels under Niagara Falls (really loud and echoing). In both directions we spotted another Cooper's Hawk, the first time on one of the overpasses' supporting cables.

For a special and final treat we hopped into our cars and drove several miles uphill into Griffith Park to where several rare birds had been spending the winter. Off of Griffith Park Drive, near the golf courses, we parked and walked all of 100 yds. up a curvy dirt trail and spotted the bird below, in a bare tree, catching passing flies in an interesting circular manner.

The only place in the U.S. where one might expect to find this species is in southeast Arizona, so it's well out of its usual range.

We also looked for the Hepatic Tanager which was frequently seen in the same area, but it was elsewhere.

As you'll see from the list below, we saw 58 species at the picnic park and Riverwalk, a quite respectable number for a small area surrounded by city and road.

My concerns are safety in wanting to use Easter Field for parking.

First and foremost are the dangers humans and animals can have from debris falling from trucks. NAILS! Pieces of metal detaching from vehicles.

Many people use this as an arena for their horses. Not everyone has the luxury of a proper arena at their disposal. People walk their dogs.

I will share some talking points that I have copied from other people more equipped than I on this matter.

I work in the Television Business. I know what Basecamp looks like. I live just down the alley from Bette Davis Park and Easter Field. I use it daily.

Please vote No or continue to a future date the question of the proposed assignment of public recreation area Easter Field to the LAEC for use as a parking lot.

If it cannot be separated from the other aspects of 24-259 in your Dec 5th meeting, please vote No.

Specified are are overflow trailers from LAEC horse shows, and the NEW usage by movie/tv basecamps without needing Rec & Park permits. Additional permits could include other parking lot uses such as for non-equestrian events.

Easter Field is used every day by local equestrians and pedestrians, including local groups for whom it is a meeting place. These existing user groups, which include minorities, could be displaced.

I live just yards away from Easter Field, and I ride in or through it almost every day, and I have worked on many movie sets. Below is a list of standard movie equipment and activities. I don't believe this is compatible with the existing user groups of Easter Field.

Community and stakeholder input has not been sought and needs to be considered. Please vote No or continue this for a full evaluation.

MOVIE/TV BASECAMP - a standard equipment list and procedures including working trucks.

Grip 40' truck
Electric 40' truck
Props 40' truck
Special Effects 40' truck

Wardrobe - 30-40' trailer and stabbed Hair & Makeup Trailer, 25' and stakebed Camera truck, 10 ton (maybe moved closer to shooting set) Sound trailer, 28' and stakebed (maybe moved closer to shooting set)

Cast trailers, 28-40' with bathrooms

Catering truck, 30' and support truck/trailer Catering tent/s for approx 50 people

40' trash bins, roll-off

Basecamp Generator with cable package

At night, raised 'freeway lights' to light up basecamp for safety and ease of use

Honeywagon - approx 70' truck & trailer with the long row of bathrooms for cast and crew to use. Every 2-3 days a 'pumper' the size of a water truck comes in to pump out the raw human sewage waste - the smell is vomit-inducing. This is disruptive to anyone downwind. They pump it from the honeywagon and all cast/producer/director trailers with bathrooms.

Stakebed-sized fuel truck to fill up all the trucks and cars at basecamp or at the set nearby.

Stakebed trucks for each cast trailer and more, that are usually unhooked to move equipment around locally.

Possible water trucks, as needed for fire protection, special effects, street wet-down (for the shiny look), and other uses as needed.

The transportation/production dept will have an additional trailer for their management purposes.

Car parking for 'above the line' people - key actors, producers, directors etc, plus additional cars per transportation.

Security and a medic will have one or more cars.

Additional tasks that may be done at basecamp: fixing vehicles, rigging camera cars/trailers to have cameras mounts strapped to them for shooting purposes.

There may be building/repairing wooden items such as steps into trailers. Nails, screws and bolts are used for this, and maybe left behind in the dirt.

After the production company has left, a nail left hidden in the dirt could be stepped on by a horse, piercing its hoof. As happened by Martinez Arena not long ago, despite immediate and expensive medical care, that single nail resulted in the horse's death.

#### Noise:

1000-1500 amp generator running all the hours that the basecamp is operational.

Equipment leaving at wrap is especially noisy, as there is a lot of metal on metal clanging, likely yelling over the sound of engines for safety purposes and truck hookup. Transportation's job is to move them out quickly to get to the next parking location and get their drivers 'off the clock', and they will be under pressure to do this in a hurry.

Notes:

Asphalt is much preferred over dirt for basecamps. If an area is to be used regularly, production companies will likely make this request.

Hours: A shooting day for a production company is often over 12 hours, plus the additional set up and wrap before and after the shoot day period.

So an operational period of 14-16 hours to include early arrives for makeup/hair/wardrobe would be normal.

There may be traffic control needed at the entrance and exit to ensure safe driving by all. Production-related vehicles are always in a hurry, and maybe a poor fit for a quiet residential equestrian-focused neighborhood.

## From the FilmLA website:

Standard Hours: In residential areas, standard filming hours during Monday to Friday are from 7:00 AM – 10:00 PM. On weekends (Saturday and Sunday), 9:00 AM - 10:00 PM.

Does an adjacent City of Glendale residential area have these protections, if the adjacent basecamp (where no filming is taking place) is in Griffith Park, a non-residential part of Los Angeles?

Additional Production Vehicle Parking: Filmmakers may reserve posted, "no parking" areas for use by commercial production vehicles. Production vehicles may only be parked along the curb on one side of the street, however public parking on both sides of the street may be restricted for safety and clearance.

This could negatively affect Rancho Avenue residents/Bette Davis Park visitors if utilized.

- When ASM books events, they normally use most of the horse areas onsite already. Not only do they use all the grass areas, but for the Drone event, they also used three large arenas for parking & staging.
- Riders are forced to go off property, to Easter Field, to use the dirt and grass area located there.
- If you allow ASM control of the only safe open area for equestrians; where are we to go?

#### RE: BOARDER REBUTTAL TO ASM / RAP BOARD INCREASE REQUEST NO 24-254

LAEC boarders are requesting an audit and review of ASM Global's operating budget, and review of corresponding back up by someone with equestrian knowledge, in response to their proposed board increase.

Without accurate information we ask the commissioners to continue this until accurate information is confirmed.

We reject the proposed board increases & 15 month contract extension request, due to the following reasons:

- Many of their barn comparables cannot be considered comparables
- LAEC is not below the market rate in the region

- Board is being raised & services are reduced
- The feed & feeding component has not been agreed to, and brings the rate increase to close to 30%
- Multiple boarding related revenue streams have been omitted in the profit accounting report
- Event and horse show related revenue streams have not come to fruition
- Not enough progress has been made to rectify the years of maintenance deferment to warrant another board increase
- Priority spending so far has been on projects not related to boarding.
- Saloon was remodeled with no liquor license, therefore not able to operate as planned

With the proposed increase, horse keeping and riding at LAEC will become unsustainable. Boarders do not agree with the proposed increase. It is not fair, reasonable, or equitable and does not have verifiable supporting documentation.

The requested board increase is too high. It is especially high considering that ASM proposes to remove feed and feeding from the boarding contract. (Feed/feeding: providing the food horses eat and the service of feeding what they eat.) This is contrary to the contract recently signed by boarders upon ASM's assumption of control of LAEC. Standard board includes an enclosure, bedding, food/feeding, fresh water, and stall cleaning (mucking) labor. These are the basics.

While it appears that they are raising rates 5-7.5%, this is without food/feeding. With food/feeding added back in, using their own numbers, the rate increase comes to between <u>20-29%</u>. That is unaffordable and unacceptable. The board is being raised AND services are being reduced.

LAEC's rates are **NOT** below the market rate in the region. The comps provided by ASM are inaccurate and the facilities are not comparable. ASM only included comps supporting their request to raise rates and did not consider comps supporting LOWERING the rate. Comps did not account for extra services given by other facilities, nor the usable amenities offered.

Increasing the board as proposed is discriminatory and will price out independent and lower income boarders.

Boarders are not responsible for offsetting the costs of 10 plus years of deferred maintenance and neglect. It was represented in meetings that there was a budget to cover the projects needed to return the Center to its former glory.

Without accurate information this increase is arbitrary. The numbers remain assertions and not facts. This should not be "fun with numbers," as was stated by ASM in one of the meetings.

Many questions remain unanswered. Some of the information presented is inaccurate. Revenue streams have been omitted in the accounting. The comps presented are not comparable.

We implore the Board of Commissioners to reject this proposal.

Flintridge riding club is a club. There are dues and it is privately run. In addition included in their board cost is blanketing, feeding hay 3 times a day, grooming and daily turnouts. Available to all boarders.

The Paddock as well is privately owned. Its stalls are \$895. That includes cubes 2 times a day. Stalls cleaned two times a day.

The closest comp to us would be San Pasquale in Pasadena. The board there is \$785, with cubes fed twice a day. The fact that ASM has taken on a facility that the previous stewards ran into the ground is not the boarders responsibility. We as boarders have supported the city with every effort as ASM was trying to get in to LAEC. We as boarders were so excited that finally after years of paying for services and experiencing money grab after money grab from the previous management company we would finally see this incredible facility brought back to life. We were told time and time again that they had a budget to fix the decay and that they would not need to raise board. Enough is enough. The dangerous idea of eliminating feed and the outrageous idea that we as boarders are responsible for bringing the facility to code is not acceptable. Please vote no. Having horses in Burbanks equestrian community is a privilege but paying for the mishandling of your facility is not something we should have to take on.

I, as a 15 year boarder at LAEC, am joining the request to an audit and review of ASM Global's operating budget, and review of corresponding back up by someone with equestrian knowledge, in response to their proposed board increase. Without accurate information we ask the commissioners to continue this review until accurate information is confirmed.

The comps provided by ASM are inaccurate and the facilities are not comparable. Curiously, ASM did not include Stoney Point Ranch in their comps list. Which is also a City owned equestrian center. ASM only included comps supporting their request to raise rates and did not consider comps supporting LOWERING the rate. Comps did not account for extra services given by other facilities, nor the usable amenities offered. The comps provided by ASM all include feed of some sort which is standard for boarding facilities. Whether it's in various types of hay or in cubes as is currently being fed at LAEC. So their proposal and their comps do not match whatsoever. Plus, how can they raise the rates while taking away the essential and standard service of feed?

In response to an extension of their initial contract, that also should be declined. It makes no difference if they were able to take over the operation of the property immediately or 15 months later while the lawsuit played out. They are 10 months in on their initial 2 year contract and have done very little in repairs or improvements that impact the general equestrian community at LAEC.

Examples of prioritizing non equestrian projects that occurred immediately upon their start included gutting and rebuilding The Little White House, gutting and redecorating the main offices, gutting and rebuilding the Rein Cafe, gutting and redecorating The Saloon, repainting the red or yellow curbs and re striping the office parking lots (but not the barn parking lots). Meanwhile, the wooden rail fence along the entry driveway as well as around the arena's are visibly and dangerously rotten in many places. When boards do finally get replaced, many are simply left unpainted. The driveway, parking lots and arena's have quite a few burnt out lights. When asked if these can be fixed, we're told they have no money and they need to submit a replacement proposal to the City. We're asking for a burnt out light bulb to be replaced, not the entire lighting system to be completely replaced. Replace or upgrade the burnt out light now and submit a system wide proposal for future replacement.

They started the repair of the lighting in Barn C in August. At the time we were told it would be a 4 to 6 week project. All we wanted is the lights replaced with ones that don't short out and catch on fire when it rains. The project is now in its 5th month with a projection of completion of February. We were told that the City will be bringing in a licensed contractor to repair and upgrade the barns in order to bring everything up to code. Well a licensed electrical contractor has been brought in for the lighting. But any structural repairs are being done by ASM's own employees. The employees they inherited from the previous management company and the same unskilled labor that got us into the condition we're in today. Many of us have concerns about the patch's being done on supporting structural posts. Is this bringing it up to code? We've also asked if they are going to patch the leaky roofs and they said it's not in their plan at this time. Wouldn't it be prudent to patch the roofs now while there are no horses in the barns? An elastomer coating would be a quick and easy repair to the barn roofs.

In conclusion, I recommend that the Board of Commissioners rejects this proposal of a rate increase, reduction of services (feeding) and an extension of their initial 2 year contract. In fact, I recommend that the City puts a request for proposal out 6 months prior to the expiration of their contract. Simply handing a company a contract without

competitive bidding was a mistake.	ASM Global doesn't have the qualifications to operate an equestrian center of this
magnitude.

- ASM's Current Rate Scenario includes cubes (yet ONLY 38% of Boarders use Cubes). They must be making a profit now on all stalls with no cubes?
- ASM's Comparable Properties Chart <u>use Properties that currently feed Hay</u>
- ASM's **Proposed** Rates include NO cubes and NO hay. **Board always has included feed & should continue to do so.**
- There are two nearby feed stores which sell hay to Boarders
  - Why not buy hay by the ton (cheaper) & offer feeding hay to Boarders?
  - The facility next door to LAEC offers this; there must be a profit.
  - Polo Area stalls are ONLY 10 x 10. ASM's comparable 10 x10 box stalls are \$700. **including Hay.**

## **Barn Management Issues**:

LAEC is in dire need of a Barn Manager. ASM has not demonstrated positive experience in Barn Management. Their specialty appears to be event & social gatherings.

They do not effectively communicate Rules and there is NO enforcement; thus rule-breakers continue with their behavior since there are no consequences.

They are misrepresenting their Projects List. Some examples below:

# **Establishment of Pest Control Program:**

- Numerous horses have suffered wounds and damage due to their hooves being chewed by rats. Boarders have to endure vet bills and treatment programs; at their own expense.
- There are dangerous holes and underground tunnels throughout the Polo Barn area and worse, in the sun pens. Sooner or later, a horse is going to get injured stepping in a hole.

- In Polo area, at least **SEVEN Boarders have experienced car damage with repairs ranging from hundreds to thousands of dollars** (not including tow truck bills) from parking their cars in their assigned parking area. Rats and squirrels have crawled up into the engine area & chewed wire harness wires. Since ASM refuses to manage the problem; all Polo area Boarders need to park elsewhere.

Note: this is a new issue, never a problem, with previous management.

Boarders have recommended solutions to ASM; but they have been ignored.

# **Implemented 24-hour Security Coverage:**

One of the main needs for night security, is for the horses to be monitored. The Allied Guards have no horse knowledge. They do not know the signs of a horse in distress.

There is **NO secure perimeter fencing.** Repairs have never been made, (when tractors pushed the manure piles against the chain link fence which collapsed it).

I have witnessed coyotes and unauthorized people gain access to the grounds.

There have been numerous instances where 'homeless' people get access and use the restroom, showers and walk the property.

I, Erin Ballew, board 1 horse at LAEC. He's a retired sport horse. He is in the pipe corrals in the back of the property where most retired, old, trail horses, and/or lesson horses are boarded. My two children and I care for our horse, and enjoy the park with him. We ride by Travel Town and wave at the little kids going on the train ride and we stop to let kids pet our horse - he enjoys the attention too. We are keeping the joy of horses alive in Griffith Park as Mr.Griffith wanted it.

I believe our LAEC independent boarder community is most impacted by the large board increases being proposed. With the proposed increase, horse keeping and riding at LAEC will become unsustainable to average, blue collar and middle-class people.

Pipe corral stalls and feeding of cubes are the **most basic** and **cheapest-type boarding** structure and feed offered.

I was displaced from Circle K Stable, which was sold for condos. In 2022, they charged \$570 - \$600 for pipe corrals and alfalfa <u>hay</u> fed twice a day. They also fed lunch (a 3rd feeding time) at no extra charge if I provided hay - again, there was no extra charge for this service. I had a walk in tack room and a place for extra feed. The board went up from \$500 due to the high cost of hay during the pandemic. Hay is superior to compressed cube feed as it's more natural for horses to eat. Cubes are the cheapest and most basic feed.

I moved to Triple R in mid-2023. LAEC management was not correct in the data they provided on the amount and service offered by Triple R. Triple R offers larger box stalls. They have 4 rates for different stalls. I paid \$656/month for a box stall, walk in tack room, and 2 times a day feed of cubes, and I left there in December 2023. They also offered the cubes to be wet as a free added service to make it easier for the horses to eat.

Again, LAEC is the most basic offering of pipe corral stall, dry cubes twice a day, and a small box for keeping tack. The older, retired, and lesson horses that mostly populate the barns D, E, and F do not need the show and jumping facilities used by the horses who are fancy show horses.

The new LAEC management spends a great deal of money for security. This is not necessary for the old, retired, and lesson horses at the back of the property. This is a waste of money, which is driving high costs for the basic pipe stalls. Perhaps this is needed for the expensive sport horses in barns A to C, then the burden of cost should be put where it is required.

Please vote No on Board Report No. 24-254 regarding the proposal to raise LAEC boarding rates due to unreasonable pricing and lack of transparency, and No to the request for a 15 month extension for accountability.

- 1. On September 21, 2024, boarders were presented with new board rates.
  - They ranged from 20 to 27% higher than our current board rates; and, were 35 to 50% higher than what was presented to RAP back on July 18, 2024, Board Report No. 24-165.
  - When questioned about their numbers, we were told they are just "fun numbers', "made-up numbers", or "numbers that fit", then promised to look into it. These dismissals made everything suspect!
- 2. At an October 23, 2024 boarder meeting, we found that the proposed board price and cited expenses were **Unchanged** from the September boarder meeting. One thing different is that:
  - ASM eliminated LAEC's standard feeding (alfalfa cubes), thus calculating what looked like a lower proposed boarding rate, then trying to sell it as if we asked for it. We DID NOT.
  - Removing the standard feeding of cubes would be in breach of our Boarder Contract that ASM made us sign in February.
  - The loss of food makes our boarding a quasi-dry stall type of board, yet they ask to raise us for premium rates while citing non-existing improvements such as, improved show barns.
- 3. The expense cited for double stall is bogus. Prior management discovered back in 2019/2020 that double stalls were actually profitable, whereas the single pipe corrals were not. A horse is a horse regardless of the size of the stall. The added cost is the price of a dry stall, that is covered under current rates. Upon discovery, the former Stable Manager, Dale Perkins, wanted to convert all the Pipe corals into Doubles because they made \$50 vs lost \$50. We argued that LAEC would be pricing out lower incomes options which would not align with Mr. Griffith's gift intention.
  - Using ASM's September presented monthly expense, I get an average cost of \$789 per horse. If I currently pay \$908/month for a
    double stall → Profitable (+\$119)
  - Using ASM's monthly expenses presented in October with food removed, I get an average cost of \$656 per horse.
     Combined with a higher Double stall rate proposed at \$976/month → Even more Profitable (+\$320)
  - . Double stalls are profitable. Increasing to greater than 30% profit is Unreasonable and Unequitable

ASM presents numbers claiming they lose money on Doubles to justify their unreasonable price hikes. My bottom-up estimate shows doubles are profitable, whereas single pipe corrals are not. This aligns with estimates by previous management with many years of facilities and stable operations experience.

The table below shows the three versions of proposed boarding rates from ASM.

- You can see how rates skyrocketed for doubles during the first request back in July. Currently, we have 46 filled doubles.
- The light blue mid section shows you how the rates shared first in September were higher for the singles than in the earlier July proposal
- You can see how this current request is made to look reasonable, but is still too high AND unreasonable. It ignores the shifted food cost.
   Dropping standard feeding reduces expenses more than \$582K annually
- · Boarders will be able to backfill food at the cube price because of retail pricing and additional service wrapped costs.

This proposal would cost boarders an additional \$800K a year. This is a hardship for many boarders, including me. The increase on a double adds at least another \$3,1K a year. To pay fairly, "Yes, sign me up." To be equitably charged, "No".

The goal post keeps moving on what is expected from boarding. The current board prices that ASM came into were balanced among many considerations. We had a total of four boarder meetings this year with the last two pertaining to the board increase. While boarding by itself is generally not profitable, the equestrian life creates an ambiance, a buzz, and excitement that make the boarding venues attractive. And those revenue streams are what make the facility profitable. This is not happening for LAEC. Can we get management focused on events?

While focusing on a potential board increase and food removal, it seems no one is asking about the General Ops stream. What is it? And why is it so expensive \$2.9M. I read that RAP paid ASM for transition costs prior to contract start, and they have Capital money for capital projects. We request management be transparent about how they are creatively bundling and categorizing costs to then assert unprofitability. May we request an independent audit. I volunteer to assist. Others might too.

Regarding the 15 month extension: The unreasonable board increase without substantiation, the weak forecast in other revenue streams, the priorities implemented, as others have likely articulated better in their emails, these summarize why I ask you to Vote No on the 15 month extension.

I apologize for the late send. In preparing for this meeting I have not ridden a horse for the past 6 days.

LAEC is currently the most expensive boarding stable in the Rancho Equestrian neighborhood.

The plan to raise rates and eliminate feeding horses is outrageous and a stab in the back to all boarders, especially those of us who were in contact with RAP, informing RAP about the conditions at LAEC.

That's the equivalent of a hospital requiring patients to bring their own food.

RAP's plan will force horse owners of modest means to move. It will make it harder for people to maintain their beloved pets in the Rancho Equestrian neighborhood. Borders will be forced to compete for a limited number of stalls in smaller facilities in nearby areas. The rate increase at LAEC will influence the rates at boarding stables in the Burbank in Glendale area. This dramatic rate increase will have a devastating effect on the equestrian community.

More importantly, boarding stables in nearby areas are available to stay in business and provide better care for less money.

In 2022, after 20 years of boarding at LAEC, my horse passed away. I could not afford to buy another horse and board at LAEC.

Toward the end of my horse's life, in January of 2022, I paid around \$900 for a double stall in E-barn. Plus, \$150 to have my horse fed. Plus, approximately \$250 to \$300 a month for hay. Total: \$1350 per month in 2022.

Nine months later, I moved my current horse to Trail Canyon Equestrian Center in Tajunga.

When I first moved in the rates were \$700 per month. The rates went up after the pandemic because hay prices increased.

Compare and contrast:

In 2024 the rates are: \$850 per month - which included an extra fee for higher priced hay than the hay that was included in the board.

Price Includes:

12 x 12 box stall with 12 x 24 paddock.

Horses are fed 4 times a day: Timothy and Alfalfa Hay twice a day. Timothy Pellets and carrots twice a day.

Horses are turned out two for hours a day - six days a week.

All stalls include:

Cameras

Stall mats

Stalls are cleaned daily.

New shavings twice a week.

All boarders are provided with a built-in locker in the tack room. The ranch is meticulously clean and well maintained.

Two large arenas. Two round pens. Multiple Sun pens. Wash rack. Trails nearby. Dressage trainer Claudia Roberts.

LAEC boarders are requesting an audit and review of ASM Global's operating budget, and review of corresponding back up by someone with equestrian knowledge, in response to their proposed board increase. Without accurate information we ask the commissioners to continue this until accurate information is confirmed. We reject the proposed board increases & 15 month contract extension request.

LAEC is not below the market rate in the region
Board is being raised & services are reduced
The feed & feeding component has not been agreed to, and brings the rate increase close to 30%

Multiple boarding related revenue streams have been omitted in the profit accounting report.

Not enough progress has been made to rectify the years of maintenance deferment to warrant another board increase Priority spending so far has been on projects not related to boarding.

The requested board increase is too high. It is especially high considering that ASM proposes to remove feed and feeding from the boarding.

While it appears that they are raising rates 5-7.5%, this is without food/feeding. With food/feeding added back in, using their own numbers, the rate increase comes to between 20-29%. That is unaffordable and unacceptable. The board is being raised AND services are being deducted.

LAEC's rates are NOT below the market rate in the region. The comps provided by ASM are inaccurate and the facilities are not comparable. ASM only included comps supporting their request to raise rates and did not consider comps supporting LOWERING the rate.

Increasing the board as proposed is discriminatory and will price out independent and lower income boarders.

Boarders are not responsible for offsetting the costs of 10 plus years of deferred maintenance and neglect. It was represented in meetings that there was a budget to cover the projects needed to return the Center to its former glory.

Without accurate information this increase is arbitrary. The numbers remain assertions and not facts. This should not be "fun with numbers," as was stated by ASM in one of the meetings.

Many questions remain unanswered. Some of the information presented is inaccurate. Revenue streams have been omitted.

We implore the Board of Commissioners to reject this proposal.

Dear All,

I am copying members from the Office of Councilmember Hugo Soto-Martinez that I have been in communication with as well as the commissioners of the Department of Recreation and Parks.

I hope all is well with you. I am contacting you regarding the Dorothy and Benjamin Smith park. This park has been a constant nuisance ever since the fence was removed and before the fence was put up. The park attracts numerous transients that use the park for drug use, camping, and various other activities that prevent it from being a resource for the community members to enjoy. Without constant supervision, this park will ultimately end up the same way it was prior to the park being fenced (it is already getting close to that point).

This park is no longer a park. All of the vegetation is brown, all the trees and walls surrounding the park have been graffiti tagged, and every day tens of transients from the project room key across the street use this park to circle up and do drugs, play loud music, act erratically towards anyone that enters the park, and on numbers cases have threatened members of the community for being in the park. When you call LAPD it takes them 2 days to come out and the CIRCLE team will temporarily ask them to leave for the people to either leave and come right back or just say no. What is the point of this park if it is a constant eye sore and just used for illegal activities? The park should be fenced again until the city departments can figure out a better use for it as it is clear that the city services cannot prevent the above mentioned issues with its current use. Countless community members are too scared to use the park and there are countless vacancies for buildings in the immediate area due to the growing problem. No one wants to live next to a park like this that will eventually turn into a large encampment again.

Another petition has been started to fence this park by community members living in the area. There has to be a solution as the current one is not working. I am writing to express my serious concerns regarding an incident that occurred during my son's recent flag football game and to request a discussion about ensuring the safety and well-being of all players during city-sponsored sports events.

The game in question took place on Tuesday, December 5, at 8 PM. My son, Maverick Valadez, plays for the Glassell Park All-Stars Majors team, and they were competing against the Ramon Garcia Recreation Center team. During this game, my son, the only African-American player on the field, was subjected to repeated harassment by two boys on the opposing team, who called him the "N-word" multiple times.

Maverick immediately alerted the referee about this unacceptable behavior. However, despite his repeated attempts to bring this to the referee's attention, the harassment continued. Maverick has unfortunately encountered this racial slur before and is familiar with the nuances of "smack talk" in sports, but this incident felt different and targeted, which prompted him to report it right away.

In the fourth quarter, the situation escalated when one of the boys physically assaulted Maverick without provocation, followed by a second boy joining in to hit him. Scared and acting in self-defense, Maverick struck each boy once to protect himself and get away. I witnessed the entire incident, and it was clear that Maverick's actions were solely in self-defense.

After the altercation, the game was paused, and all involved players were pulled out. However, as the teams shook hands at the end of the game, multiple players from the Ramon Garcia team made monkey noises at Maverick as they passed him. Additionally, after the game, the two boys involved in the fight, along with at least one other team member, were waiting for Maverick to walk across the field. Fortunately, members of the staff noticed this and instructed the Glassell Park team to wait until the Ramon Garcia players had cleared out before leaving. I also went to retrieve my car and parked it near the field for Maverick's safety. Several of Maverick's teammates accompanied him as he walked to the parking lot.

That night I was informed that Maverick might face suspension, even though by every account, he did nothing wrong. Ultimately, I learned that the Parks Department decided not to suspend Maverick but only suspended the two boys involved for one game. I find this decision deeply concerning, as it fails to address the seriousness of their actions and the impact on Maverick's safety and well-being. Considering that all players and parents signed a code of conduct, it is unclear why these boys were not removed from the All-Stars team entirely.

I am also troubled by the apparent lack of a protocol for referees to address and de-escalate such situations before they turn physical. This creates a hostile and unsafe environment, not only for my son but for other players, including my younger son, who may face similar challenges in the future.

I respectfully request that the Parks Department contact me to discuss what steps can be taken to ensure the safety of all children during city-sponsored sports events. This includes establishing clear protocols for referees to address and prevent harassment, as well as implementing more serious consequences for players who violate the code of conduct, especially when their actions involve racial harassment and physical violence.

I am the Director of the Coastal Adaptation Program at The Bay Foundation (TBF). We currently have funding from the Federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to install almost 5-acres of coastal vegetation on an underutilized portion of Venice Beach. We have the support of several entities in Venice, including the Venice Neighborhood Council, as well as from the office of Traci Park. We have installed dunes in other coastal cities, and we are very much interested in introducing the Venice community to the idea of co-existing with such a coastal dune field.

I understand that the City of LA's Planning department is currently working on revising its Land Use Plan (LUP), which has a full chapter dedicated to climate adaptation and coastal resilience. This community impact statement was passed in a meeting compliant with the Brown Act on December 9, 2024 with a vote of 12 yes, 1 no, 0 abstain, and 0 recused
