Our younger children have no resource for education and interaction with animals other than dogs and cats.

Most find pony and horse ownership a financial and locational hardship. Rental horses and ponies help these people and children enjoy this activity within a budget.

I was lucky enough to grow up with horses. My daughter was able to take horse back riding lessons at the local stables in Burbank.

Los Angeles is changing and sometimes it's not for the good. Removing the older iconic landmarks wipes away a part of the cities history.

The woman posting hate and malicious photos, and statements about abuse at the pony ride, is using media material from other locations not affiliated in any way with the Griffith Park Pony Ride. There is NO abuse at the pony ride. These are older ponies, gently taking our children on an experience they can not get at home, or a friends house. There are no LOCAL pony rides for the city children to have an opportunity to see and interact with these types of animals.

Please sign an extended lease with Steve Week and allow the children of the city to have a positive experience about their childhood.

The forced closure of the Griffith Park Pony Rides is a loss to our community, and seems to have been carried out in a manner unfair to the concession owner. It appears to me that the Council is putting up a pretense of interest in animal welfare in order to capitulate to the threats of an interest group that - in contrast to the majority of Americans and Angelenos - believes humans and horses should not interact (see the language of their petition, implying that horses are inherently dangerous and diseased). Sure, ponies going in circles all day is not the richest animal-interaction experience for either the kids or the ponies, but how else are children without much money supposed to learn to appreciate animals, and in particular humans' connection with horses throughout history? I'd not be at all surprised to see that the zoo is next in their crosshairs - and then what will be left in Griffith Park? Golf for the wealthy, litter-strewn picnic areas and a long line for the merry--go-round for the plebes? If the city cared about animal welfare, it should have worked with the owner, or a replacement concessionaire, to improve conditions for the ponies or change the nature of the ride, with the advice of veterinarians and leaders in the equine community. Instead, it simply and suddenly shut it down. Horses are part of human history, and our connection with them can be incredibly rewarding. I'm disappointed.

The pony rides are a family tradition. We are a horse family and own a horse and have owned a pint before! trust me they want a purpose a job! They love it and thrive doing it! It's very expensive to take on more animals for anyone right now. so where do these activist get off leaving these ponies homeless. please reconsider your decision to shut this operation down. thank you

The pony rides should continue to operate as a concession. As a 4th generation Angeleno I am appalled that a small radical fringe group can close a legally operating business that was not in violation of any law. I started my love for horses when I was a small girl and rode the ponies at Griffith Park. I am now 64 and have owned 2 horses for the last 15 years. I learned compassion for animals back when I was a child and I know that it all started with the ponies. I visited them often with my Mom and dreamt of the day when I might have my own. It took me many years in between but my dream came true. These ponies are well taken care of and start the dreams of so many children. Please, please allow that to continue.

Please reinstate the Griffith Park Pony Ride concession contract.

The pony rides were an integral part of my childhood and helped forge my lifelong love of horses. There are a myriad of reasons why the pony rides should continue to operate in the same capacity for another 74 years. The pony rides are often the only opportunity for Angeleno children to touch a horse, let alone ride one. Much of the valley, and parts of greater Los Angeles have been home to some of the most iconic horses and horsemen. It's an integral part of our history and culture. As urbanization has taken over much of the county, development has pushed out horses making way for more cars and people. The cost of horse ownership has virtually doubled over the past couple of decades, space being favored for humans over animals. These animal rights activists are out of touch with what it takes to not only care for horses, but also provide them with a stimulating environment for them to live long and healthy lives. Many of these ponies are taken better care of than dogs in people's homes. They have a job, they have purpose and they thrive off the energy and joy that surrounds them when excited parents and grandparents line their children up for a ride. Many of the vets that provided third party reports are vets that I trust to call on my own horses and have accurately depicted what a great life these animals have.

The ponies are well cared for. I am a horse owner

As a child in the 70s I came to the pony rides and dreamed of having a horse of my own. Raising my three children in the Valley in the early 2000s I also turned to the Griffith Park Pony Rides, followed by a picnic at the park, as an affordable Sunday adventure that gave our city kids a taste of nature and communing with animals. When friends with young children came to visit from the East Coast, a stop at the Pony Rides was a necessary and thrilling part of their trip, more exciting than Disneyland! No one could imagine that a city like Los Angeles would have an amazing, huge wild park like Griffith Park at its core with pony rides to provide a farm-like experience for children.

It is a travesty that you are going to close down the pony rides at Griffith Park. Contrary to the protestors' assertions, They ARE well cared for. Horses can develop thousands of different ailments. Four may have died, but my understanding is they had 200 ponies so the odds should actually have been MUCH higher than this number of ponies passed away.

What were the AGES of these ponies?

What did they due from?

Name of veterinarian and whom they are employed by, including political preference?

I have been there many times, and the pony rides have history and should be PRESERVED as part of LA HISTORY!

Hello, thank you so much for not renewing the contract for Griffith park pony rides. I'm glad that now the cycle of suffering that occurred at that place has been put to a stop. This sends a great message to kids and future generations. It teaches us to evolve and not needlessly harm beings for entertainment nor profit. The place can be replaced with a community garden, animal-FREE models, or anything else that doesn't harm beings. Thank you! Thank you so much to the RAP and LA city council members for choosing against renewing the Griffith Park Pony Rides contract. It was a perfect decision for a progressive city like Los Angeles. Animals have no business being used for exploitative purposes, and your decision shows that the city of Los Angeles will not tolerate coverups and secrets. please consider putting in its place other venues such as music concerts, train rides and other educational options such as an animal sanctuary where children can bond with and learn about animals. Thank you Jimmy Kim for your leadership!

First and foremost, thank you so much for deciding to close down Griffith Park and Pony Rides. The animals that are being used there are miserable from being exploited all their life. It doesn't take an equestrian expert to be able to see that.

What I would suggest as a replacement would be any of the following: an actual sanctuary where animals are not exploited/used as slaves, a ferris wheel, indoor arts and crafts center, a concert venue, a laser tag attraction, a strip club, bumper cars/go-karts, rock climbing, trampoline park, water park, an arcade, a beer garden/bar, ice skating rink, a movie theater/drive-in theater, a haunted house, an escape room, or build a few roller-coasters. Heck, just turn it into a full-on amusement park. Anything that doesn't use animals for our benefit. Thank you.

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this is a travesty. you fell victim to a crazy fanatic who was protesting and had no idea what she was talking about. you have taken the joy of hundreds of kids who may never be able to ride a horse or pony. shame on you.

Thank you for ending the Griffith park pony rides and petting zoo contract and to replace it I think something that doesn't involve animals being used some options I would like is batting cages, concert venue, rock climbing, trampoline park, water slide park, or a roller coaster.

Keep the pony rides going! There is no alternative to compare this experience to.

I strongly oppose the closing of the Pony Rides by the Parks dept. Closing the pony rides does an immense disservice to the public, especially the families. Angelenos need to have affordable access to educational and entertaining animal activities. Children love the ponies and the ponies are healthy and well-cared...the veternarian reports support that truth. Mr. Weeks has done everything requested by the City and the vets.

I undetstand that there was a question of four ponies that died in the last year: one from old age (who had been retired and living out their life), 2 from colic under the care of veternarians and one from a freak kick by a herd mate. Colic is common and every horse owners fear; it happens, as do herd accidents. These are all normal, though sad, passings. There is no reason to not renew the permit to run the concession.

I feel like you have listened to the extreme animal activists who don't believe that animals should be kept as pets. Their views are absolutely extreme and in the extreme minority. It is shameful that the Parks dept has caved to the crazies when Mr. Weeks has done everything asked of him to assure the care and safety of the ponies and the children.

I want to thank the City of Los Angeles for not renewing the Griffith Park pony ride contract. I'm glad to hear the elderly ponies will not have to circle round and round in the sweltering heat and pouring rain and that the City acknowledged key veterinary recommendations were not implemented. Going forward, I would recommend replacing the pony ride with vendors that offer art activities: watercoloring, finger painting, clay, as well as more physical attractions; such as slides and climbing structures. Thank you again.

Thank you for caring for the griffith park geriatric ponies by not re-newing the contract for pony rides. These poor babies need to be retired to caring homes or a sanctuary, and the rides can be easily replaced by other activities for children. THANK YOU.

Thank you for canceling the abusive pony rides. Let's teach our kids how treat animals by creating a sanctuary, preferably for ponies, so that we can observe and protect the animals' natural behaviors.

To the Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP),

I am extremely disappointed to learn of the decision to not extend the contract for pony rides at Griffith Park. My wife is a +30year active horsewoman having competed on UCLA's equestrian team, and it all started with her mother randomly taking her to Griffith Park for a pony ride one weekend when she was a small child. The claims by the pony rides' opponents are absurd. Shame on me for not learning about this issue earlier to have voiced my opinion earlier. What is next? Close the Griffith Park & Southern Railroad since it is a symbol of discrimination and oppression against the Chinese workers who built California's railroads? Close the Harding and Wilson Golf Courses since they are a symbol of elitism and waste water on non-native grasses? When will this insanity end? Shame on YOU for your shortsightedness and fear of being seen as not progressive enough.

Disgusted-

Thank you so much for making the very humane and kind decision to stop the pony rides at Griffith Park. These ponies were NOT being cared for appropriately and needed veterinary and farrier care. Many were elderly and arthritic, and were not receiving appropriate supplements to help prevent their arthritis from worsening, nor were any of these ponies receiving medication to help keep them comfortable.

Additionally, there were several instances where the pony rides put the public and children at risk. The children were belted onto the ponies, which is very dangerous, and there was more than one instance where the ponies broke free and ran across the park.

I think many adults have fond memories of pony rides from when we were children, and we want to share that same memory with our progeny. That being said, I think we also have to understand that the welfare of the animals must supersede any nostalgia. The time has come for us to realize that we can share different memories with our children.

Animal interaction is crucial when developing a child's empathy and understanding of animals. Please have the replacement venue have an animal component where children who frequented the pony rides can have the experiences they may not be afforded at home.

As the president of a ten year old local horse rescue, I could not possibly disagree more strongly with this decision. It doesn't represent the views of knowledgeable horse owners, horse professionals or animal welfare professionals like myself. Instead, it seems a tiny fringe radical animal rights group has made this happen based upon observations like a pony crying (biologically impossible - their eyes do water in the wind like ours) or ponies being outside in the rain (rain in Los Angeles where the low is 60 and you are a hairy pony, feels good!).

More troubling still, this decision seems to have been made by one person who doesn't represent the views of most Los Angelenos - at all.

I would urge you to think long and hard about the precedent being set here and why one person seems able to shut down a 75 year institution so that he doesn't have to deal with a small but noisy group of protesters anymore.

I would like to suggest a skate park to replace the current concession. Here, both children and adults can have fun and stay active using bikes, skateboards, scooters, and inline skates. Communities could form around the hobby, and traffic would be driven to the nearby train ride. Thank you for your consideration, and for helping Los Angeles move progressively forward.

Riding the pony's in Griffith park has been one of the most meaningful experiences of my daughters life. The first time she rode one of the pony's in Griffith park, her face lit up had a truly wonderful time. We frequent the pony rides regularly and it is one of her favorite things in the world. My second daughter was recently born and I am heartbroken that she will not be able to experience the same joy as my first daughter now that the pony rides are being shut down. For many people in the city, this is the only possible affordable introduction to horses. Sure, the wealthy will be fine after the pony rides are shut down, as always, because they can spend \$70 per hour on riding lessons for their children. With the pony rides however, for \$5, a child can get to ride a horse and start them down the path of love for animals, which is truly priceless.

I think the decision to shut down such a beloved feature of Griffith park, which has had such a positive effect on literally thousands and thousands of children, is a travesty and a great inequity, and should be reconsidered.

The Pony Rides are a tradition of Griffith Park that have enriched generations of children's lives. Find a way to keep them. Griffith Park is a jewel of the LA metropolis. I think the pony rides should be replaced with a petting zoo, where kids can have animals experiences and birthday parties that are not riding dependent, but allow them to interact with / pet / feed animals. I think it's imperative that the pony rides be replaced as soon as possible, so that the park still offers an amenity and destination for low-income families. My family & I thank you for ending the outdated & cruel pony rides. I spoke at your last meeting & suggested Funbox.com as a modern, fun activity for kids of most ages where they can play and get exercise. There's one up now at the Topanga Mall in Woodland Hills. Please check it out! Again, thank you.

Thank you so much for doing the right thing by these ponies and shutting down the rides. Growing up I loved pony rides (and horse drawn carriage rides in NYC) because I loved animals. Many wonderful memories. But I didn't understand it from the animal's perspective. The bottom line is the money. So medical records are fakes, ages lied about, etc. Geriatric animals are used when they should be retired. Even if the business owners think they love the animals and do care for their needs on some level, they didn't care for the horses needs as their main priority. I have come to the decision that animals are not ours to be used for entertainment. I fully support the move in NYC for electric carriage rides that have vintage charm but no horses. I know families are sad to see the pony rides go but it is the right thing to do!! Thank you so much for doing the right thing.

Most domestic animals are happier, healthier & more bonded to "their people" when they have jobs - be it to guide the blind, pull the sled, compete in agility or service those who ride them. I thought the consulting vet's report thorough, professional and am appreciative it is now available to the public. It is well established that the pony rides are a longstanding and valued offering, and it is reassuring to hear that in general they have been well treated, their facilities in good order. I fear that the wish to close the facility is a loss for many families, perhaps even for some of the ponies. And it appears just now that there is a political element: local politicians who rally support by appearing to be "for the animals". I urge that veterinary exams be done on an ongoing basis, the results made public. The suggestion that an educational element be included at the facility would further round out the potentially rich experience families and young children would take away from their visit to the pony rides. Keep and improve the pony rides!

Thank you for caring about the ponies and the kids and all who witness this. I see interactive physical games for kids as something they would enjoy - like human checkers or something like that-

As the long time train ride concessionaire I am deeply disappointed by this action. Mr Weeks was a breath of fresh air compared to the former pony ride concession. For the first 25 years of my tenure in the park we received constant complaints from our customers about the pony ride conditions and the treatment of customers. After Mr. Weeks took over those complaints disappeared within a couple of months. He not only seriously improved the conditions of the animals from prior years he also did a complete make over of the concession appearance and customer service.

I am very sad for the children of Los Angeles who will not get to experience the affordable combined attraction that our train ride and the pony ride offered. Especially for our lower income citizens who get the most marginal benefit of Griffith Park parks. There is nothing else in this City that offers an hour's worth of fun for the price of the pony rides and the trains. The ponies and the trains have been neighbors and partners since 1948 and I consider it the height of folly to break us up based on the noise from a few loud voices.

Thank you to the Department of Recreation & Parks and to Jimmy Kim for deciding not to renew the contract with Griffith Park Pony Rides & Petting Zoo. Bringing children to this establishment presents them, who are literally the future, with a behavior that is unnatural as horses do not carry their own offspring on their backs and walk around aimlessly in circles all day long within their natural environments. We must teach children empathy and respect towards all sentient beings as this will equip them with the kindness and compassion they need to be good citizens and human beings. So much can be done with the space that this business currently encompasses. For example, the space can be used as a local sanctuary within the city of L.A. which an already existing sanctuary near L.A. is interested in taking on. A playground can also be built to allow children to play safely as well as an area where sports can be practiced which will instill team work values and solidarity among children. Often pony rides is the first place children have the opportunity to be on a large animal.

Some people can't afford to get their children ridding lessons, so for those kids that love pony's this might be the only experience they are able to have! I have 5 kids and that was their first experience ridding a pony.

This experience spurred on my children's love of horses and pony's.

Please keep the Pony rides and the smiling faces of the children that get to enjoy this experience!

Introducing kids to animals at a young age teaches them care, empathy, and helps build better social skills. The pony rides are a big deal developmentally for kids and it's not right or fair that only higher income families have access to them. Which, WITHOUT the pony rides at Griffith Park (the only real low-cost and accessible option), is exactly what would happen. So many kids would miss out on a fundamental part of growing up in this world — interacting with the earth, with the animals, and gaining a perspective beyond the urban day-to-day? It's too important.

And as for the ponies, themselves, let's turn to the opinions of the vets and animal control professionals, not the ill-informed.

Care and empathy for them is the point, it's what children develop from being around them, learning how to treat them, learning not to scare them... These animals deserve care and empathy and they get it! Plus, the next generation learns how to give it.

Losing sight of that and getting rid of the pony rides altogether would be a great travesty.

My passion for horses started at age 5 when my father took me to a pony ride. I loved it so much I began drawing horses and writing stories about horses, which led to a career in art. A lifetime of owning and loving horses has been the greatest joy of my life. I'm a Glendale resident, but LAEC and the Rancho Equestrian neighborhood has been my home away from home for over 30 years.

For the sake of justice, you must right this wrong and renew the contract for the pony rides. It's time to finally stand up to the extremists who have weaponized misinformation and unfairly targeted Steve Weeks and his business.

Please understand that when you or your colleagues closed the iconic pony rides that have served Los Angeles for 74 years, many people will interpret that decision as wrong, immoral, corrupt and possibly illegal. It was clearly influenced by the radical extremists that no one in their right mind should take seriously.

We are in what I call "The Golden Age of Misinformation." The founder of the Los Angeles Alliance for Animals (LAAA) is a master of misinformation. The group has 667 members. Very few of their members are based in Los Angeles, or CA. Their mission is to shut down ALL the pony rides in the US. They consider ALL equestrian sports "slavery." Additionally, they regularly protest the treatment of ONE of three of elephants at the LA Zoo. What's so special about that elephant? He's the only elephant that belongs to the LA Zoo. The two females are on loan from other zoos.

These willfully blind bullies need attention like fish need water. They're not working to stop real horse abuse, such as horse slaughter, starvation, abusive training methods used on Tennessee Walking Horses, Mustang roundups, horse racing deaths, etc. Instead, they have a vendetta against one man. The ONLY reason they have targeted Steve Weeks is because he's easy prey – his business is dependent on a concession with the city of Los Angeles. They're like a coyote chasing a Chihuahua.

Like election deniers and QAnon, their belief systems are completely divorced from reality. Their strategies are underhanded, aggressive and illegal. They have been repeatedly caught on camera shouting obscenities at parents and children. They camped out at the homes of city officials and left death threats for Steve Weeks, resulting in 11 arrests.

On May 25, 2022, the motion to renew the Pony Rides contract was approved.

LAAA put out a call to action to telephone Los Angeles Councilman Jimmy Lee. Consequently, interim Parks General Manager Jimmy Kim was quoted by NBC News criticizing Steve Weeks for lack of transparency. That's highly ironic because it's Jimmy Kim who lacks transparency.

No public hearing was held, and every single hearing was canceled. The motion to cancel the contract does not show a vote by the City Council. The letter sent to Steve Weeks on November 23rd, terminating the contract was illegal and violated the Brown act.

Jimmy Kim's decision to shut down the pony rides blames the victim. It sets a bad precedent and empowers a small cult of radical extremists. Their false claims do not represent the views of the majority of the Los Angeles community. They spread misinformation worldwide on Facebook and other social media platforms. The fact that their petition has 82K signatures is misleading – ONLY 1,839 are local residents.

The Save the Pony Rides petition has gotten nearly 6K LOCAL signatures in a short period of time.

LAAA claims of equine abuse are extreme distortions of a fact, and/or blatant lies.

EXAMPLE: The following is posted the LAAA Facebook page, "4 Geriatric ponies dead under Steven Weeks watch. Attorney General Rob Bonta should investigate Steve Weeks for animal cruelty."

THE TRUTH: It's true that four geriatric ponies died.

THE LIE: The deaths were not as a result of animal cruelty.

All the ponies that passed away were retired and no longer working. That's because Steve Weeks gave each and every one of his ponies a forever home. Very few horses and ponies are that lucky.

One pony died at the age of 38! That's the equine equivalent of 120 years!

To claim that the pony died of animal abuse is like saying "120 year old man dead. Attorney General Rob Bonta should investigate his family for abuse."

It's RARE for a horse to live past the age of 30. My horse lived to be 32. He outlived all the other horses in DEF Barns at LAEC. Trust me, no pony lives to be 38 unless he/she is well cared for and loved. It's proof that Steve Weeks takes excellent care of his ponies.

Two other retired ponies suffered severe colic and were rushed to the hospital. The vet recommended euthanasia. Typically, Colic surgery can cost around 10K to 30K. Again, the fact that Mr. Weeks took the ponies to the hospital indicates he takes good care of the ponies. Sadly, Colic is the most common ways horses die. It can happen at any time, to any horse. The fourth pony was kicked by another pony; it was a freak accident.

I'm convinced that Los Angeles City Officials are guilty of spreading disinformation. Claims that the contract was canceled because Steve Weeks didn't notify the city is impossible to believe. It was not required by the contract. Compare and contrast the minor contract violations by Steve Weeks vs. the major contract violations by frequent violator and influential developer Tim Behunin. Compare and contrast RAP's treatment of Steve Weeks vs. Tim Behunin.

The ONLY reason the pony ride contract was terminated is because city officials didn't have the guts to stand up for Steve Weeks, the ponies, the majority of their constituents, the equestrian community, and the countless children that will be deprived of the magical and potentially life changing experience of riding a pony!

PLEASE REVERSE THIS TERRIBLE DECISION.

It concerns me that Animal Exhibits are once again under attack by animal rights groups, who are using paid actors to simulate grass roots objections to these Community Services. Paying actors to harass the Pony Ride patrons, and city council is an illegal form of Political Astroturfing, and should be subject to investigation by the FTC. When I was a kid I know I would of never had that experience that shaped so much of my Character if it wasn't for the Affordability of the pony rides. I look back and it was such a great time with my family being all together for some time in the park. I have 26 years of experience caring for horses and 24 years of horse rescue experience. I have completed the "world's toughest horse race," the 100-mile Tevis Cup. I have ridden 1,635 miles and counting in American Endurance Riding Conference recognized competitions. At various times in my life, I have been responsible for the care of every kind of equine, from miniature horses to draft horses. I have assisted in humane seizures of neglected equines, and I have personally behaviorally rehabilitated horses deemed dangerous. I use positive reinforcement training methods and science-guided management practices with all horses under my care.

Based on my extensive experience with equines and the most recent veterinary report on the Pony Rides, I believe the Griffith Park ponies are exceptionally well cared-for and there is absolutely no reason to destroy the livelihood of a caring owner and business operator over the nonsensical shrieking of activists with zero equine care experience. The pretext given for not renewing the pony rides' lease was that four ponies' deaths in their retirement facility were not reported on time, even though the city contract does not require the pony ride operator to report deaths of retired sanctuary animals. To suggest that the deaths of four geriatric animals from ordinary causes during their retirement is evidence of "neglect" is like declaring everyone with dead grandparents an elder abuser. Ponies do not live forever, and colic is the number one cause of death in all domestic equines regardless of management protocols.

Furthermore, I want to comment on the overall idea promoted by the animal extermination extremists that horseback riding is "slavery" inherently harmful to equines. Not only is this scientifically proven to be false—horses' parasympathetic nervous systems are positively regulated in a calming manner by contact with a familiar human—it is a ridiculous misunderstanding of domestication. There are no true wild horses in the world except for the Przewalski's Horse, an endangered species not used for riding. There are certainly no wild ponies! Domestic ponies are the equivalent of domestic dogs, a species incapable of thriving in the wild that has been selectively bred for a certain task for thousands of years. Just like Border Collies want to herd sheep, domestic horses want to interact with humans and want to exercise in collaboration with humans. It is very UNHEALTHY to keep a confined domestic equine and not provide it with exercise, such as riding. Equines denied sufficient exercise often develop pathological behaviors such as cribbing, weaving, and self-

Ultimately, this whole situation is proof that decisions about equines should be made by equine experts. I understand it is difficult for those without equine experience to know when they are being misinformed by malicious actors like these extremist protesters. I sympathize—I wouldn't know how to regulate, say, a particle collider! But this is why RAP needs to make all equine related decisions through extensive consultation with the equestrian community, not by bending to pressure from the loudest mob.

Keep the pony rides for the kids and the ponies! I have owned ponies and horses for over 30 years. These ponies are not overused or abused. They are doted on by their care givers and are living really their best life. Horses and ponies evolved alongside humans for both species benefit. Horses and ponies live longer, healthier lives when with people and getting plenty of exercise. Ponies require less nutrient dense food than horses and can easily become overweight. They were designed to move all day looking for food. They are extremely susceptible to insulin resistant (IR) diseases similar to diabetes. They are also susceptible to arthritis. These ponies having a job and walking, trotting is much better for them to keep IR and arthritis controlled than living in a dirt lot field where they are not encouraged to exercise and get fed two to three times a day. You can not put a pony in a lush green grass pasture as they will literally eat themselves sick or to death. Most ponies love little kids. Ponies are very smart and can be quite difficult for adults to get them to do something they don't want to do but they will happily do what kids want them to do. Also keep in mind horses and ponies were designed to live in a herd and become very bonded to their family. Separating them is very stressful and cruel. Thank you for your time.

I am writing in favor of keeping the pony rides operational. It's one of the only low cost ride option for kids in LA and has met or exceeded all animal control and vet inspections. I have worked for a company that uses pony rides for parties and events and kids and parents alike love them. The animals are very well cared for and showered with tons of love and affection

This is one of the best animal ride providers in LAI It's one of the only affordable options I found. My daughter adored meeting Milo, and is already eager to meet tinkerbell. Would be an absolute shame not to offer this service anymore. I already have friends interested in coming out next year. The ponies here are so sweet, always clean, and the Staff is always friendly. This has been an annual experience for my family for the last 3 years. I can't imagine how badly my daughter would freak out if she knew this was about to close. She's named all the ponies herself. We have a friend who's interested in trying next year as well. She is willing to come up from Oregon for the chance for her daughter and mine to ride together. It would be a shame for this to end I have no idea what we'd do next summer.

I am in favor of keeping the Griffith Park Pony Rides open and available to the public.

I'm a 61 years old woman. I have been a horse partner for almost 20 years. I call myself a horse "partner" instead of an "owner" because my horse isn't someone who can be "owned". She is a huge part of my life and has been extremely healing for me. My relationship with her is one of the most important relationships in my life. I love her and I know she loves me.

Denying the introduction to this sort of relationship to others who can't afford to take care of their own horse is tragic. Please do not take this away from people who want to know these amazing beings.

As a child and young adult I experienced horrible physical and sexual trauma. My relationship with these wonderful equis spirits saved my life. I had horrible depression and dissociation prior to working with horses. They helped me learn about myself and helped me find my true spirit. I don't know where I would be without them.

I now train other people how to work with their horses in a compassionate and loving manner which helps them build a strong and heartfelt relationship. These animals are naturally healing for us, and we for them.

Without access to these magical animals, other people, children and adults, who experienced trauma like mine would not have the opportunity to heal in the way these spirits help us heal. We are partners on these journeys of healing.

There is a mountain of evidence that equine assisted therapy helps heal all sorts of trauma; it helps bring out the essence of children who have emotional and developmental disabilities, it helps people who have substance abuse issues overcome their underlying problems that keep them using, it helps women and children find their voice and power after domestic abuse, etc.

Please don't take this away from the people who need this type of healing. Please keep the Griffith Park Pony Rides open to the public.

I also saw happy, excited children there with their parents getting ready to do something outside with nature away from digital devices.

Our world needs that and pony rides are a world wide phenomenon. We must, we must keep that beautiful facility for the families of Lis Angeles.

The ponies are well cared for and appropriately housed. The protesters are not horse people and have unrealistic ideas of what equines need to thrive. The ponies are able to socialize and enjoy outdoor time as they are meant to. I'm a lifelong horse person and have always approached the rides with a critical eye, but I find that the ponies are clean, healthy looking, and seem cheerful about their jobs. They have a nice life with their herd.

As an Equestrian who spent many years learning natural horsemanship and equine body language, I feel I should share what I know so that non equestrians might see a glimpse of what we see.

Horses are prey animals. Unlike cats and dogs, our more common predatory companions who may lash out aggressively for reasons beyond fear, true aggression in a horse is almost always the result of neglect or trauma. It's a reaction born out of fear, self preservation, and a lack of trust.

While most people are more familiar with dogs and cats, Horse body language is vastly different from them, and cannot be equated. Horse ears act as little flags on the top of their heads that show much of what is going on in their heads. Relaxed forward or slightly back ears are signs of safety. They say the horse trusts their surroundings and feels comfortable enough to not be on guard or insecure. All of the horses and ponies at the Griffith Park Pony Rides show these exact body language cues. They all feel safe, happy and content.

Another marker of a happy horse is it's behavior. A calm, relaxed horse or pony is a happy horse or pony. Level headed, a phrase we use frequently to refer to people, originated with equestrians in regards to calm horses due to the level way they hold their head when relaxed. A level headed horse is calm and composed, exactly what it means today when speaking about another person.

As for concerns about life span, wild Mustangs only have a life expectancy of 15 years. That said, horses and ponies can live much longer than that in captivity with excellent care, which is exactly what they receive from Steve. Every horse and pony in his care are in excellent body condition and look incredibly healthy.

Now think about what \$5 gets you. Maybe 2 bottles of water? A bag of chips and a soda? A piece of pizza? The cost of a pony ride that Steve is offering is that amount. He is offering an experience to a populous that doesn't often have access to ponies, much less the tack (saddle, saddle pad, halter, brushes, etc) to be able to safely ride them.

Can you think of something that you did when you were younger that cost that much? Maybe it was swimming in a lake, or getting an ice cream on a hot summer day? Experiencing snow for the first time or going to a petting zoo... Do you remember the warmth you felt? It's those sorts of memories we remember as we get older. Please don't steal away such a staple for selfish or falsely informed reasons.

Having a toddler thru COVID when our children had nothing to do, when the park and pony rides finally opened up, I took my son and it was one of the happiest memories coming out of a very dark period. I feel like there are little affordable outdoor activities to spend as a family and our children would be losing an important activity if the pony rides shut down. I feel the pony rides and the petting zoo helped make our Griffith park special. I pray the city can find a way to retain this valuable service to our community.

Support the ponies. Given room to roam, Ada what's food and care. Access for the children too!

I believe the contract for pony rides in Griffith Park should be renewed. The ponies have passed all independent vet checks and the reason given for ending the contract makes no sense. The ponies whose deaths were not reported were NOT part of the working group. Instead, being too old to safely work, they were maintained by the pony ride operator so they could enjoy a safe retirement. NO requirement for the reporting of pony deaths was in the contract. The ponies provide affordable and invaluable access to living creatures for people of modest means. Small children will happily stand in line for an hour for the three times around the arena ride. The look of delight on their faces cannot be compared with anything else...it is sheer joy! The pride of the parents who are able to provide an affordable treat for their children is also important. NO public input was sought before this decision was made by the RAP General Manager who did not visit the pony rides and who did not contact the Los Angeles Equine Advisory Committee, appointed by the Los Angles City Council to address such issues. There is no need to explore other options for this space; the experience provided to children is excellent. The pony ride operator has spent significant amounts of his own money to insure the ponies are well cared for. This attraction is a part of Los Angeles history and service to children which is essential.

I urge you to preserve this important attraction which provides an outstanding experience for the children of Los Angeles and work for ponies who might otherwise fall into unsafe hands. This is a win-win!! Please do not miss this opportunity.

I'd like to thank you so much for making the humane decision to end the pony rides. The ponies, the public, and I are very grateful. I would like to see a non-animal form of family entertainment replace the pony rides. We all know that when money is involved, the welfare of animals is not a concern of the business. I am also concerned about where the ponies will go. I would like to see them go to a reputable sanctuary. It is important that they retire somewhere where they can enjoy the rest of their lives. Thank you. Thank you. You're the best!

Please do not shutdown the pony rides. There is family history there for so many folks. My mother rode them and now my children ride them. These ponies are well cared for and bring so much joy to Los Angeles. And they're affordable. Please don't take this away.

Hi my name is Terry Saucier, I am a 25-year horse-owner writing to ask the Department of Rec & Parks to reconsider and to keep the Griffith Park Pony Rides and Petting Zoo open. The Pony rides at Griffith Park provide children of all income levels the rare opportunity to meet and ride a pony at an affordable price; horseback riding is out of reach for many. The horses and ponies at Steve Week's facility are in excellent condition, well fed, cared for, hoofs regularly trimmed, and they receive regular vet care - as verified in the 2 reports by the independent Veterinarian hired by Rec & Parks. The LA Equestrian Advisory Committee and others with 100s of years of combined horse care experience have sent letters and expressed support for this facility. By ignoring these facts, and choosing to "listen" to the loudest uninformed protesters who are making unfounded claims, using misleading flyers to attract protesters, and bullhorns to shout obscenities at parents and their children that riding is slavery... is not the answer. One has to wonder why this decision was made behind closed-doors without public comment. This lack of transparency and the effort to misrepresent the reason for closing the facility is suspect. If a couple of LA City Councilmembers and Rec and Parks decided they no longer wanted Griffith Park to provide pony rides; then they should have honestly accepted responsibility for this decision and worked with the concessionary to provide plenty of notice so that it could be closed down or re-located in an orderly fashion over an agreed period of time. Instead, the staff are abruptly losing their jobs before the holidays, and these 50+ beautiful ponies are being ripped from their herd and kicked out on the street with less than 3-weeks' notice - this is in itself inhumane and abusive. The horses and the children of LA deserve better.

The closure of the Griffith Park Pony Rides and the proposed carving away of other equestrian activities is a very slippery slope. The Los Angeles Alliance for Animals (LAAA), the group you've now conceded to, does not believe any horse should be ridden. Does this mean the LAPD Mounted Unit will be cancelled? Does this mean the Mounted Park Rangers will be shut down? Do we need to forgo hosting the 2028 Olympics since there are equestrian events? Do we ban horses from the Rose Parade? Does USC need to find a new mascot? Where does RAP and the City draw a line?

I write to you as a lifelong Angeleno who grew up, and my parents still live, in Los Feliz. I am aware of your involvement with the closure of the Griffith Park Pony Rides and it is very disheartening. We should appoint people who speak for our community... not those who bend to an extremist organization run by a woman who has multiple arrests on her record (including domestic violence against her own family including a restraining order against her from THIS October) and lives hours away in San Diego County.

I grew up riding the ponies in Griffith Park - that was my very first exposure to horses. As a child I then attended Summer horse camp at TES in the Los Angeles Equestrian Center. I begged my parents for regular riding lessons and to have a horse, but they could not afford it. They could, however, afford the low price of a ticket at the pony rides. My parents continually told me | could have a horse when | was able to afford it myself. Today, | am 33 and own two of my own horses in the Glendale/Burbank Rancho. I spend over \$20,000 /year at local, small businesses for my horse care and more and more it's feeling like | need to take that money to another city.

Dr. Rachael Sachar - who you all hired to report on the GPPR - is MY PERSONAL EQUINE VET who takes WONDERFUL care of my two horses. I trust her opinion inherently, she is honest and does not sugar coat things. Dr. Rachael expressed to me in person this Fall, while doing dental work on my horse, that the ponies are fine - they are well taken care of. I've read her full report on the facility and it shows that, as well. Out of 33 ponies in work - NONE show signs of lameness. Given most are over 20 years old, that is actually an indicator of how well these horses are cared for. Each of the health items called out in the report are typical regular maintenance items common with horses. Teeth needing floating, some sand in the gut needing clearing, small abrasions. None of the horses requiring further treatment were in work. As well, failure to report the four pony deaths to the city is not an adequate reason to cancel Mr. Week's contract since his contract NEVER stipulated he had to report deaths.

Horses have been domesticated and ridden for OVER 5,000 years. They are hardwired to crave work. If I ONLY let my horses run around in the arena and do not ride them which engages their brains, they end up with pent up energy and turn that into destructive behavior. Think about Border Collies, Australian Shepherds and Heelers - without work, these animals are unhappy. It is similar with horses.

Instead of going after a facility that is already providing a comfortable forever home for 34 healthy ponies (many of which are geriatric) - animal rights activists should be going after direct ship businesses in other states (Bastrop LA Ship Pen, Bowie TX Kill Pen, Stroud OK Kill Pen, Kaufman TX Kill Pen, Lone Star TX Kill Pen). Where horses are shipped out of the country to Canada and Mexico for consumption. Horses are expensive, ponies are expensive - especially so with the steeply rising price of hay and feed. Rehoming 34 ponies means some will slip through the cracks - especially the geriatric ones with health maintenance needs (such as Cushings) - and wind up in the auction/kill pen cycle. They may have adopters lined up now, but I don't trust none of them won't end up at auction down the road.

Honestly, this whole thing feels like a land grab in which RAP did not go through the proper channels. No public comment was allowed prior to the contract not being renewed by Mr. Kim. Our LOCAL petition has over 5,800 signature in only ONE WEEK. Zohra Fahim's petition has been up for over a year and only has 1,800 LOCAL supporters. The 82,000 number is misleading as the MASS of those signing are NOT from Los Angeles. Shouldn't you be listening to the voices of the people who put you in your positions?? I'm sure you all already had something in mind to put at the location prior to cancelling Mr. Week's contract. Allowing public comment now on what should go there is just covering your asses after already mishandling this.

I am just so, so disappointed.

Please keep the ponies. There is evidence that the protestors against the rides were paid and accusations about the animals false.

Keep the ponies in Griffith Park. They ARE well cared for. This is ridiculous

I am a horse lover and horse owner. No one wants to see ponies suffer but these protestors are not horse people! They don't know how to read a horse's behavior. People who don't know equine care tend to anthropomorphize them in human terms. "Oh their head is hanging down they must be sad." No they are resting and calm and content. These ponies are lucky. They are well fed and catered for. Their feet are trimmed. They get to exercise everyday with easy walking and trotting carrying little children. They are older because an older horse is a safer horse for children. They are checked for health by vets Iden. Their teeth are taken care of so they can eat well. If they need medicines, they get them. I am almost 70. I went there as a child. My children also rode the ponies and now my grandchildren! Before Steve Weeks took over 6 years ago, I did notice that the ponies needed some attentionsome of their feet needed trimming. Steve has done a fine job. He has horse trainers to train the ponies. His workers seem to love the ponies and of course, the children love to ride them. I am a filmmaker and I was there a week ago to see for myself. These are important because this is often a child's first chance to be on a pony and feel the joy of petting them and being close to them. I know for me it certainly began a lifelong live of horses. Horses are intuitive and empathic. They take care of the little ones. Horses are used for therapy in many programs. They develop bonds with people and healing can happen. You can talk to a horse and feel better. These ponies have a job. It's so much healthier for them to be useful. In the wild they would be eaten. It's about respect. We house them and feed them and take care of them and in return they give joy! Please don't take this away from children. They need real interaction with animals in a safe place. As long as the animals are loved and taken care of, that's what I care about. I live in shadow hills in an equestrian community. We all don't want to see this precious resource for all families shut down! I talked to a trainer who talked to a young protestor who said she knew nothing about horses but that she told to show up and yell to the parents and kids and she would be paid \$25 an hour! If the pony rides get shut down, what's next? Rental stables, horse shows, even an individual horse owner. Is it abuse to ride a horse? The fact that they trust us to be in their backs is a big deal. Horses are prey animals. They are food for lions! You develop trust and it's a very rewarding experience. There are many therapeutic riding places - to help veterans suffering from PTSD to paraplegics who when walking on a horse whose stride mimics the way humans walk helps their bodies and their minds heal. If a horse is unhappy, its ears will go back. There's a saying in horsemanship - it's never the horse- always the rider If's horse bucks, they are trying to tell you something. The saddle hurts it something isn't right. I haven't seen any pony acting up. They like doing what they do! Thank you. Please keep the pony rides open and available to the public!

I would like to see the pony rides continue to remain operational. This has always been a great activity for children, and a true asset for Griffith Park.

The Griffith Park Pony Rides needs to stay at GP but become a 2.0 version, just like the LA Zoo upgraded to a 2.0. After 74 years, it deserves a upgrade. In addition to a permanent shade cover, interactive educational elements for ages 3 to 7 about ponies, colors, breed, what they eat where they are globally could be easily incorporated. Most of all the birthday party areas can be made more private with vegetation screens to block any protesters on bullhorn making little kids cry.

Having access to GPPR is also a social economic divide issue. If you are a rich 4 years old, your parents will be able to put you into lessons at \$75 to ride an old pony on a lunge line. You can see how many inner city kids and families come for S5 to have a ride.

The pony rides at Griffith Park are a part of Los Angeles history and have been a huge part of my family's life. I cannot imagine Griffith park without the rides, which give many children who would never have access to horses a chance to ride one for the first time! The horses are loved and treated well.

The pony ride has been a mainstay of Griffith Park for many years now, bringing joy to many children. To replace it with something else, because of an arrogant and ignorant activist, is a disservice to the community at large. I think the concession should be reinstated, by another pony ride contractor, if the current one has dissolved his contract. All the facilities are in place, thus saving the taxpayers additional funds for "new entertainment".

I am writing in favor of keeping the pony rides at Griffith Park operational. This is a unique and popular activity that enables kids to be around and interact with large animals, in particular horses. It is also the only low-cost horse riding option for kids in LA. The current pony ride has met or exceeded all animal control and vet inspections. Please renew this on-going park tradition.

The Griffith Park Pony Rides are not only a staple of Los Angeles, but a necessity for the health and well-being of its residents. While it is tempting to rest on the laurels of the attraction's longevity – over 7 decades – providing entertainment for generations of Angelinos, what remains unsaid amidst the false accusations of animal cruelty and unsupported claims of neglect, is the large, positive, impact that the long-standing animal interactions specifically have on Los Angeles' minority groups.

Los Angeles contains neighborhoods disproportionately affected by poverty, which encompasses a lack of/limited access to healthcare, mental health resources, education, let alone pony rides. With horseback-riding starting at \$50-\$125 in LA, the \$5 pony rides at Griffith Park are the most affordable way for families of any background to experience horseback-riding for the first time. With LA County's poverty rate being 26% higher than any other county in California (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health; January 2013), \$5 pony rides are one of the cheapest sports that provide physical exercise while also supporting the reduction of economic inequality.

According to the previously cited "How Social and Economic Factors Affect Health" document, a healthy LA County depends on assuring that everyone in every community has a healthy start to life, through childhood development programs and opportunities for social engagement. In terms of childhood physical health, the Griffith Park Pony Rides offer the benefits of improved cardiovascular health, core strength, calorie-burning, the lowering of blood pressure, aiding decision-making, and enabling relaxation. When the U.S. spends more than twice the average of other industrialized countries on healthcare – 18.3% of the GDP in 2021, as stated in the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' "National Health Expenditure Data" Fact Sheet – the \$5 pony rides offer a very low-cost alternative.

Parent.com recently released an article noting that, "teens who had contact with horses had lower afternoon cortisol levels and lower total cortisol concentration per waking hour at the study's end compared to the teens on the waitlist. The results suggest that regular contact with horses may help reduce stress levels and promote healthy outcomes for teens [131 teens participated in the study, with 53 teens randomly allocated to the 11-week horse activity program and 60 teens placed on a waitlist to act as the control group]" (ParentCo., September 20, 2022). Lower cortisol levels translate to a reduction in stress and anxiety in the body.

It is not merely the mental well-being of children and teens affected; specifically, the Latinx community – LA's largest population – is being inadvertently targeted with this call for closure decision. The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) touches on the community's "Barriers To Mental Health Care": Hispanic/Latinx communities show similar vulnerability to mental illness as the general population, but they face disparities in both access to and quality of treatment. More than half of Hispanic young adults ages 18-25 with serious mental illness may not receive treatment. This inequality puts these communities at a higher risk for more severe and persistent forms of mental health conditions, because without treatment. mental health conditions often worsen.

35.1% of Hispanic/Latinx adults with mental illness receive treatment each year compared to the U.S. average of 46.2%. This is due to many unique barriers to care. Plainly put, closing the rides disproportionally hurts Mexican-American workers as almost all are of Latinx/Mexican heritage. Mexican-American comprise a large amount of pony riders. This is likely due to the intrinsic connection between their cultural heritage and equines. A Whittier Daily News article updated in 2017 illustrated how horses are a cultural link for Mexican immigrants: "For some, owning and riding horses is so imbedded in their culture that they do everything they can to maintain a sense of country living in the concrete world of Los Angeles County."

Many workers like [Carlos] Fernandez[, 52] living in Los Angeles County...earn low to average wages [to] squirrel away their money in order to own a horse. That's because riding and being a charro, or Mexican cowboy, is part of the pride and heritage they bring to America. [...] For people of humble beginnings from ranches in Mexico, being able to ride a horse and teach their American-born children how to properly ride is a matter of pride.

Even 200 vaqueros were seen riding through the streets of Compton on September 20, 2020. A Frontiers in Public Health article published in 2017 explained how "Horseback Riding Improves the Ability to Cause the Appropriate Action (Go Reaction) and the Appropriate Self-control (No-Go Reaction) in Children":

There are many obvious health benefits to riding, including developing a strong core and legs, but there are also many less obvious benefits, such as increased confidence and introspection. Few studies have addressed the effects of horseback riding on children and the mechanisms underlying how riding affects humans. We examined the effects of horseback riding on the ability to distinguish Go/No-go tasks and solve arithmetic problems in children.

The result: "Riding on a half-breed horse or a pony improved the ability to perform Go/No-go tasks and solve arithmetic problems, possibly through sympathetic activity." This is important because "self-control has been shown to be one of the most robust correlates of a wide variety of measures of crime, deviance, and violent behavior" (Cambridge University Press, 30 July 2018). Citing all these reputable sources and recent studies further indicates that the closure of the pony rides will only do the community more harm than good. By having a known place for children to learn self-control at an affordable price in the community, the City of LA may be preventing juveniles from entering the "school-to-prison pipeline".

Regarding more harm than good, what originated the call for closure was the concern for Griffith Park's treatment of their animals. A readily available report by Dr. Rachael Ostrom Sachar (of the Twin Oaks Equine Veterinary Services) written on December 8, 2021 and subsequent progress report filed in April 4, 2022, illustrate that while changes need to be made in order to improve working animal conditions – specifically pertaining to climate change-affected aspects of their care/surroundings – the ponies are in healthy condition. Any suggestions made have been acknowledged and are in the process of changing for the better.

Ultimately, at the tail-end of a pandemic that wrecked small businesses at great cost to the city's revenue and morale, taking away one source of merriment for children craving distraction and normalcy is cruel in and of itself. What ought to be proposed instead is developing a timeline for Griffith Park to further improve the condition of the Pony Rides, rather than pull the rug from underneath them altogether. With so many issues plaguing LA City Council meetings, let this be one aspect they need not worry about on their docket. The pony rides are essential to Griffith Park. They provide thousands of children the experience of petting and riding a horse that may never get an opportunity to do so. The majority of children that come to enjoy the ponies are lower income families that wouldn't be able to afford otherwise. The pony rides are beloved by thousands and many generations and you are willing to throw that away for a handful of crazy people that have no experience with horses. I was there the other day and spoke with a few and of the protestors and they admitted to having absolutely no equine education and very limited experience of being around horses. But they felt the horses looked unhappy. I have read the vet report from your vet and she stated the ponies and that they all met state required health. Steve has implemented every item that has been requested of him. So lets stop lying and tell us the truth behind the shut down.

I have been told you want the equestrian community input but yet you did not even go to your advisory committee before making this decision. Nor did you come to the horse community to ask for our input. Worse yet you didn't go to the people that use the pony rides the most, the kids and their families.

You can close Steve down but we will not stop fighting to have the pony rides back. It is time for you to stand up against the bullies and do what is right for the kids and the community REINSTATE the pony rides and give Steve the contract.

These ponies are our friends. They've been with us, members of the community, since many of us were small, when the world was simple, and good things were easy to discern. Sharing enrichment with the ponies, and our loved ones, in nature is good, but to displace these living beings to lesser spaces is clearly wrong, it's harmful. The hurt will resonate in all involved, but especially in those who have the power to make a better choice. To sleep blissfully at night, protect the good in these animal's lives, protect the warmth and love they have and deserve until only nature says it's time. Thank you, friend. Until we meet again.

From what I have heard, none of leases for the Griffith Park Pony Rides required reporting horse deaths and to use that as a reason to close the venue seems unfair. The whole Recreation and Parks Committee is not in favor of closing this venue and yet they are being disregarded as are the thousands of people who have come forward in favor of the pony rides. Please please listen to the people and not the fanatics who know nothing about horses.

Please reconsider this. These horses are well cared for & treated respectfully n humanely. This is a cherished family activity in GP that should not go away any time soon. Please hear your public & keep the ponies!

I strongly feel that the Griffith Park Pony Rides and petting zoo remain open for a number of reasons. I have read the extensive documentation (PDFs, inspection reports etc) on your website and it seems like Mr Weeks, the concession owner was in FULL compliance, and the only thing he was remiss on was timely notification of the sale or death of a number of horses. The veterinary reports show no current issues - Any issues pointed out were fixed.

HOWEVER, nowhere does it say that Mr Weeks was given ANY sort of explicit information with a timeline to do such notifications OR the given the opportunity to fix the issue - so it feels like he is having his long time business closed due to the park not being clear about its desire for notification. It seems like you are finding a technicality: he was not told to do this with timeline at any point in the past.

This concession has been open for 74 years and so many animals have died over that time - you know: natural process of things, and this has not been an issue up to now - Why now and why terminate a lease without giving Mr Weeks any chance to rectify this situation? Especially considering that it was not brought up by the park as an issue in the past. It feels like the park has an agenda to close this and has found an excuse to do so.

ALSO: The petting zoo WITH NO VIOLATIONS is also being swept up in this and closing even though it has NO violations.

I recommend they continue operations but have your needs for notification be made in a clear way in writing. I - and many many others - would hate to see such a lovely experience for families (many low income and many who rarely if ever get to see live animals) that has been a part of the Griffith Park experience for so long.

EVERY CHILD, regardless of their financial situation, should have access to this experience! Also, the animals benefit as well The people need their park, the people need the pony rides and the people need their petting zoo - They need to connect in reality and not on a screen with this vital cultural resource.

Please give them the opportunity to fix their errors and continue! The families of Los Angeles need this to continue!

Please reconsider keeping this business open. I am a veterinarian and have worked in the horse industry as well since I was a small child and had my own ponies. Horses and ponies, in general, need basic things to be happy and feel loved....safety, shelter, food and water, and human touch and interaction in this domesticated world they now live in. This notion, that animal rights extremists are suggesting, that all animals should be "free" is essentially a death sentence to domesticated animals in the world today. Bottomline, horses and ponies are expensive to care for and they are animals that need to move and essentially, even in normal free ranging circumstances, they need to work to forage for their own food and shelter. Their "work" to give children pony rides offers many benefits to themselves as well as the human benefits of interacting with the ponies.

The ponies that are commonly aging and may be sent to meat market or euthanized otherwise are given care and love, food and water, shelter, etc in exchange for some walking and little trotting while carrying a small child. The movement and brushing, handling and general care is good for the ponies well-being and we literally could write an entire book on the benefits that the human-horse bond has on children and adults alike.

Perhaps rather than closing down the business completely, the city should agree to evaluate and monitor the care of the ponies with an individual qualified to do so. Place some rules and restrictions on the business such as no pony rides when > 98 degrees or each pony not to be out working for > certain number of rides or hours each day. Have a veterinarian evaluate soundness, fitness of ponies to perform their minimal duties...maybe put age restriction on their duties such as those > 20- 22 years of age just become part of pony petting population. Maybe suggest business has animal handling classes so these children, living in a city, have some opportunities to learn about animals and how to care for them and they can charge a small fee for those classes to help cover the ponies expenses, etc.

Animals are costly to care for but having a light duty " job" is both good for them physically and mentally and gives them a way to live out their lives amongst other pony friends too. They are herd animals. I think this business is extremely beneficial for ponies and humans alike especially within the confines of a city....just find a few ways to ensure they are receiving proper care and parameters to abide by to ensure their well being is always considered within normal standards of animal care. Stop cow towing and listening to a few extremist and loud radical voices suggesting that the ponies should be given "freedom". These extreme groups are literally creating a death sentence for these animals while they ignorantly think they are protecting them because they have no understanding what the animals really need for a healthy and happy life. Keep the pony rides. They are a Los Angeles institution.

Especially during the holiday season, it's important to think about all members of our community because animals just are like us. They love their families and, as they get old and retire, having the stability of a good, safe, place to be with their tribe gives them comfort and love in their old age. We know that ponies are extraordinarily social animals.

For over 70 years The Griffith Park Pony Rides has accepted ponies from all races and walks of life. They have been a sanctuary, and, more notably, a home. And as of my last memory they have over 30 - some of which have been there with their pony family for decades.

Christmas is a hard time for local horse people and other environments that would have the ability to take these animals in. If a pony is sent to the North or the Midwest it can die of the weather or suffer frostbite, not having a furry enough coat grown for that climate. If it is sent to a new owner it can suffer from unintended neglect. If it's sent to a sanctuary run by so-called animal rights or welfare groups then it can legally be killed without recourse when it no longer makes a suitable sob story profit for the location.

It is exceptionally cruel to rip these animals from their families, to send them away from their comfortable home to an unfamiliar place, to separate them in a state of hysteria and duress, where, like elders forgotten, they have neither family, joy, occupation, or the security of home. Make no mistake, ponies scream, sometimes for weeks, when they are taken from their herd. It causes real pain and suffering to them, sometimes leading to death.

I believe Steve Weeks has done an excellent job based on his compassionate care of the ponies including many elderly ponies who have life long "retirement" plans even after they are not longer able to be ridden. How nice it would be if most elderly people had the same attention, medical care and comfort in their golden years as his ponies do! Steve's years of service to the city bringing children joy and connection to nature and his quick attention to any and all concerns addressed by the 3rd party vet inspecting the ponies' care shows he is truly committed to the outstanding health and welfare of his ponies. I believe the park's knee jerk reaction to fanatic animal activist extremism is shameful. Dear Friends at Parks and Recreation, I wanted to take a moment and echo my support for keeping the equestrian projects at Griffith Park. The Pony Rides have been a cornerstone of the community, often giving children in our community a rare first experience with these animals. Being able to interact with these beautiful animals in the middle of our urbanized city is an important link to our past and to honoring the role these animals have played in lives, both past and present. There must be a humane way to keep a balance where the animals are happy, well maintained and able to interact with people in a meaningful way. There are well documented studies showing the connection and access to horses and ponies at a young age (Re: https://equineassistedtherapyaustralia.com.au/wp-content/uploads/2020/06/Equine-Assisted-Therapy-and-its-Impact-on-Cortisol-Levels-of-Children-and-Hota-Analysis.pdf) as an important stimulation to child development and maintains healthy cortisol levels in the animals themselves.

I believe we want to find a safe transition for the pony rides, protecting the animals and finding a way that this can be to keep this experience in our community in some form.

This is an 80-year-old tradition Griffith Park and dates back to Gene Autry in the Griffith Park area. This has been handled poorly by LA Parks and recreation since this is a one-sided decision. This should be handled with historical importance and proper representation from the public in favor of this tradition. The equestrian community is strong and knowledgeable in Los Angeles. I am in my sixties and have vivid and fond memories of the pony experience as a child and carried with me through my lifetime.

Instead, the woke leftist were paid \$25.00 per hour to protest the old ponies that were taken exceptional care of. When I visited Griffith Park last week, the protestors really didn't know why they were hired and told to scream "animal cruelty". The contrary. These geriatric horses were given an important task to fulfill in the last years of their life.

I patiently have been waiting for a response.

I am sad to learn that the City is considering not renewing the lease for the Griffith Park ponies. My daughter had an opportunity to ride the ponies, but my son (born not long before the pandemic) never has, and I will be very disappointed if it is closed. They provide a crucial outdoor activity for families of all income levels. I feel that removing the pony rides sets a very concerning precedent, that if a few people are rude enough and scream loudly enough, the city will listen, regardless of whether your are correct, and regardless of what the rest of the community thinks. If you have legitimate reasons for not renewing the contract, you should say what they are. Instead it looks like you caved to pressure from extremists.

Thank you so much for shutting this horrible place down. Horses do not deserve to be treated like that. To see their sad spirits broken like that was just unbearable at time. I hope they go to sanctuaries and away from that horrible owner.

As a child, I was taken on a pony ride (not at Griffith Park). It can be a great experience that can get children used to ponies & horses. I hope there is a way to provide pony or horse rides in a way that's fair and humane to the animals.

It sounds like the concessionaire made some serious errors, such as the lack of dental care. After the initial report came out, they improved the pony rides but not enough. Maybe a more humane and trustworthy concessionaire could be selected. While animal rights advocates can alert us to abuses, >>>I don't think decisions should be made just to placate people who may be philosophically opposed to ANY riding on horses or ponies or any keeping of animals in captivity.<<<

In addition to humane pony rides, a petting zoo might be good if it was okay for the animals.

Maybe kids could be taught how to care for animals? Maybe the city could partner with 4H and which older kids could learn to raise or care for animals, such as ponies? (Not that there's room for a full-on farm there.)

Finally, an interactive exhibit could educate kids about how animals live in the wild.

It's clear by all the reports and by visual confirmation that the ponies were and are well cared for. That being said, if you did not want to renew the contract, why did you not go out to RFP for a new concessionaire? The fact that you closed the whole operation for something that you said was not required (reporting on deceased ponies) tells me there is something fishy going on. Perhaps you are embarrassed now to walk back your decision but I think it will exhibit courage to say you acted too quickly without all the facts. Pretty amazing that low income families can take their kids to connect to a horse for \$5. 70% of the 200,000 tickets sold each year are to low income families.

Keep in mind that the majority of the people who want this closed do not understand horses. Perhaps they mean well but I can promise you they don't know what they are talking about. If we accept what they are saying, that animals should not be for our enjoyment, then we need to close the zoo, and we need to donate all of our pets to a pet sanctuary.

We live in a democratic society where the voices of the people are heard, but to a allow one person to make a decision that would have an impact on so many children without consulting the general public is an outcry. I see this as having a dictator in public office. I request this issue to be instated on the Los Angeles City Council calendar and for the voices of Angelinos to be heard.

I am writing to express my shock and disappointment in the decision not to renew the permit for the Griffith Park Ponies.

The decision seems to be based solely on the efforts of an extreme radical group. Based on the reports from the independent consultant there is no evidence that the animals are being mis-treated. The independent consultant hired by the parks department found "the working conditions to be satisfactory and did not witness any gross violations related to the care or the treatment of the animals on exhibit". The letter to Mr. Weeks wherein he is informed of the decision to shut this beloved landmark down confirms such. And upon reinspection, the consultant noted numerous recommended improvements had been made and stated in her conclusions that "the improvements and ongoing changes made to the operations of the pony rides, including new policies and practices, meet the current legal standards set forth by California Health and Safety Code 25998-Standards for Horses for Hire and Animal Welfare Act".

The reason stated for deciding to shut down Mr. Week's business and a treasured activity for Angelinos is because he failed to report the death of some of the ponies. The statement that the "lack of communication" is the reason for not renewing the contract contradicts the fact that no notice is required. Essentially what the city has done is punish this organization even though they are operating within the established standards and requirements.

I note that no time wasted no time in calling for replacement concessions, and in a city plagued with corruption it makes me wonder if there is some ulterior motive in shutting down the Griffith Park Pony Rides. Does the committee already have someone they plan to replace this historic establishment? Perhaps a developer that helped fund the PAID protesters?

I urge you to reverse your decision. Look at the facts, not the propaganda of a small group of protesters who don't even live in the community. Save this long-standing beloved attraction. Do not take away the only opportunity that some children have to interact with animals where they their experiences can develop into a lifetime of caring about animals. Do the right thing - Save the ponies!

As a lifelong Angelino, I remember enjoying the Griffith Park pony rides as a child. It was one of my few interactions with animals growing up in an large city setting. As an adult, I have worked with animals and veterans, children, and formerly incarcerated peoples in a PTSD treatment setting. The bond that can be established between humans and our animal relatives is priceless. However of course that interaction must occur in a healthy and nurturing environment. There is no comparison, as was suggested on the special meeting call today 12/15/22, between humans and machines vs humans and animals. Very troubling was the process of closure by LA City staff. This was NOT a transparent process, per city standards and protocol. With the history of political abuses against the communities of Los Angeles as well as the most recent egregious actions of some city council members it is most important at this time that the future of pony rides/ animal-human interaction at the Griffith Park space be a transparent one that allows for professionals in fields relevant to making a decision about pony rides get a seat at the table to offer their professional expertise. Lots of talk about how to develop the future of the space, that talk must include under what conditions, if deemed as a worthy operation by professionals, the pony rides could return. Anything short of that is a blatant show of caving in to those that oppose the rides, and based on much of the public discourse, the opposition is based in non factual arguments as they relate to our animal relatives and how we can go about having healthy interactions. Hello, and I encourage you to maintain these rides open. The children, the adults need contact with nature, with these majestic animals that we cannot have in our homes. I have ridden since the age is 6, mostly rental horses and it has brought joy and a love of nature as I walked through the surrounding world and given me a sense of love and responsibility for animals. I am currently a biologist and that wouldn't have been possible, hadn't it been for horses. Please reconsider.

Please keep the Pony Rides open!

The concession has been there 74 years! The experience of riding ponies is a unique, healthy, outdoor for all the young children to enjoy. The rides service a large local community. Adding an educational component would be easy.

It is a shame to close this special attraction just as people are getting out and enjoying the outdoors. It is a shame to take away part of the Griffith Park history.

I have watched the pony rides every weekend for the past year. I see that this tired old concession is not an asset to the children and certainly not to the animals. I have a vision of that entire space re-imagined and providing true enrichment for children. We could have lessons, otherwise unaffordable, for many families, to truly teach skills such as: art, dance, martial arts, musical theater, gymnastics, etc. We could set up a beautiful learning center where children could develop a skill and build self esteem, so when parents say "good job" it won't be just for sitting their behinds on a miserable horses back and riding in a circle, but for actually accomplishing something. I have shared my vision with many parents at the concession, and all were extremely supportive and would be excited to join. It could be affordable and bring in considerably more funds for our city, while providing a great opportunity for children. Sometimes it's necessary to say "good-bye" to an antiquated activity whose time has passed. I have just listened to the two-hour public comment and have to rebut some of the statements made by the pro-pony ride callers:

1) So many have stated how important it is for children to

"interact" with animals. As a person who has watched the pony rides every weekend for over a year, I can tell you for sure that there is barely any interaction at all. Child after child is set on a tethered pony in the turnstile for the purpose of a photo/video-op, often screaming and reaching for their parent. The child never looks that horse in the face before or after the monotonous ride or is encouraged to even say "Thank you". I have documented it at between 90 to 95 percent of parents who just take their child off the horse and carry him/her out the gate, with out a glance at the horse. Please go check it out.

- 2) These pony ride enthusiasts state that Stephen Weeks "loves" his ponies and there was no neglect, yet the independent veterinarian assessment reported saddle sores that couldn't heal because of constant irritation, untreated dental conditions, and depression. Before any activists ever showed up or even knew Zohra Fahim, she stood and unobtrusively monitored the pony rides every weekend for two months. She has plenty of video of unhappy, abused animals. The turnstile ponies were often not given even one water break for the entire seven hours of walking in circles in 98 degree heat -- this was July-August of 2021. It was only after animal advocates showed up with protest signs in September that the ponies began getting water twice a day, and the staff made sure they broadcasted it over the loud speaker that "the ponies are now having their water break" -- damage control -- too late. Actions speak louder than words -- they do not "love" the ponies. It's about sending as many people through the line as possible -- like an assembly line -- \$\$\$\$5\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$
- 3) I recently witnessed Luna, a pony who still has a dram of spirit left in her, refuse to walk the turnstile and shook her head from side to side in protest. The staff member pulled her forward by the face until she had to walk. After this happened several times, she finally violently reared her head backwards attempting to free herself from that horrible device. Only then, when I said, "Take her off! This is not safe for her or the children!", did they finally lead her back to the corral.
- 4) It was also stated by those who support the rides that the horses are "so happy to come out and be with the children". Not so! However, any honest person will tell you that when the time gets close to 4:30 p.m., even those depressed ponies, in a state of learned helplessness, perk up a bit, because they instinctively know that they will be able to be untethered from the horrid turnstile an be able to go back to the corral and away from all the noisy humans. They ALL want to be free from what they are forced to do day in and day out. Some of those elderly ponies walk as if arthritic and in awful pain. I think one of those couldn't stand it anymore and died, because I didn't see him anymore.

What is amazing is that there are actually humans, who share this planet with us, who can look at those ponies -- especially those who walk in circles all day, shortly tethered to the turnstile, and actually state that this is not abuse and that the horses are not suffering. I have empathy for humans and all living beings, and I can tell you those horses are NOT happy to face their days.

As a society evolves, decisions can be a bit painful for some. Growth is messy, but meaningful change is necessary with the evolution of human consciousness. Thank you for being on the right side of history. How ridiculous it would be to open pony rides again after closing one down. There are many other options for child/family enrichment in that space, without including live animals. There are already three local sanctuaries where children can be taught properly how to truly engage with animals -- happy animals. Please rep

I am in favor of keeping the pony rides in Griffith Park. While I understand the need for diversity in recreational activities, children modernly do not get a lot of hands-on time with animals, and the pony rides here ensure that children of all socioeconomic backgrounds get to enjoy interaction with animals, something that many kids in disadvantaged homes cannot get elsewhere. For many of us, pony rides were a formative experience that allowed us to connect with animals outside of dogs and cats, and I personally found such experiences enriching enough to pursue a career in veterinary medicine. I would hate to see kids today robbed of such an emotional experience that might dictate their futures and at the very minimum, enrich their spirits.

Griffin Park's ponies are well cared for and I believe that the pony rides provide a valuable function for the park and the ponies. Furthermore, "cancelling a Vendor's contract with the city for not reporting on animal deaths due to extreme old age, when no such requirement had ever been required of that Vendor is not in good faith, and disturbing. How can a person know to do a task that they have not been asked to do? Punishing the pony ride under the guise of "lack of transparency" to the *city* not being transparent to the Vendor of its expectations is ironic at best, and negligent and punitive at worst.

I am requesting that the Griffith Park Ponies remain open. The protestors don't understand anything about the condition of the ponies or most importantly what will happen to these older ponies after this is shut down. This is a place that all families enjoy coming to and bringing their kids to learn about all different types of animals. It is a great introduction into ponies and horses for small young kids and it was something I grew up doing myself. I hope you reconsider and allow these amazing family business to remain open instead of listening to a few crazy protestors.

I grew up in the greater Los Angeles area and spent many weekends as a child visiting my aunt and uncle who live in Los Filez. We would enjoy time in Griffith park riding the train and also the pony's. Now that I'm an adult I've had the pleasure of watching the joy on my niece and nephews face as they ride the pony's similar to the way my cousins and I did. Please don't get rid of this beautiful experience. So many fun memories made for kids who would never have the exposure or opportunity to be around such magnificent creatures. I still have a love for horse because of this experience.

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Growing up we used to ride these ponies. As someone who lived in a suburban area, the opportunity to come close and interact with them was such an important and nostalgic memory for me and my sisters. This was a valuable experience for people who can't afford to have a horse. I love seeing the joy it brings to my niece and nephew and always looked forward to bringing my future child here. I will be devastated if this closes for good. This would be a huge loss to the LA culture and heritage.

Our family has lived in Los Feliz since 1948. Our entire extended family is now close to 50 people. We are all shocked at the decision to close down the pony rides.

They have been a tradition in our family going back three generations. I still have photos of me riding a pony when I was two. The pony ride was even more popular than the train. It was an integral of our childhoods. I am a supporter of animal rights. However, riding horses is not an exotic or abusive tradition. We never saw any signs of abuse or neglect over the decades. I hope this terrible decision can be reversed. There are many critical issues in our city that demand our attention and action. The pony rides is not one of them. Please undo this as soon as possible.

Please keep the pony rides. My three off spring all enjoyed it and remember it even though it was many years ago when they were young. It truly has been a bright spot for Los Angeles in this current sanctuary city crime infested jungle.

As a 7th generation angelino, (My ancestor was an early mayor, William Henry Workman, who not only established the parks and library system, he was the City Treasurer who brought the water to Los Angeles)

growing up in Los Angeles, the pony rides were the highlight of my young life!

Being able to afford this very special occasion for a low-income family was a very big deal! They were my first experience with horses, before we could afford anything like riding lessons or summer camp, or any of those things that cost so much more money for a young family.

They inspired my love and work for horses, which still continues locally in the area, I figure that I spend more than \$100,000 a year in local horse events and the local horse community.

Without the pony rides inspiration, I would not be here to spend all that money every single year for most of 55 years now.

I know that this is the case for most of the equestrians who grew up in Los angeles, the pony rides were such a big deal to us, and inspired us to continue our lives involved with

I bought a pony from the pony rides rides when I was 14 years old, and that was the first time that I had seen the behind the scenes space. I still continue to help people purchase or rehome the ponies from the rides and thus, and able to actually see and handle the ponies, which are very much loved and always in better condition than in most sanctuaries. The current operator, Steve weeks, does not abandon them in old age, and as the operator of a business that has existed for 74 years, obviously there have been many many many aged ponies to have come and gone. He keeps them until the end of their lives, in a space where they are happy, comfortable, loved, and very well cared for.

The most importent thing about losing the pony rides, is that the low-income, and people of color, the demographics that make up 71% of the Los Angeles population, would be completely disenfranchised from ever having the opportunity to love a pony in their young lives. I can't tell you how important Ponies are to Young children, and how are young children supposed to be allowed to have something so special, if it is removed? Local Equestrian activities are BILLIONS in local revenue and encompass many, many small and large businesses.

It must be noted that the small group of protesters is an out of town organized group. They are not Angelinos. They have not grown up anywhere near the pony rides, nor do they care about them. They have suggested that they be rehomed to sanctuaries, when their home is already a sanctuary. And, many of the sanctuaries on their list, are wildlife sanctuaries where the ponies will be used as food for the lions and tigers and wolves. This is important to me. They should be allowed to live out their lives where they are loved and cared for in a home they know.

Unfortunately the Los Angeles Recreation and Parks was overly influenced by a very small, non-local, but rather violent group, they have been arrested for threats of violence, they have sent death threats to Steve weeks!

Zahra Fahim currently has orders of protection against her for violence!

They have been arrested for threatening to punch a pregnant patron of the pony rides! we cannot allow these extremist groups to take over and ruin the enjoyment of 71% of the Los Angeles population! To me, this is a racist and elitist attack on the Multicultural and multiracial makeup of the city of Los angeles! Horses have always been an important part of Los angeles, as is the multiracial diversity that is welcomed here.

I'm sure everyone at KPCC knows that the original 17 citizens of Los Angeles were mostly people of color, only thre were white. The pony rides are one of the few things available to low income people of color, and must be allowed to stay.

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I am against the closing of the Griffith Park Pony Rides. I am a 60 year old woman and was first exposed to equestrians as a child at the pony rides at Griffith Park over 55 yeats ago. As a latina, my parents could not afford lessons or even less to buy or keep a horse for me.

But because of the exposure to the pony rides, I went on to develope a love of horses and that encouraged me to get a college degree so I could afford my passion. I now own 3 beautiful horses. I also exposed my son when he was young to the ponies and have wonderful memories and pictures. Please do not deny other young children from experiencing equines. This is such a great way for exposing under priveledged children to horses at a very low cost. I am in support of keeping the Griffith Park Pony Rdes open. Many of us started our love for horses with those ponies and it grew where we ourselves became horse owners. These ponies provide a therpeutic service to our youth just like a seeing eye dog provides a service to the blind. Yes, they are working animals. I work, my husband works, and you are there working. Ponies get paid with the food they eat, they get medical and dental coverage, they get hugs and love from the children, they get pedicures or new shoes every 6 to 8 weeks. And just like some people that when they retire, they get lost or depressed with nothing to do. Keep the Griffith Park Pony Rides open.

There are really two issues here; abuse of power and denying the low income community residents of a service that has served and changed the lives of thousands of children.

GM Jimmy Kim, without discussing the issue with RAP or the Equine Advisory Committee made an abrupt and thoughtless personal decision ripping a community resource and eliminating jobs during the holiday season. Going against veterinarian advice, and without consulting the community he "serves". When he was questioned, he made up the reason due to the death of a 38 year old pony (this would be equivalent to a 120 year old human passing away), despite his own words stating "The operator is not required to notify the City of deceased animals." (Jimmy Kim) Best case he is lying, worst case it was an intentional set up. Neither are desired of an employee of the city in such a high power position where transparency, trust, and integrity are of the utmost importance. This is tyranny, not leadership.

Mr. Kim rudely declined an opportunity to transfer the business. For a public official to be so dismissive can't be tolerated, and only shows his personal issues or ulterior motives.

The second issue is the removal of an important fixture of Los Angeles providing an affordable service to underserved children, families and children with disabilities. By removing this 74 year tradition from generations of Los Angelians is heartless, cruel,

and only highlights of ignorance of needs of our community. If the goal was to elevate the experience, this could have been done without robbing the families of the existing service. Hundreds of children were looking forward to spending their Christmas break with the ponies they love. A transition is the least that everyone deserved.

One last thought. As this story was exposed to the equestrian community, one thing I kept hearing from equine professionals, including veterinarians, an Olympic rider, an equine therapist, etc. is that they all received their start and love of horses at this pony ride. Imagine all of the lives they've touched and inspired due to that love and dedication. It's the seed of passion planted there that is reflected to the world in countless ways. This decision will negatively affect generations to follow. Horses are healers, and save lives.

Having kids being able to interact with horses is so rare in LA. It builds connection with animals, community building with other riders, responsibility to take care of another living thing and courage. The large stables are to expensive for most kids but pony rides is a affordable introduction to horses. Please save the pony rides!

My allowance for the continued existence of the pony ride & livestock concession is Conditional. After reading Dr Sachar's progress report#2, I urge the powers that be to contractually MANDATE the continued INSPECTIONS at quarterly intervals to hold the concessioner accountable to maintain the recommended improvements, as well as MANDATE the timely provision of comprehensive Veternary Reports as to cause of (any) death(s). The animal welfare depends upon a watch-dog enforcement to 'encourage' consistent compliance. In addition, as recommended in the report "it would be of greater value to the community for the concession to incorporate educational opportunities to the public." This is the ONLY condition that makes an animal's sacrifice of value. Young people should be EDUCATED that animals are not just here for our amusements. It wouldn't take much to add an educational VERBAL (no cost) component. And for a minimal cost: photographic, video, or other media could complement any verbal presentation—much like educational tools employed for children in museums. Children could also 'adopt' a pony for the day and learn about/participate in their grooming, feeding, healthcare. And learn about equine ancestry and their Wild counterparts sustainability & protections. The educational options are infinite. LASTLY one more condition, on whether to allow the pony rides continuance, would be to contractually MANDATE ENRICHMENT (as recommended by Dr Sachar) for ALL the ponies and livestock. This low-cost, essential provision could be incorporated into the educational aspect... by introducing the children to the importance of animals at work AND at play. All living things should be valued. Otherwise, the protests will rightfully continue. Thank you.

KEEP THE PONY RIDES AT GRIFFITH PARK!

I feel like the removal of the pony concession is a great loss to the people of LA. I grew up with easy access to farms, ranches, horses and other livestock, wildlife and outdoor activities. Almost all of these beloved spaces and encounters are gone forever. I am a pediatric RN, and have experience with therapy animals including equines. The benefit to children is immeasurable. Being around ponies gives children a feeling of peace, empathy and belonging. Its good for their mental and physical health. It helps children develop into healthy adults with happy memories. Please do not remove one of the last outdoor activities that is child and family friendly. I am an expert horsewoman, with a thick horsemanship resume, and have no concerns about the well being of these ponies... other than their fate if they are disbanded and disbursed.

Griffith Park Pony Rides serves all the children of Los Angeles with a low cost way to learn about livestock, the care involved, the love we give them. Animal care teaches compassion for other living beings. It is not abusive to have animals or to use them for service, work, entertainment, and even food sources. In this day and age, people think their food comes from the grocery store. These children need to learn about farming, animal agriculture and the work that goes into it. The pony rides also help special needs children in many ways. For children with cerebral palsy, the movement of the horse actually loosens up the muscles that can allow them to walk.

There was no abuse of the ponies. I'm a registered vet tech in CA and former Disneyland employee who worked tar the Big Thunder Ranch petting zoo). I looked at those ponies from the perspective of a vet tech, Disney petting zoo employee and mom. The ponies were healthy and looked clean, happy and the area was kept as clean as Big Thunder Ranch. The joy on the children's faces was wonderful. The confidence first time pony riders gained from riding the ponies was palpable. The pats, first cautious, then confident. That isn't something that can be gained from inanimate objects.

This is a decision of greed, disinformation, defamation, libel, slander, and not what the constituents most affected want.

PLEASE keep the pony rides. They are how I first fell in love with horses and gave me my life long career. I am appalled that, the Pony Ride contract has been CANCELLED without consulting the constituents that it serves- low income families, middle income families - and the horse community at large. PAID protestors that terrorized the children with VULGAR language and threats have NO knowledge of proper equine care.

It is my understanding that the decision to cancel the contract was made by 1 person without proper input from the City Council or incoming Mayor. I have read the 3rd party equine vet's report and it CLEARLY states that the ponies were receiving proper care. I have owned or ridden horses for over 50 years. I spent 30 years as an animal keeper at the LA Zoo, and several years as an Animal Safety Monitor on film sets. Retired now, I keep 3 equines, all essentially rescues.

During my career, I have observed animal rights protesters, generally kind people, who are unfortunately misguided and/or misinformed attack almost every aspect of the industry. While there are definitely abuses, and areas that need reform and oversight, these pony rides are not cruel or abusive. The ponies are well cared for, and expose urban children to animals. "Making them work" actually keeps them healthy. They get regular veterinary care. Mr. Weeks even sent one to the hospital when it was ill. This is extremely expensive. Does that sound like someone who doesn't care about animal welfare and is just doing this for the money. No. And believe me, he is not making much money on \$5 pony rides - hay, labor and other expenses have gone up nearly 200% in the last few years.

Dear City of Los Angeles Dept of Parks and Recreation,

As is the case for so many area residents, the Griffith Park Pony Rides were an important and beloved part of my childhood, as they were for my mother before me. The pony rides allow children from modest households to interact with horses, providing opportunities otherwise out of their reach. For myself, the rides contributed to my becoming a California Registered Veterinary Technician, a career I have held for forty years.

Not every child will pursue a career in veterinary medicine, but it has been proven that interaction with animals increases a child's sensitivity to others, leading to a higher emotional intelligence, higher empathy for people and higher empathy for animals. For horses in particular there is the saying, "The outside of a horse is good for the inside of a (person)."

As part of my long career in veterinary medicine I was the Hospital Manager for the Oregon Humane Society, a large and progressive animal welfare organization, of which there are many similar organizations in California. Like all true animal welfare organizations, OHS has a well developed Education and Outreach Department focused on childrens' education. Animal welfare organizations know that the more children have interactions with animals, the more empathetic they are to them and the better they will treat them when adults.

In contrast to animal welfare organizations, animal rights groups do not provide care for animals. They have no shelters, no rescues, no foster homes, no solutions. They do not value the human-animal bond that is at the heart of veterinary medicine and in the heart of animal lovers everywhere. Some of the largest animal rights groups do not believe that people should have companion animals and would be very happy to take the pet you hold so dear from you. Animal rights groups main accomplishment is manufactured outrage, not animal

If you think you have escaped the animal rights activists' fury and protests at your homes by caving to their demands, you are mistaken. These groups now know that their guerrilla tactics will frighten you into concession.

Children become better caretakers of animals by being around animals, not by being separated from them. If you care about the welfare of animals, you will reverse your decision regarding the Griffith Park Pony Rides while there is still time. By allowing a great tradition of the Los Angeles community to continue, you will contribute to improving animal welfare in our community now and for the future.

When I grew up in the SFV in the 60's & 70's there were horses everywhere we could ride. Riding a horse shouldn't be just for the rich and privileged now. Please keep this facility for all families.

This is absolutely devastating news: the pony rides have brought such joy to children for decades- there are so few places (if any) that children can ride, touch and be exposed to ponies/ horses. Horses are an integral part of our history, and the pony rides are a wonderful opportunity for children to be introduced to these amazing animals. There's nothing like the bond between a child and a pony: Many equestrian athletes discovered their passion for riding, from that early experience sitting on the back of a pony. Please don't take that experience away from countless children for generations to come. This will just crush the dreams of the children in our community. And what will happen to these ponies?? Please save the pony rides!

I would like to address this comment to Matthew Rudnick.

Matthew, to be clear, these are not Steve's words. They are mine as his wife and someone who has been an integral part of this nightmare of the last 15 months. After staring at the sad faces of children all day today with protesters cursing at them, I felt compelled to address my comments to you directly.

Matthew, you were our partner. The countless conversations that we have had with you over the past year are imbedded in my head. You experienced the same wrath that we did with this angry group of protesters. To have these people invade the personal space of our homes was unimaginable.

And yet, they have won this battle. Where were you when all of this was happening? Where were you when a motion was made to cancel our contract? Where were you in standing up for right and wrong? Where were you in standing up to your boss and standing up for us? You know more than anyone what we and the families of LA have endured over the past year. You also know that Steve did NOTHING wrong. The lame excuse of lack of transparency as an excuse to cancel our contract is unbelievable. And believe me, people are seeing right through that.

The anger that I feel towards you, your boss, and the City Council of the city that I was born and raised in is overwhelming.

I feel personally betrayed by you. You knew the truth. In the end, you were not forthcoming with us. While Steve and I will move onto the next chapter in our lives with a clear conscience, you will be reminded daily of your actions.

Please don't let this happen. Please don't erase anymore Los Angeles history.

I had my first pony ride at Griffith Park pony rides and 1956. And I was hooked. Lived in breathed horses from then on.. Graduated North Hollywood high school with an agricultural scholarship started doing pony rides part-time in 1977 x 1983 and it turned into a full-time business. Hank Bronk and his family, who then operate at the Griffith Park pony ride, helps me up in a pony ride like Griffith Park in 1989 and I remade there until the end of 2002. So much joy the Ponies brought, and even to the parents. We had a whole crew of children who would come on Fridays after school or Saturdays as a reward for getting all their schoolwork done A's on spelling test, whatever. Public pony ride is where a low income family can come and have this experience. Thousands of families will never be able to afford for their children to ride ponies /horses.again if goes away. I still own horses and ponies, and I do know a great deal about them. We horse owners will say to ourselves in the summer why did they go out and lay in the hot sun when they could be in the shade? Why do I have this beautiful barn with a nice soft betting that my horse can go in and out of and they go and stand out in the rain? Someone just send me a photo of their horse standing out in the snow and said I built this beautiful barn. He has a warm stall, lots of straw to lay on and even heated water and he's out standing in the snow.? Why? Because they are horses. The horse is considered a prairie animal. I see mustangs in Nevada year-round out in the weather and they don't seem to mind. In fact, mustang travels 25 miles every day and it's quest for food and usually goes to water once every 24 hours. As for for Ponies, dying in a short period of time that happens, horses are prone to a stomach disorder called colic. And it's all lumped together. There are at least a dozen causes, including a simple change in the barometric pressure in the air. I lost my best horse in March at age 28. He was playing outside over the fence at 1 PM in the afternoon by 2:20 PM. He was down curled up in a ball. He receive pain medication right away and an emergency vet out. Horse was treated and 20 minutes later went right back down again. Another emergency call to the vet and I learned that he needed to be euthanized just like that.. I am told they don't feel that he was transparent and reporting the four deaths. I have also learned that it is not required in his lease that he do that. Any horse veterinarian will tell you that in spite of our very best efforts sometimes they just die anyway. Mr. weeks has taken far better care of these animals than most of the horses or ponies in my neighborhood. When DW Griffith deeded this land to the city of Los Angeles. It was with the understanding that it remain for horses. Please don't take away the only opportunity that our children Especially our low income children will have. I meant parents there today from Compton, Baldwin Park, Fontana. and Inglewood. They drove great distances to give their children this experience.

Please don't shut down the pony rides. I have had three generations enjoy the pony rides. I have been an equestrian over 50 years. What I have witnessed at the pony rides is children joyful to have a ride and pet the pony. Out of all the historical changes in our world why remove the smile from these children. I pray that the activists that think it is cruel to love on ponies don't cause harm to our officials personal space and pressure them to take this wonderful landmark away.

I urge you to reconsider the misguided decision and to renew the pony ride concession contract. You're setting a horrible precedent by giving in to the uninformed extremists. This will only embolden them to keep harassing people to get their way.

You know the ponies were well cared for, as verified by the veterinarians, and the ponies that passed away died from normal causes, not abuse or neglect.

The pony rides are one of the only opportunities for LA children to spend time with and ride horses at an affordable price. The love and compassion for animals that is fostered by this interaction can't be replicated.

At the least this must continue to be a venue where small children can interact with animals. The model for that interaction can be changed, but the invaluable ability for children to interact with animals must remain.

My name is Kelly Summer. I support the Griffith Park Pony Rides. I strongly oppose the closure of this business.

They treat the animals with the utmost care. Don't be fooled by people who don't know about horses ponies or animals.

Don't be part of the lack of recreation in this new world society. Shame you're letting cry babies with an extreme agenda win your fight. Pony rides are a vital part of a child's experience with nature.

I know, the park department could have a place where children can ride ponies at Griffith Park. well done taking away something nice.

A greater rescue problem has just been created by closing down the rides. How is it humane to suddenly unhouse well cared for ponies? I'm a horsewoman and I feel the owner has been unjustly targeted after caring so well for his animals, now being forced to auction. Most of the time, auctioned ponies = slaughter. I'm against the closure!

Hi my name is savannah ross I am 20 years old and I would like to say that taking away the Griffith park pony rides would be taking away a tradition. These pony rides have been around way before me and they should continue to serve the Los Angeles area for future generations, I first started visiting the pony parks at 3 years old and it sparked my love for horseback riding and showed me a true appreciation for horses and animals as I grew up. The pony rides are a vital part to the Griffith park area and a staple attraction, by shutting down the pony rides underprivileged families and underserved families won't have access to farm animals or let alone have their kids ride a pony so close in the city at the price it is at the pony rides. These animal activist know nothing about horses and their mindsets and how they function as animals. They even admitted to being payed to be there with no real purpose of actually having a cause to be there. Please consider keeping the ping rides open for future generations. It would mean the most to the community and to Steve weeks who takes amazing care of his animals.

Our family is deeply saddened to hear about the closing of the pony rides. My sisters and I grew up going there and it's very sad to know that we won't be able to take our kids there. Please keep the pony rides at Griffith Park. The kids love them the parents love them their workers love them and the ponies love to have a drive. It's a historic place and a tradition for so many people!

This is such a sad thing! Those ponies and their owner do not deserve this! There should have been more input from the general public instead of just what some radical protesters think!

I have written to you already voicing my anger at the egregious manner by which the Griffith Park Pony Rides were shut down. You are now soliciting ideas for "reimagining" the venue. I think you need look no further than the recommendations of Dr Rachael Sachar DVM, CVA, the veterinarian hired by the city. In the conclusion her final report she stated

"I suggest there be additional discussions, provisions, and modifications to expand the concession's potential use beyond its current value as a recreational activity and/or place of entertainment. It would be of greater value to the community for the concession to incorporate educational opportunities to the public and collaborate with existing community programs to ensure that it continues to be a viable and sustainable concession and feature for Los Angeles and surrounding communities as well as an important attraction and recreational activity for its residents." This sentiment was echoed by Dr Ramey DVM and President of the Los Angeles Equine Advisory Board who wrote in strong support of keeping a pony ride concession in Griffith Park.

Dr Sachar in her first report says that she was asked to research policies for working animals in other cities which she said was beyond the scope of her initial contract with RAP. She also noted that she has worked with sanctuaries and animals in film and TV that are under intense scrutiny by the most extreme animal rights advocates. They voluntarily follow more intense guidelines. She recommends that Griffith Park Pony Rides do the same. To me this is the win/win answer. The current, mostly older ponies have all gone to good homes, the more reasonable protesters can claim a victory. The most extreme protesters who hold that riding a horse, in and of itself, is a form of abuse, as well as those who continue to attack Mr Weeks personally should have no place in this discussion. We should start again with new ponies and far stricter guidelines and regulations, as well as educational components. No one supports animal abuse, but the vast majority of people do not believe that riding a horse is abusive. If we allow the pony rides to be shut down we embolden Ms Fahim and LAAA to go after other horse related venues. What's next, trail rides, and Griffith Park Mounted Rangers? The LA mounted police horses? What about the Rose Parade? And how do we justify holding the Olympics in Los Angeles if we are not an equestrian friendly city?

Lastly there is Sec. 595 b) Lease of Facilities from the Los Angeles Charter Recreation and Parks Department. I'm not a lawyer, but if this is still current and means what I think it means, then the venue can only be leased as a pony ride.

Sec. 595. Lease of Facilities.

The Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners may lease for recreational purposes any municipal auditoriums, arenas, sports centers or related facilities subject to the following conditions:

- (a) The term of the lease shall not exceed 35 years. Leases in excess of five years shall be approved by the Council by ordinance.
- (b) The public must be entitled to use and enjoy the property or facility for the purposes for which it was acquired, constructed or completed and any lease shall require the lessee to operate the property or facility so as to furnish the public with that use and enjoyment.
- (c) The board may enter into the lease without inviting bids and may prescribe other terms and conditions as it deems appropriate. First of all thank you for finally allowing public comment on this issue. Losing the Griffith Park Pony Rides, and the way this has been handled upsets me on so many levels. I am a 24 year resident of Los Feliz. When my daughter was little we regularly took her to the Pony Rides, the Train, Travel Town and Shane's Inspirations. Of all of these the Pony Rides were the greatest equalizer, offering a place where city kids from all walks of life and all economic levels could easily give their child the opportunity to ride a pony. Playgrounds and train rides are available inexpensively elsewhere, pony rides are not.

The first thing that upset me was the fact the by the time I heard about this (an LA Times article) it appeared to be a done deal. What I read claimed that the lease had not been renewed because of lack of transparency. That seemed particularly hypocritical considering that there had been no avenue for public comment. Then the claim was made that the lease was not renewed because four ponies had died. But all one had to do was read the third party vet report to learn that reporting the deaths was not required, and they were all retired ponies, none of them died under suspicious circumstances, and that one of them lived into its late 30s. That's comparable to a person living to over 100, a ripe old age that only well cared for ponies reach. After that the reason for declining to re-sign the lease became poor record keeping. That's no reason to shut down a 74 year old much loved historic Los Angeles venue. It sounds suspiciously like someone has an agenda and someone is trying to justify it in anyway you can.

The second thing that upset me was that the public was allowed to believe that these ponies were abused, when nothing could be further from the truth. Your own third party vet report found no abuse. Any suggested improvements to the ponies way of life were made by Mr Weeks who worked in good faith with veterinarians and RAP. I have a friend who has owned horses for over twenty years, at one point during the past year she had gone down to the pony rides expecting to find horrible abuse and found plump healthy ponies, with good teeth and hooves that were well cared for. Any recommendations made by the vet were followed. The ponies do not work in the rain or excessively hot weather, they walk in a circle for short shifts with a small child on their backs, they need to be exercised much as many of us walk on treadmills. It is also troubling that the City's Equestrian Council, and the large equestrian community were not included in this decision.

The third thing that upsets me is that a small group of fanatical "animal rights" protesters have been allowed to ruin something that continues to bring joy to masses of families in Los Angeles. Unfortunately this type of thing is becoming more and more common in the world today. Tiny, vocal extremist groups get to make decisions for the far larger, far more reasonable majority. I know that you all claim that their protests had nothing to do with decision, but your quoted reasons don't actually stand up. I have seen, and heard these protesters. This is not the Women's March where hundreds of thousands of peaceful protesters filled the streets, kindly, respectfully, and joyously. These people are abusive. I have seen them curse at small children, and make them cry with absolutely no remorse. If Los Angeles gives in to these people and shuts down the largest Pony Ride facility in the U.S. we are opening the door to the normalization of yet more dangerous extremist ideology. They find no distinction between use and abuse. They ARE NOT THE SAME THING. They equate the use of a well cared for working animal with slavery, it IS NOT THE SAME THING.

You are looking for suggestions for rethinking the land where the Pony Rides are. I believe the pony rides should stay there. I have heard that the lease agreement might even stipulate that a venue stay as what it was originally built to be. Follow the suggestions made in the conclusion of your own third party vet report. Add more educational aspects to the existing pony rides, open up the sanctuary portion of the pony rides to the public. Several of the more reasonable callers to your zoom meeting named existing sanctuaries such as Kindred Spirit. Partner with them or model the sanctuary portion after them. That will be a compromise with the more reasonable protesters. Please do not consider go carts or automated venues. Someone suggested a roller rink. Moonlight Rollerway is right across the freeway on San Fernando Road. I believe they are a family owned business, please don't compete with them. Griffith Park is a haven of peace and quiet, a magnificent piece of the natural world in the second most populous city in the U.S. Up until a few days ago even had a resident celebrity Puma. I appreciate your decision to include the Equestrian Council and the LA Historic Commission as well. Griffith park is a great gem in our city, please keep the Griffith Park Pony Rides and work with Mr Weeks to make them an even greater asset to Los Angeles than the already are. Hello,
I listened to the December 15th meeting for a second time. I would like to thank Commissioner Nicole Chase. Hello - I am a native of Los Angeles and a constituent of council district 13. I am writing in support of the pony rides remaining in Griffith Park. It is an important part of our City's cultural legacy. Generations of Angelenos have been able to have the shared experience of looking back fondly on the memories of this activity with their families. It has been an opportunity for children of all socio economic levels to enjoy time with these beautiful animals and be connected to them and to nature. All the veterinary reports and investigations turned up no abuse. It is clear that this is a purely political decision. My City has caved in to loud pressure from people that do not speak for me - that do not care about or are connected to Los Angeles. The pony ride not only needs to stay, they need to be given all the resources needed to make the animals the happiest ponies anywhere. We do not need bumper cars or educational exhibits - we need the simple pleasures of the joy of a child and a horse in beautiful Griffith Park. I had it, my son had it - everyone should be able to have it.

Los Angeles Parks & Recreation's purpose is to "provide for the health, inspiration and education of the people of California by helping to preserve the state's extraordinary biological diversity, protect its most valued natural and cultural resources, and create opportunities for high-quality outdoor recreation"...for ALL citizens and especially the under privilaged and lowest of incomes in our Los Angeles community. To inspire children to put down their electronic devices and engage in the outdoors, with their parents, to affordably learn and interact with animals, is a service for the Los Angeles citizens. The Council is taking away a healthy, interactive, outdoor activity, that represents a long standing natural relationship humans and horses have had since the days before the Americas was founded and pioneered. To displace these families of ponies, has created potentially unrepairable emotional stress for them, much like removing a child from their family or siblings and putting them in the foster care system without ANY comfort or information.

Los Angeles citizens' opportunity for high-quality outdoor recreation that help connect children to animals outside of their household, especially if they are economically unable to afford the costs to travel and pay for private interactions and introductions with ponies, horses and other animals, or even to access the referenced miracle sanctuaries from the recent community zoom conversation. Although the suggested "sanctuaries" from the community conversation could be non-profits, they still charge access fees greater than the pony ride tickets cost and are located miles outside of the Los Angeles area.

The counsel's decision is unbalanced and excluded valued equine experts and care givers. It is apparent that the commissioners are cratering or serving their own political agenda's and personal legacy motivations and possibly, undisclosed developer funded influences. This decision does not have the greater number of Los Angeles citizens, families, children and animals in mind and negatively affects more people and animals than the numbers of protestors and uneducated, inexperienced animal rights activists.

Hire a new vendor, if you require a clean start, review and rewrite the contract criteria terms, put a time line around these new terms, add stipulations, timelines and milestones, but do not discontinue the Pony Rides. Innocent, under served and lower income families, who most likely are not aware of the losses being forced upon them, will be the ones who suffer in this decision, along with the ponies.

Bring back the pony rides please

Although transparency is important, LA should have attempted to instill a new manager instead of take away this affordable attraction that connects children with animals. I have been many times with my niece who loves caring for the animals in the petting zoo as well as ride the horses. She knows all of their names and lights up around them. There are so few outdoor activities for kids, especially tangible things and those that involve animals and this is a sad moment for LA. There is no where we know of that offers this at the affordable price this attraction offered.

This note may be too late as there was very little opportunity for the public to have input regarding the continuation of the Griffith Park Pony Rides contract. As a biologist, animal rescue participant, and equestrian, I support the continuation of the existing contract and allowing the Pony Rides to continue. If the animals are well-cared for, and there are unbiased routine and special inspections, then the animals, children and parents benefit from this unique experience. Horses and ponies are enjoy the company not only of other equines, but also benefit from the interaction with people. These creatures benefit from the exercise and intellectual interaction, and as long as they are on a humane schedule and care, the outcome is positive. Children develop not only physical skills and gain pleasure from the experience, they develop an empathy for animals that is direct and long-lasting.

If this business is halted, then who and where will these ponies be taken care of? Those who claim to be active in support of the welfare of animals do not seem to have a solution to this. These ponies need exercise, feed, veterinary care, and a space to live safely. This is all placed in jeopardy if the pony ride concession contract is not renewed, as the financial resources will not be able to support them.

There have been recent changes in Griffith Park that have had very little, if any, public input. The closure of Griffith Park Rd., is one significant example. There was very little research and study done in that case, and I believe in the case of the pony rides as well. It appears special interests and Ms. Raman's biases are influencing decisions being made in regard to the heritage, usefulness, and accessibility those using Griffith Park. It is very patronizing of those in leadership to determine "what's best" for the public without sufficient input from a broad range of citizens.

The pony rides should be saved. If Steve no longer wants to run it, please let another pony ride operation take its place. I am a citizen of the City of Los Angeles, and I attended the protest concerning the closure of the Pony Rides 12-18-22 at Griffith Park. I don't understand why the contract is not being renewed. I implore you to reconsider your position in this matter and reopen the facility for the good of all concerned especially the children of Los Angeles living in an urban environment. These small ventures allow for the first ride on a real pony as I did when I was a child. My first experience was overwhelming wonder for these beautiful animals and led to a lifelong love and respect for them.

I have seen the letter to Matthew Rudnick which finds no wrongs committed by Steve Weeks and with every inspection was found that "the ponies appeared healthy, well-kept and cared for, and appropriately utilized in the riding program; there was no evidence of neglect or abuse". "The Department of Animal Services has found no grounds for a permit revocation or any further action at this time and will continue to evaluate any further complaints." I can't understand what reason can be given for not reissuing the permit. If reasonable additional requirements need to be made, then I'm certain that these can be adhered to.

Perhaps something like that, an easy accessible experience to get up close and interact with farm animals (something a bit more real and larger scale,, not just a petting zoo) could be offered. I could imagine fun programming around a farm theme and maybe also opportunities for older children to volunteer and help with care and upkeep. Take a look and reach out to the farm at Tilden park for more ideas and inspiration. Thanks for taking input and hope to get to enjoy a new experience for my kids in the near future.

Is there anything that can be done to bring back the pony rides? Surely this can be done in an ethical manner. The pony rides are such an important tradition for Angeleno families. Griffith Park Pony Rides (GPPR) is a HISTORIC place in Griffith Park. It was a cheap place where low income city kids could experience, ride, and come to love horses. It provided a long-standing, valuable service to the community, and made ponies available to kids whose families would otherwise not be able to afford equestrian lessons. I myself have fond childhood memories of the ponies and grew to love horses and riding them through our National Parks.

I denounce the decision of Jimmy Kim and RAP commissioners of not renewing the GPPR contract. It is evident that the ponies were well taken cared of from the independent 3rd party equestrian expert, Dr. Rachael Sachar. Steve Weeks, owner of GPPR, has been complying with the recommended improvements Dr. Sachar indicated. The fact that RAP based their decision on poor vet documentation of elderly ponies being cared for in retirement and not reported evidence from equestrian experts reflects thin reasoning.

For others, the Pony Rides are a way for children from less-affluent families to sample a lifestyle that might otherwise be closed to them. Col. Griffith J. Griffith meant for his park to be a refuge for the "plain people." The affluent will always have stables, many outside the city, to take their children to for a significant price. The Griffith Park Pony Rides-along with Shane's Inspiration a mile or so down the road-are notably inclusive children's attractions, accessible by public transportation. We also want to point out that Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument #942 designates the Griffith Park Pony Rides as Item #4, a contributing element for its city designation. As such, it is worth fighting for-but not without change.

We are not blind to the concerns of those in opposition to the Pony Ride. We are not in favor of maintaining 1947 standards of animal care and welfare. But we are sure that similar attractions are

I was on the list at today's 8:30 AM meeting to speak regarding the pony ride venue via my phone number 818-515-3916 and could not get the volume to work on my device. So I send this email in the hopes it is shared.

I am a nurse and animal lover who is in favor of keeping pony rides at Griffith Park for the children and families ofLos Angeles. I grew up in Los Angeles and a love of horses was initiated with pony interaction as a child. Horses have definitely enhanced my life.

I visited the park over three days during the last week of the venue's operation and spoke with activists, horselovers, employees, and patrons who were there. The activists I spoke to knew nothing of horse care, conditions, or life expectancy. Ponys die in sanctuaries as well. One activist said she was against owning animals of any kind and another, a man, said parents should just take their kids to Disneyland. He did not know the cost. A dad stepped from the line and asked this man "do you have children?" and the answer was "no."

There is no comparison to the experience of an amusement park vs a pony ride though. The pony rides being out of doors in the beautiful Griffith Park setting and affordable to the community at large was very special. I saw an endearing group of five boys in cowboy boots making their way to a birthday party and talked to a mom who brought her daughter regularly to ride her favorite pony.

The patrons who come for this type of interaction are not going to come for a mechanized activity. This was abeloved experience spanning generations and I think sadly of its demise. It fostered a connection with nature andanimals. That connection has just lost another link with the closure.

Dear Recreation and Park Commissioners Recreation and Park Commissioners,

As a Los Angeles resident who cares about the wellbeing of animals and an In Defense of Animals supporter, I urge you to stop animal suffering in your district by eliminating the Griffith Park Pony Rides and Petting Zoo's contract,replacing Griffith Park with a non-animal model and sending all of the animals to a sanctuary. For five years, your agency has passed inspection reports for the concession, while the owner Stephen Weeks hasbeen breaking California Health and Safety Code 25998. Elderly ponies and horses at Griffith Park Pony Rides havedocumented depression. Spot the pony has lameness, yet is forced to carry people on his back. Recently an overweight sheep was in distress with no worker attending to her needs, and many horses and ponieswere itching due to their halters, which appear to be on all the time. Elderly ponies and horses were also seen being hitand chased for almost eight and half hours on the weekend.

No amount of improvement will ensure that these animals are not suffering from depression. Independent equine expert Rachael Sacher DVM, CVA reported elderly ponies working with saddle sores, elderly ponies with no dental treatment, no identification methods for any of the animals, and an elderly pony with a fever undetected by thiscconcession while your department and Stephen Weeks make millions off the backs of these elderly ponies. Griffith Park Pony Rides pays Recreation and Parks a revenue-sharing fee of 25 percent of their gross income, and as a Los Angeles constituent, I oppose city funds generated from animal abuse.

I am writing the City of Los Angeles and the Department of Recreation and Parks to suggest a way to compromise and keep the ponies and the petting zoo at Griffith

Park. As with all compromises, not everyone will be happy but I'm hoping that something like this could work:
The Pony Rides could be mandated by an oversight committee. This committee could be a group of licensed or otherwise certified professionals to assure that the science in decision-making is adhered to. The facility could be inspected on demand and/or at least four times per year. Any corrections could be made in a reasonable amount of time set by these professionals.

- Licensed Equine Veterinarians at least two.
 Animal Services for the humane treatment of all animals Los Angeles certificated personnel.
- 3.Stable management professional minimum 10 years documented experience with stables preferably with ponies. Responsible for the physical structure inspections and waste management.
- 4.A pony training and management professional minimum ten years documented experience.
- 5. Historical Cultural impact Griffith Park Heritage Committee.
- 6 Environmental Health Inspections County of Los Angeles.

Additionally, I would have someone to evaluate the positive community impact of returning the ponies and petting zoo animals to the facility. The activity was a favorite of lower to middle income families that would have difficulty paying for full glessons available to the higher income.

The age limit for the ponies and mini horses should be older than six years (for full physical development) and a mandatory retirement age of twenty-five years or

sooner depending on the veterinarian input. At retirement the pony would be rehomed to a safe-vetted stable to live out its life. Any and all health concerns of the animals would be reported along with the quarterly inspections.

The average life expectancy of a horse is 25-30+ years; the average life expectancy of a pony is usually 10 years longer. Also notable is that it is more common to see ponies ridden later in life than their full-sized counterparts. There are theories that ponies are hardier/healthier than horses, contributing to both a longer lifespan and a longer under-saddle career. While genetics and a little luck play a factor in determining a pony's lifespan, there are many things within the owners' control to promote a long, healthy life. This is in the form of regular vet-checks, especially the teeth, digestive system and hooves. The addition of these inspections would make the ponies and other animals under such scrutiny that may seem overdone but would move toward satisfying the allegations of misuse and cruelty (which were never founded) There is no substitute for firsthand pony experiences for the children of Los Angeles especially in the urban areas. Everyone I've spoken to has had a very positive experience in participation of the Griffith Park Pony Rides. Many children respond to the more kinesthetic interactions with animals. They also learn that these animals are sensitive creatures and respond to calmness and kindness. When this is learned at an early age, it can carry through to adulthood. Domestic animals help children develop their own sense of humanity and responsibility. In this controlled environment, the children and the ponies and the petting zoo animals all benefit from the experience. Domestic ponies have been bred since the middle-ages for riding and cart pulling. Carrying a tiny human is a part of their forte.

In conclusion, I'm urging all Los Angeles city government decision makers involved in this situation to use these and other ideas to bring back the Griffith Park Pony Rides. The oversight of seasoned, licensed professionals - those in the profession of the Animal Sciences can help assure full accountability of the activities with more fact and less speculative opinion.

Hello,

I took part in your meeting last night, I am not a horse owner, I have lived in Los Feliz for about 24 years. If you are in need of someone from the surrounding community on the ad hoc pony ride group I am interested.

When my daughter was little we used to take her to the pony rides, the train, Travel Town and Shanes Inspiration a lot. She is now about to graduate from college. I first learned that the Pony Rides were being shut down from a FB post looking for homes for the ponies. I think my first assumption was that something horrible must have happened in the years since we had been there for it to be shut down for animal abuse. Shortly thereafter an acquaintance who is a horse owner told me that she had gone down there with someone from the equestrian center expecting to see horrible abuse and instead found, and I'm paraphrasing, 'fat, healthy ponies with good teeth and hooves'. So I went back myself on a weekday to check it out. My first impression was that it was just as I remembered it, except that it was set up even better for kids birthday parties. It was like a trip down memory lane, toddler birthday parties, happy families. As before the pony rides were a great equalizer, a venue used by folks from walks of life. I talked to the girl selling tickets who pointed me to another woman who worked with the ponies. She showed me video of one of the protesters screaming obscenities at a man holding his young child in his arms. She also told me about the Burbank Glendale Griffith Park FB Group. I am one of those people who joined to support the pony rides.

I am also a member of Al Gores Climate Reality Project (more on that later). I had reason to call my Council Member Nithya Raman's office to ask her position on the Wildlife Ordinance which some of us were following, I also asked her position on the pony rides. Her office wrote back and sent me the Vet report from Dr Sachar which Council Member Raman had requested, and told me that Mr Weeks had decided not to renew. I have since learned that Ms Raman had already written the Council Motion to not renew the lease two months earlier, and that it was not Mr Weeks who ended the lease. Let's just say that my respect for Council Member Raman, who I had voted for, diminished. I could share more, everything about the way that this was handled was disturbing. Full disclosure I was at the pony rides the last two weekends before they were shut down as part of the Save the Pony Rides contingent. It was quite the experience and I don't feel the the media coverage was very good. Be that as it may, I believe we now have to move forward. If you would like my perspective I'm here and would love to help.

As to the question of continuing meetings on zoom. I joined a Climate Reality Legislative Group during the pandemic. On several occasions we would take part via zoom in legislative committee meetings. The process is very simple, you give your name, group association if you have one, and position, that's it. The meetings were hybrid, the State Senators and Representatives were there, but people could call in as well as show up in person. We of course appreciated this option because the meeting are obviously held in Sacramento, and short of flying up or hiring a lobbyist this, and writing letters, was our only option. It's not exactly the same thing but that's my two cents.

Thank you all for the work that you do. I am incredibly happy to know that you are all here for us and for Griffith Park. I am especially pleased to hear that Griffith Park has an urban ecologist. That is excellent news.

So, I showed up at the Visitors Center tonight because I thought there was going to be a GRIFFITH PARK ADVISORY BOARD Ad Hoc meeting about the Pony Ride venue. But nobody was there. That was frustrating.

So, I guess I'll give my opinion in this email:

The Pony Rides should be brought back. They were a wonderful way to connect children to animals in a safe setting. And they were a great tradition for over half a century.

As a lifelong animal advocate, I feel strongly that the protestors who shut this venue down were completely wrong, and ignorant of the Ponies' welfare. Their misguided agenda was out of touch with reality. And I'm disappointed that the city and park department bent to their false accusations.

I have several friends who are avid horse people and animal advocates, and they all believed the Ponies were NOT mistreated. Those are equestrian experts who think that! And yet mis-guided protestors who think a 40-pound child is a burden to a 500-POUND animal were able to shut down the venue?! Ridiculous.

Can you advise me whom else I can contact about this issue?

Please restore these rides:

Reimagining the Griffith Park Pony Rides Site Summary of Public Comments Received between December 2022 and August 2023

Background

Over the past 75 years, the Park Pony Rides had been a highly used activity in Griffith Park. The City of Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) held a concessions agreement that oversaw the operations with a private business whose contract expired in December, 2022. After careful consideration RAP decided not to extend the concessions agreement to operate the Pony Rides and requested feedback from the public regarding the future use of the site.

At the time of the closure, RAP established a Feedback Form to gather ideas, input, and comments from the public regarding the future of the Pony Rides Site while the Department initiated a more comprehensive public engagement effort with the broader public (which is currently under way). As of August 2023, RAP has received and reviewed over 1,000 comments, emails, and letters from members of the public regarding the future of the Pony Rides site through the online public Feedback Form.

The Feedback Form was closed on August 31, 2023. Nine hundred forty (940) comments were received, and 83 additional letters and emails sent directly to RAP staff. Together, these public comments provide over 1,000 points of public input immediately following the closure of the pony rides that have served as a starting point for discussions on the reimagining of the site.

In addition, a list of 11,588 names in support of a non-animal model was presented to the RAP Board of Commissioners at a meeting held on November 2^{nd} , 2023. This list will be provided to decision makers as part of the compilation of public comments and input received over the duration of the outreach process.

This summary document provides a high-level overview of the key themes and ideas shared in the public comments and is intended to be a companion document to the full set of public comments (with names and emails redacted for privacy) that can be found in in a separate companion document for a complete public record of initial feedback.

Overview of Comments Received

In general, the responses received mentioned one of five general topics:

- Support for a Pony Ride use
- Support for another use
- Mention of site's historic and/or cultural value
- Mention of need for affordability/accessibility
- Mention of need education

In addition, comments were identified with a responder's affiliation if identified (i.e. equestrian community or another formal organization or group). Figure 1 shows the number of comments either supporting or opposed to the return of a pony riding activity of some kind. The split is close to equal, with 419 commenters against pony riding of any kind, and 432 commenters in support of the return of a pony ride concession. 22 commenters did not have a clear opinion either for or against pony riding.


Figure 2 shows the three additional "big ideas" most frequently appearing in the comments received, by order of frequency. Historic and/or cultural heritage was the most frequently mentioned topic, appearing



in 136 comments (15.5 percent of all comments). Affordability and/or accessibility was the second most frequently mentioned topic, appearing in 124 comments (14.2 percent). Education (85 comments, 9.7 percent) followed.

General Community Sentiment

SUPPORT FOR A PONY RIDE USE

Comments shared a range of reasons for their support of a pony ride concession. Commenters frequently cited their perception of the ride's positive impact on children and families. Thirty-one percent also mention historic/cultural values, 26 percent also mention affordability and accessibility, 12 percent also mention the commenter's affiliation with the equestrian community, and 8 percent mention the educational benefits of human interaction with animals. Many comments express a desire to restore the pony rides exactly as they were, or do not mention the previous concession, but focus on ponies and perceived benefits of pony riding more generally. Several comments recommend improvements to a potential new pony ride concession.

SUPPORT FOR ANOTHER USE

Comments in this group mainly express concern regarding the general wellbeing of ponies and ethical principles about the use of animals for human-centered recreational purposes. Comments also discuss perceived problems in the management and regulation of the treatment of animals generally and specifically, as well as rider safety. Nearly 80 percent of the comments in this group recommend specific alternatives to a pony riding concession. While most of these comments advocate for a completely non-animal use, several comments recommend other animal-related activities, primarily animal sanctuaries or rescue/adoption centers.

Observations Moving Forward

The initial feedback received by RAP was open-ended and was not conducted as a statistically valid survey representing the mix and diversity of residents and park users in the City. It does, however, start to paint a picture of the issues that are most important to the community and helps to serve as a starting point for discussions in the current outreach effort.

Many of the comments offered suggestions that related to the need to provide an educational component, made requests for better management and oversight of any new vendors and called for accountability of new vendors to the City and the community. This feedback was used to develop the RAP Priorities and Considerations that are serving as the overarching guideposts for the review and consideration of new uses.

Reimagining the Griffith Park Pony Rides Site Focus Group Meetings: Summary of Key Takeaways

February 7, 2024

Introduction

A series of six focus group meetings were held with a variety of community organizations in September and October of 2023. The groups provided their insights about the future use of the Pony Rides site. Below is a summary of notes about what participants shared during these focus groups meetings. These serve as high level reporting out of ideas shared, and do not represent direct transcriptions of conversations, and do not represent any formal recommendations of the focus group participants or opinions held by RAP or PlaceWorks.

Each group was asked the same set of questions:

- What do you/your group believe to be the biggest opportunities for reuse of the site moving forward?
- Who do you/your group feel the audience to be served should be?
- What uses would you/your group recommend for reuse on the site?
- What do you/your group feel are the biggest considerations or lessons learned should be kept in mind for future uses?
- Are there other groups/audiences that we should be reaching out to?
- What other things would you like to share with RAP as we move forward in this process?

Key Takeaways from Focus Group Meetings

LA Equestrian Coalition Meeting

September 1, 2023

- Key Considerations
 - Vital community benefit
 - Care for ponies comes first (animal welfare)
 - Educational, therapeutic, mental health, and social/emotional benefits of humananimal interaction
 - Multicultural and multilingual priorities (specifically low-income communities of color)
- o Ideas Shared
 - "Children's Gold-Standard Pony Experience" concept
 - Include educational components (possibly while waiting in the line to enter)
 - Create facilities for special needs/neurodivergent park goers (read aloud to a horse, non-judgmental audience)
 - Large thermometer to measure when ponies can/cannot work
 - Consider use of composite rubber flooring, shade structure over entire area (also required by law to address heat and climate change)
 - Underwriting for an endowment/trust and equestrian licensing fund
 - Murals, shade sails, color, art



o General

- Didn't go wrong, but in operation for 75 years and just didn't evolve
- Needed checks and balances on processes (upgrade from physical tracking to computer, etc.)

- Equus Outreach program as model
- Programming for at-risk teens
- Ensure consistent oversight of concessionaires (cleanliness and service)
 - Examples (Las Vegas, San Bernardino County, Ventura)
- Undocumented families may not be willing to fill out a survey but are a big user group
- Equestrian community can fundraise

LA Equine Advisory Committee

September 11, 2023

- Key Considerations
 - Reposition and reimagine; not just as entertainment
 - Mission demonstrating and teaching about animal welfare
 - Recommend the "5 domains system" of animal welfare assessment.
 - Use the site to demonstrate and teach exceptional care.
 - Therapeutic benefits (especially neurodivergent youth)
 - Pony and Petting Zoo
 - Consider pony demonstrations: ferries, braids for shows, etc.

o Ideas Shared

- Include history, STEAM opportunities: evolution, ecology, animal classification, etc. in educational component.
- Care and health records need to be transparent
- There are different standards of care in the equine community, including the appropriate methods to feed animals, that should be further explored
- Cost to use is important (private lessons can be \$80 per hour vs. \$5 pony ride)
- Want a safe venue "no-bullying zone"
- 3rd party veterinarian spot checks

o General

- Concrete, pavement-based activities don't support Griffith J. Griffith's vision
- Human/animal interaction can help with empathy, patience, motor skills and balance
- Minimum standards of care are legal federal/state minimum standards. Most horse owners care for their horses better than the minimum standard: beyond the minimum standards, there are "Gold Standards"
- Not just "ponies in circles" housed safely, interactions benefit animals and users

 - Multicultural significance for various local communities with equestrian traditions
 - Maintain consistency with Griffith's vision for urban wilderness
 - Equestrian tradition important to members of Latino and Black communities

- Sanctuary ok never ridden
 - Could help teach about disabilities (rescued animals with ongoing special care needs)
- Should be Family-friendly. However, family-friendly generally means kid-centric, but we should consider other family formations. "Kid Centric" should also not exclude others (married, retired, etc.)
- One of the main questions to answer is if there are ponies: To ride or not to ride?



o Ideas Shared

- Gentle Barn/Animal rescue (where animals are not ridden)

- Zoo expensive now, need to have a low-cost entry point
- Indigenous people and histories are under-represented
- Accountability and transparency are critical and desired by everyone
- Journey of Water example from Epcot (imaginative, inclusive, not expensive)
- If we had 100 ponies on site and just 40 giving rides, that would be ok. Some animals are domesticated to work, but the ponies did not have options. Should be that if the horse rejects, then they should be able to not give a ride that day. Problem was that the ponies were not treated well enough

Animal Advocates Meeting

 - There is no animal entertainment model that is humane. There are problems intrinsic to the model no matter the scale (business model benefits by number of rides given)
 - Animal exhibits are never a good idea because the needs of the animals will never come first
 - Animals in petting zoos live in a perpetual state of stress and are subjected to a constant barrage of strange noises and activities as many people try to touch them
 - Concern regarding zoonotic diseases; potential for transmissible diseases resulting from animal-human contact
 - Potential exposure of users to E. coli (see San Diego Fair) is this a liability to the City?
- o Ideas Shared
 - Who should use site: toddlers to 10 years of age
 - Something to do with kids on a Sunday such as:
 - Science/Reading Area
 - Archeology/dinosaurs



- Arts and crafts
- Planting Trees, Community Gardening, Pottery
- Pattern Wall
- Ballet
- Earthquake Testing
- Mommy and me music interaction
- A reputable, accredited sanctuary puts the animals first. The public visits through carefully guided tours that do not cause the animals stress, highly structured environments, and animals have the choice to engage or not. Advocates believe a reputable animal sanctuary would not be possible at Griffith Park, where animals would be confronted by noisy crowds of strangers all day long, and therefore do not support this use in Griffith Park.
- Possibly explore expansion of Junior Ranger program (badges with educational programs, talk about animals in the park already such as owls and coyotes). See "agents of discovery" app.

o General

- Animal exhibits are never a good idea; animal needs never come first and they teach children that it's ok to confine them
- Enforcement never happens; animal shelters are in crisis
- No turnstiles animals not happy walking in circles
- Animals are in perpetual state of stress from everyone touching them
- Takes a large amount of resources to manage effectively
- Shared that a local Petting Zoo (seasonal) was under investigation for zoonotic pathogens and soil contamination
- Concerns about equine cruelty, no water in heat, dirty water, pony lameness (from walking turnstile in same spot)

- One resident concerned about animal welfare (did not generally support animal-based uses) said that riding could potentially be ok if the animals came first, but does not believe that is possible in a for-profit business model.
- Any animal experience must be holistic; if riding is the only way kids interact with the animal, they don't learn to consider the animal's existence beyond riding it.
- Helmets and safety are important.
- Age focused on elementary school (up to 11-12, not teens)
- Maybe Senior Center Partnership?

Overview

On Wednesday, March 6, 2024, the City of Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) hosted a community open house for the Reimagining the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site effort. At the event, RAP provided an overview of the planning and decision-making process to identify new uses that could be established at the Pony Ride site. Community members also had opportunities to meet with RAP staff to ask questions, share their ideas on the future uses of the site through ideas board and prioritization exercises, take an online survey (there were 35 submittals), and fill out comment cards detailing more input that the City should consider in its conversations about the future of the site. Approximately 125 community members participated in the event.

Key Takeaways from the Community Open House

Prioritization Exercise

Attendees were provided three "dots" they could place on boards listing ideas that were popular from the prior public input RAP received regarding the most desired uses people would like to see at the site. Attendees could put all of their dots on one option or split them among various uses they would like to see.

While not intended to be an official vote, the exercise revealed there were two clear standout experiences that participants at this workshop were most interested in: a) bringing back the pony rides for children and b) creating sport courts and fields (it should be noted that there was a group of about 6-8 representatives advocating for new pickleball courts in attendance that night). Other options that people showed almost equal but lesser interest in were animal-related such as a petting zoo, activities that allow for interactions with horses where visitors don't ride the horses (e.g. for mental health therapy and education), and animal rescues. Non-animal uses such as a community educational programs such as a nature center, a museum and community gardens with education components also garnered similar interest.


Community members were also able to add to the list of activities as additional options in the prioritization exercise on a separate board; examples of ideas that were added included roller skating, a bike track, and goat yoga. Attachment A, Reimagining the Griffith Park Pony Rides Community Open House — Prioritization Exercise, shows the different options attendees had to choose from and their preferences.

Ideas Wall

Attendees were given the opportunity to look through a series of photographs to choose one and provide comments on what they liked (or disliked) about the image and what they would like to see at the site. The exercise was intended to provide a forum for dialogue for the community's various interests and provided a platform for attendees to visualize new uses and better understand the interests of others in the City.

The following provides a summary of the general community sentiments shared at this station Detailed community feedback received on the ideas board can be found in Attachment B, Reimagining the Griffith Park Pony Rides Community Open House - Ideas Wall.

- A fun, inclusive, family-friendly, and well-designed space: Participants commented that the new site should be fun and inclusive for people of all incomes and abilities. It should be family-friendly, with an emphasis for children. It should also be well-thought-out and properly planned, and the design should be context-appropriate (e.g. if there are animals, the space should be designed to provide the most comfortable environmental for the animals).
- *Opportunities to Interact with Nature:* Community members shared that the new use(s) should allow children to interact with nature and offer nature-type experiences.
- Water features: Participants selected many photos with water features such as splash pads and play equipment with water components.
- Educational programs: Community members
 provided many educational program ideas such as
 opportunities for children to learn about the local
 wildlife, internships for children to learn to care for
 animals, and creating a science center.
- Community programs: People noted that the site should offer community programs such as group yoga, drawing, art, singing, dancing, gymnastics, and martial arts.
- *Honor native peoples.* Participants commented on the cultural value of the land, and their desire to honor the native people that used space.
- Active recreation facilities. Several participants shared their preference for active recreation facilities such as pickleball and tennis courts, miniature golf, roller skating rink, and biking trails. Meanwhile, a handful of community members noted their opposition to those active recreation facilities.
- Advocating for and criticism of pony rides and interactions with animals. Some community members shared their interest to bring the back the pony rides. Others commented that RAP should have







activities that allow people to interact with animals such as equine therapy and petting zoo; however, the animals should have a high standard of care. There were also open house participants that would like RAP to not offer pony rides or programs/activities that involve ponies or other animal models.

Comment Cards

Community members were also given the opportunity to fill out comment cards to provide additional information or to elaborate on specific ideas expressed on the ideas boards. RAP received 25 comment cards at the community open house. General ideas shared through the comment card submittal are briefly summarized below and the specific comments received can be viewed in Attachment C, Reimagining the Griffith Park Pony Rides Community Open House Comment Cards.

- Family-friendly and affordable. Several participants wrote that they would like the new activity to be family-friendly (particularly for children), affordable, engaging and fun, and be available to community members in different age groups.
- **Positive memories of the pony rides.** A number of community members shared positive memories of participating in the pony rides, and they would like future generations to have access to the activity. The pony rides were affordable and were a unique experience to interact with animals in the middle of a large city. They expressed their desire for RAP to bring back the activity.
- **Desire for a non-animal model.** Some participants providing written comments expressed their concern for the wellbeing of the ponies and the way the ponies were treated at the prior pony rides. They noted that activities that involve ponies or animals are inhumane, and therefore the City should not bring back the pony rides.
- *Alternate uses.* Community members shared many other ideas to reimagine the pony ride site through non-animal model uses. Examples include water splash parks, community gardens, pickleball courts, exercise equipment, and nature walkthroughs like the one at Disney California Adventure.
- Suggestions for managing future uses. A small handful of comment cards were related to the planning and decision-making processes. These include the request for a transparent decision-making process on the future use(s) of the site and clarification of existing documents available on the project website.







Introduction

From December 2023 through April 2024, RAP staff talked to the community at spontaneous in-person pop-up booths at parks facilities across the city to gain firsthand, on-the-spot ideas and input from park visitors regarding the future of the Griffith Park Pony Rides site and the current process to re-imagine it. During that time, RAP staff spoke with approximately 400 parkgoers to share information about the effort and to ask the following questions:

- Did you hear about the Griffith Park Pony Ride closing?
- If you could make a change, what do you believe the closed Pony Ride Site should be used for in the future?
- Who do you think the area should be used by?
- Do you feel that the new activity should have a live animal experience or non-animal experience?
- What other things would you like to share with us about the future of the Pony Ride Site?

The pop-up booths also included an informal activity in which visitors were invited to write down on large posters indicating which zip code they live in and any thoughts they had about how they would like to reenvision the future of the Pony Ride Site. A children's activity was also made available where younger visitors could draw what they would like to see at the site. The results of these activities are included as an attachment at the end of this summary.

We also wanted to get a better understanding of where our visitors providing input at the pop-ups were coming from. Not all visitors provided their zip code, but of the approximately 370 that did, following is a table representing the zip codes where staff talked to more than six participants:

Key Takeaways from Pop-Up Events

Below is a summary of general comments and ideas participants shared during these pop-up events. This summary is intended to serve as a high-level overview of ideas shared by those that stopped by the booths, and should be used as one source for context in addition to the collective feedback received from other outreach efforts coordinated by the RAP Department on this project. The overview below is not representative of direct transcriptions of conversations with visitors stopping by the booth, nor does it represent a formal recommendation or opinions held by RAP or PlaceWorks. It is also intended to get a sense of the general sentiment of those interacted with and is not intended to serve as a statistically valid survey of ideas.

"What do you envision for the future of the Pony Ride Site?" Poster Board Activity

Participants were invited to provide their answers and zip codes on large poster boards and staff took notes with other visitors to record their ideas. Visitors answered in both English and Spanish. The general preference of visitors who participated in this activity leaned toward the inclusion of an animal experience alongside other uses including educational spaces, water activities, playgrounds, and a community garden.

General Summary of Insights from Conversations with Park Visitors

Participants held a wide range of opinions and shared many different ideas about the future of the Pony Ride Site and how it should be used in the future such as:

- Participants generally indicated support for family-friendly recreational uses with educational and entertainment components.
- Approximately 79% of those interacted with (218) indicated support for a live animal experience of some sort (approximately 34% wanted to see the pony rides come back).
- 8% of participants indicated support for a live animal experience *and* added that their support is conditional on the humane treatment of animals and a high standard of care (21 mentions).
- Approximately 12% of those interacted with (48) indicated support for a non-animal experience.
- Approximately 10% of those asked (37) gave an unclear or undecided response regarding an animal/non-animal experience.
- Participants were generally open to the idea of including a combination of uses on the site (versus selection of a singular use only), including suggestions such as: creating multiple animal-oriented experiences, pairing an animal experience with a non-animal experience, or grouping multiple non-animal uses.
- General sentiment among participants indicated preference for a use that kept the area relatively undeveloped and highlighted the "natural" qualities of the site.
- Participants generally liked the affordability of the previous Pony Rides use.
- Participants indicated that any potential animal use should consider and prioritize animal wellbeing.


Note: The total numbers don't add to 388 respondents, since some people expressed interest in bringing back pony rides or said "no to pony rides" <u>and offered suggestions</u> for other activities. Very few people stated solely "No to Pony Rides. Instead, many people provided a range of ideas that included the reuse of the site with animal-related and non-animal related uses such as petting zoo, bike, housing, racquetball etc.



Have you personally ever been to Griffith Park?



















Would you favor or oppose offering pony rides for children in Griffith Park again?





























Conclusions

Conclusions

- Griffith Park is well-known and well-regarded.
- Nearly all respondents have been to Griffith Park—although nearly half have not been in over three years—and most having visited more than one attraction.
- There is high awareness of the Griffith Park Pony Ride, with 6 in 10 aware of it.
- Among those familiar with the Griffith Park Pony Ride, 6 in 10 are also aware that the Pony Ride closed.
- Nealy 4 in 10 of all respondents have visited the Pony Ride—with respondents ages 50 or older and Latino respondents among the most likely to have done so.
- Half of respondents who have been to the Pony Ride, went when they were a child as well as half taking their own children—showing the long-standing tradition for many.



Conclusions; Continue

- Seven in 10 respondents favor bringing back the pony rides.
- The results also suggest there is a low level of opposition to animal experiences in general, with just six percent opposed to any kind of animal experience.
- Most respondents find more than one proposed use of the site appealing—with 3 out of 4 feeling this way about four or more proposals. This suggests the opportunity to provide multiple experiences at the former Pony Ride site or extended area that would be attractive to visitors.
- Top proposals are an animal rescue, community garden, indooroutdoor museum or nature center, adventure area, and pony rides.
- Paved proposals, including sports courts/field, miniature golf, expanded train rides, water play, and play structures are wellreceived but have lower appeal—perhaps also because of their more narrow audience (primarily youth).

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Introduction

Purpose of the Report

At the request of the City of Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP), Architectural Resources Group (ARG) has prepared this Historic Structures Report (HSR) for the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site, located at 4400 Crystal Springs Drive in Griffith Park, Los Angeles, California.

An HSR is a well-defined technical document that is used to inform the condition and future treatment of a historic property, as described by the National Park Service (NPS) in NPS Preservation Brief 43: The Preparation and Use of Historic Structure Reports, and by the California Office of Historic Preservation (OHP)'s recommended "Historic Structure Report Format". ARG developed the HSR for the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site in accordance with these federal and state guidelines. The purpose of this HSR is to document the Pony Ride Site's history, significance, and existing conditions, and to appropriately guide the consideration and evaluation of potential future use options.

An HSR establishes a valuable foundation for the rehabilitation of historic properties. It is a technical planning tool that will assist in directing the future of the Pony Ride facility and grounds in a manner that retains significant features, materials, and spatial relationships to the extent feasible. The prevailing goals of this document are to provide a clear understanding of the Pony Ride's significance and condition, to establish a basic framework for decision making for use by current and future stewards of the facility, and to provide treatment priorities for future rehabilitation, restoration, and maintenance.

The Griffith Park Pony Ride Site opened in 1947 and is significant for its association with the early post-World War II expansion of the City of Los Angeles's recreational offerings at Griffith Park. The Pony Ride was a popular local attraction, enjoyed by generations of Angelenos until the facility closed in 2022. The site is currently vacant, and RAP is exploring options for its future use.

Griffith Park, in its entirety, was designated Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument (HCM) No. 942 in 2009, and as part of this designation the Pony Ride Site was listed as a contributing feature of the HCM.²

Preservation Objectives

According to *Preservation Brief 43: The Preparation and Use of Historic Structure Reports*, an HSR provides documentary, graphic, and physical information about a property's history and existing conditions. Broadly recognized as an effective part of preservation planning, an HSR also provides a thoughtfully considered argument for selecting the most appropriate approach to treatment prior to the commencement of work. An HSR serves as an important guide for all changes made to a historic property and outlines a scope of recommended work.

This HSR is intended to provide recommendations to assist in guiding the rehabilitation, restoration, and maintenance of the Pony Ride facility and grounds.

Methodology

This HSR has been developed using information gathered through background document review, primary and secondary source research, and field investigation. The methodology that was employed for this report ascribes to the guidelines, standards, and best professional practices that are enumerated in the following reference materials:

- Preservation Brief 43: The Preparation and Use of Historic Structure Reports
- The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic Buildings
- National Register Bulletin 39: Researching a Historic Property

The report conveys information about the subject property in two parts: 1) Developmental History and 2) Treatment and Work Recommendations.

Part 1, Developmental History, comprises a historical background and context; a chronology of development and use; a physical description and list of character-defining features; and a summary of significance. Part 1 also provides an analysis of the existing conditions of the Pony Ride buildings and structures.

Part 2 provides a comprehensive set of treatment and use recommendations for the facility, including the conservation of significant materials. The proposed treatment was developed in accordance with *The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic Buildings*.

Conditions Assessment and Document Review

ARG conducted a site visit on June 26, 2023, along with representatives from Silman, structural engineers, and Department of Recreation and Parks staff. The conditions of the buildings, structures, and surrounding site were examined and documented with digital photographs and field measurements.

Research

ARG reviewed primary and secondary source materials related to the history and development of the Pony Ride. Sources included historic drawings and photographs; historic building permits available online through the City of Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety web portal; reference materials from the Los Angeles Public Library; various online repositories; and the Griffith Park HCM nomination. These materials aided in the preparation of the Developmental History section of this report.

Part I: Developmental History

Historical Background and Context

Early History and Establishment of Griffith Park

The land that would become Griffith Park was originally inhabited by the Gabrielino-Tongva people. The Gabrielino-Tongva are believed to have arrived in the Los Angeles Basin approximately 7,000 years ago.³ Their traditional territory included the majority of Los Angeles County, the northern portion of Orange County, the western sections of San Bernardino and Riverside Counties, and the southern Channel Islands.⁴ The Gabrielino-Tongva were hunter-gatherers and inhabited permanent settlements located near stable food and water supplies. Prior to European contact, their population numbered around 5,000, and they occupied nearly 100 villages throughout the region. Villages were reportedly most abundant in the San Fernando Valley, the Glendale Narrows area north of downtown, and land surrounding the Los Angeles River's coastal outlets. Sources indicate that the Gabrielino-Tongva village of Maungna (or Maawnga) encompassed the land that later fell within Rancho De Los Feliz, a portion of which now comprises Griffith Park. 5 While the Gabrielino-Tongva's first contact with European settlers occurred in the mid-1500s, it was not until the 1770s that the area was explored by the Spanish in earnest. The impact of the Spanish mission system on California's indigenous population was devastating. The Gabrielino-Tongva and other coastal tribes were forced to re-settle around the missions in filthy, disease-ridden, and overcrowded labor camps. Roughly one third of the state's indigenous population died as a direct consequence of the mission system and forever changed California native cultures.⁶

The land encompassing Griffith Park was historically part of Rancho Los Feliz, a 6,647-acre land grant that the Spanish Crown had gifted retired corporal Jose Vicente Feliz sometime between 1795 and 1800. The earliest extant building in the park is an adobe residence built in the 1830s by Feliz's son, Jose Paco Feliz. The rancho changed hands several times over the next several decades. In 1882, then-rancho owner Thomas Bell sold 4,071 acres of the property to Colonel Griffith J. Griffith.⁷

Fueled by a fare war between the major transcontinental railroad companies, Los Angeles experienced a tremendous population influx in the late 19th century, from 11,183 residents in 1880 to 50,395 in 1890. This population increase subsequently led to a real estate boom that lasted until 1888. During the boom years,

Griffith made a sizable profit selling off portions of the former rancho for housing development, including land now comprising residential neighborhoods in present-day Los Feliz and Silver Lake. However, Griffith was also a proponent of the ideals set forth by the City Beautiful Movement, including the philosophy that the creation of parks, green space, and other forms of leisure and recreation were critical to the health and well-being of a city's residential population. Correctly predicting that Los Angeles would one day be a vast metropolis, Griffith made plans to set aside a large portion of his rancho landholdings for use as a public park.⁸ In December 1896, Colonel Griffith and his wife, Mary Agnes Christina (Tina) Griffith, announced their intention to donate 3,015 acres of the rancho to the City of Los Angeles to be made available as a city park.⁹ The donation was particularly momentous in the city's history, not solely because of the park land, but primarily for the free and clear water rights that came with it—water rights that would contribute to the city's growth and development during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.¹⁰ Official transfer of ownership was completed in 1898. In addition to mandating that the land always be used as a public park, Griffith required that the property always be known as Griffith Park.¹¹

Early 20th Century Development of Griffith Park

Since its founding, Griffith Park has been a site for recreation, with early forms including horseback riding and hiking. One of the first park trails to be constructed by the City was a footpath up to Mt. Hollywood, the highest peak in the park (built 1909). In the 1910s and 1920s, new recreational amenities were introduced in the park. These recreational offerings "marked a new manner of experiencing the park: away from simple being-in the rustic landscapes of the City Beautiful movement and toward pro-active physical activities." Among these amenities were the Riverside Golf Course (later renamed the Warren G. Harding Golf Course), the park's first municipal golf course (developed in 1900 and improved in 1914); the Wilson Golf Course (built 1923); the development of boys and girls overnight camps (added 1926); the construction of a municipal plunge facility, which included recreational courts and fields, horseshoe pits, a playground, and a pool (built 1927); and the construction of new hiking and equestrian trails throughout the park. 13

Following Colonel Griffith's death in 1919, Van Griffith, his only son, assumed the role of park developer. The younger Griffith continued to carry out his father's original vision for the park, "seeking new ways to expand the park's offerings to the public while preserving open space." Among Van Griffith's notable contributions to the park include the creation of its first irrigation system and the construction of a municipal nursery, which raised plants for reforestation efforts in the park. 15

Griffith Park witnessed a period of increased development and use in the 1930s and 1940s. Early in the Great Depression, the City passed a \$5 million unemployment relief bond measure, which included \$1 million for the parks. Through this bond measure, Griffith Park received new bridle trails, new and improved picnic areas, and expanded automobile parking. Federal assistance programs also helped to further develop the park during this period. Federally funded projects included trail and road improvements, weed clearing, planting, and construction of recreational fields by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC); construction of the Roosevelt Golf Course (relocated to the southeast portion of the park in the 1960s to make way for the new zoo), flood control improvements, and expansion of the zoo (first opened in 1912) by the Works Progress Administration (WPA); and firebreak clearance, pool upgrades, and development of new trails, roads, picnic areas, and campgrounds by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The 1930s also represented the development of two of the park's most iconic projects—the Greek Theatre (completed 1930) and Griffith Observatory (completed 1935). While less iconic, the park's Merry-Go-Round was also installed during this period and represented a reasonably inexpensive form of amusement for Depression-era parents and children. The civil and the park is the park of the park is the park of the park is most iconic projects.

With the beginning of America's involvement in World War II, Griffith Park became a major destination for Angelenos. Due to gasoline rationing during wartime, longer trips to the beach or the mountains were cost prohibitive to many residents, and the park represented a close-by recreation alternative. ¹⁸ The park served other purposes beyond recreation during the war, including strength training exercises and swim lessons for servicemen at the pool and in various locations throughout the park; a Prisoner of War (POW) camp for Japanese, German, and Italian prisoners established near of the current location of Travel Town; and Red Cross convalescent hospitals set up at the Greek Theatre and Griffith Observatory. Immediately following the war, Rodger Young Village, a temporary residential neighborhood comprising 1,500 Quonset huts, was built to alleviate the housing shortage resulting from returning GIs. ¹⁹

Park Development in the Immediate Post-World War II Period

While recreational amenities had existed at Griffith Park since the early 1900s development of the Riverside Golf Course, the park experienced an even greater expansion of recreational offerings in the postwar period. As described by author Mike Eberts:

By the time World War II ended, the notion that urban parks should be quiet, sylvan sanctuaries of meandering walkways, expansive lawns and secluded benches had undergone substantial revision. Recreation—playgrounds, athletic fields and organized attractions—had become an increasing part of what parks were supposed to be about.²⁰

Following the war, the Park Department and Playground Department merged to form the Recreation and Parks Department. Headed by General Manager George Hjelte, who had a background in recreation, the newly formed department was charged with the development of new and expanded recreational opportunities at Griffith Park. Early postwar recreational amenities included the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site (developed 1947); a nine-hole pitch-and-putt course called the Coolidge Golf Course (now the Marty Tregnan Golf Academy; built 1947); a miniature train ride named the Griffith Park and Southern Railroad (added 1947); and the Travel Town Transportation Museum, a vast collection of early locomotives and an old Southern Pacific Railroad depot (developed 1952).²²

Griffith Park underwent a few significant changes in the late 1950s and early 1960s. In 1957, the Interstate 5 freeway was completed along the eastern edge of the park, severing the park's historic relationship with the Los Angeles River. Construction of Interstate 5 was soon followed by the development of State Route 134 along the northern boundary of the park in the 1960s. In 1958, Toyon Canyon, located in the northern section of the park, was developed as a landfill, handling much of the city's municipal waste. These events signified the mounting pressures the city's postwar growth and expansion had placed on its largest public open space. It also represented a shift in park planning and development.

The mid-1960s brought additional, significant changes to the park, including development of the new 133-acre zoo (1966) and the construction of the new nine-hole Roosevelt Municipal Golf Course (1966). According to the 1968 Griffith Park Master Plan, the City had a responsibility to develop the park to "its fullest potential" including the construction a several large new roads, parking lots, golf courses, and overnight camping facilities. However, these ambitious plans were relatively short-lived. In 1978, a revised master plan was created, which provided for a more ecologically and preservation-minded approach to the park's management, in keeping with Colonel Griffith's original goals for the park. There have been a few smaller changes to the park since the late 1970s, including the construction of the Autry National Center (1987) as well as smaller park buildings and structures such as the Marty Tregnan Golf Academy building (2000).

Development of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site

The origins of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site date to the late 1930s when Thomas Wright and his wife Hazel began operating a pony ride at Lincoln Park.²⁶ In 1946, it was announced that a new pony ride facility would be constructed in Griffith Park, adjacent to the proposed miniature train ride.²⁷ Plans for the new facility were prepared by the Department of Parks in May 1946, and the Wrights relocated their pony ride operation to Griffith Park by 1947. The original development included a pergola shelter, a riding ring with walking, trotting,

running, and buggy ride tracks, and a 30'-diameter pony sweep, located to the north of the pergola and ring (not extant). ²⁸ The ticket booth was installed by 1952. ²⁹ From its inception, the Pony Ride Site was well received by Angelenos, appealing especially to families with young children. A 1953 *Los Angeles Mirror* article deemed the Pony Ride Site a "mecca for the hundreds of small fry who visit the park with their parents," many of whom had little to no prior equestrian experience growing up in Los Angeles' urban environment. ³⁰ In its first few years of operation, the Wrights hired a dozen employees to keep up with the attraction's expanding demand. Among them was their daughter Joyce who helped sell tickets and saddle children, as well as eight high school boys and three men who kept the ponies and maintained the grounds. Since moving from Lincoln Park to the new Griffith Park site, the Wrights had become the second largest breeders of Shetland ponies in California. By the mid-1950s, the Griffith Park Pony Ride was purportedly the largest pony ride concession in the world, with 92 ponies giving approximately 3,000 kids a ride on any given Sunday. ³¹

The Pony Ride experienced a number of changes beginning in the late 1950s through the mid-1960s. In 1957, the City's Board of Recreation and Park Commission approved the extension of Thomas Wright's contract to operate the lucrative Pony Ride concession for three more years.³² That same year, Interstate 5 was constructed directly east of the facility. While the buildings and structures within the Pony Ride area were not impacted by the construction, a road accessing the grounds from Riverside Drive was demolished, and the open space to the south and east of the developed area, the current location of the barn and corrals, was reconfigured. A paved parking lot was also added around this time, north of the facility, and a new vehicular/maintenance drive (leading to the barn and corral area) was constructed, resulting in the removal of an original grass training ring south of the miniature train tracks.³³ Additional changes during this time period included the construction of a snack stand with restrooms in 1960, and the construction of a new barn and corrals between 1964 and 1965.³⁴

In 1979, the Department of Recreation and Parks issued a request for bids for the Pony Ride concession contract, which was re-awarded to Thomas Wright.³⁵ Under the terms of the ten-year contract, the owner

was responsible for various facilities improvements, including repairing the Site's picket fences and posts, adding metal water trough covers and support posts, fortifying and painting the pergola's support posts, and other minimal routine updates to the riding ring, barn, and corrals (i.e. resealing open joints and tightening loose hinges where necessary). However in 1980, just one year after obtaining the new concession contract, Wright developed health problems and requested a transfer of contract to his longtime colleague, Hank Williams Bronk. After immigrating to Los Angeles from the Netherlands in 1955, Bronk worked alongside Wright raising ponies and operating the Pony Ride concession for over 15 years. The Board of Recreation and Park Commission approved the contract transfer, and Bronk acquired the property in July 1980, thus ending Wright's three-decade tenure as concessioner.

By the mid-1980s, Bronk had expanded the Pony Ride operation to include over 100 Shetland and Welsh ponies.³⁸ But despite its continued popularity, the concession attraction suddenly faced the threat of closure in 1986 after abruptly losing its insurance liability coverage.³⁹ Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley was among the advocates who expressed support for the Park's pony attraction, stating that:

...the problems of obtaining affordable liability coverage for local governments and municipal services has reached a critical stage for many cities, but never did I think that the children of Los Angeles and surrounding areas would have to bear the ultimate sacrifice of losing the park pony rides forever because an insurance carrier can't be found to offer an adequate policy.⁴⁰

The Pony Ride concession was rescued later that year after the Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners unanimously voted to allow the City of Los Angeles to create a payout fund that would cover and settle future claims against the business. ⁴¹ Bronk and his family operated the Pony Ride until 2016 and do not appear to have made any substantial changes to the facility. ⁴²

In 2016, Los Angeles Pony Rides, Inc., led by Steve Weeks, was awarded the concessioner contract for the facility. Under the contract agreement, the concessioner was required to make several improvements, including repair/replacement of water troughs, repair of concrete flooring and footings at the pergola,

repair/replacement of the barn's roof and gutters, repainting of the ticket office, pergola, fence, and barn, and new landscaping in the pony corrals. The concessioner proposed several other modifications, including remodeling the ticket office, adding a petting zoo and a sales kiosk, constructing a birthday pavilion, installing artificial turf in the pony ring, and installing a video security system. Total improvements were expected to cost \$83,000. While the artificial turf, sales kiosk, and video security system do not appear to have been added, the birthday pavilion ("Oak Grove" birthday pavilion) was added in 2016. A second birthday pavilion ("Coyote Meadow" birthday pavilion), located west of the riding ring, was installed between 2018 and 2019. The petting zoo feature was added at some point during Weeks' tenure as well. In 2022, the Department of Recreation and Parks chose not to renew the concessioner contract, and the Griffith Park Pony Ride ceased operation.

Chronology of Development and Use

- 1946: Plans were announced for the construction of a pony ride at the southeast end of Griffith Park.⁴⁸ Drawings prepared by the Department of Parks indicated the new development would include a pergola shelter, a riding ring with walking, trotting, running, and buggy ride tracks, and a 30'-diameter pony sweep (sweep not extant).⁴⁹
- 1947: Thomas Wright and his wife, Hazel, moved their pony ride operation from Lincoln Park to the new facility in Griffith Park. The Wrights operated the Griffith Park Pony Ride until 1980.⁵⁰
- 1947-52: Based on historic drawings and aerial photographs, the ticket booth was added between 1947 and 1952.⁵¹

By the mid-1950s, the Griffith Park Pony Ride was considered the largest pony ride concession in the world, with 92 ponies giving approximately 3,000 kids a ride on any given Sunday.⁵²

1957: Thomas Wright was awarded a three-year contract expansion as concessioner of the Pony Ride Site.⁵³

The Interstate 5 freeway was completed just east of the Pony Ride Site. While the developed portion of the facility was not impacted by the freeway construction, a road that connected the Pony Ride Site to Riverside Drive was demolished, and the open space to the south and east of the facility was reconfigured. The parking lot to the north of the site was likely added during this time. ⁵⁴

A vehicular/maintenance drive was added, leading from Crystal Springs Drive to the barn and corral area, resulting in the removal of a grass training ring to the south of the miniature train tracks.⁵⁵

1960: The City Recreation and Park Commission awarded a \$38,263 contract for the construction of a concession building and sanitary facility (snack stand and restroom) at the Pony Ride Site to John Hofius of El Monte. The building was to be 46' wide by 48' long and made of concrete block with a steel roof. Faving around the snack stand appears to have been added at this time.

1964-65: Per historic aerial photographs, the barn was built southeast of the pergola, ticket booth, and riding ring.⁵⁷

1980: The concessioner contract was transferred to Hank William Bronk. Bronk and his family operated the Pony Ride until 2016. With the exception of adding a new pony sweep (see below), no substantial improvements appear to have been made to the facility under Bronk's ownership.⁵⁸

1986 Bronk had expanded the Pony Ride operation to include over 100 Shetland and Welsh ponies.⁵⁹

The Pony Ride Site faced the threat of closure as a result of Bronk's sudden loss of liability insurance coverage but was subsequently saved by an insurance agreement after the Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners unanimously voted to allow the City of Los Angeles to create a payout fund that would cover and settle future claims against the business.⁶⁰

1989-2003: Based on aerial photographs, the existing pony sweep appears to have been added between 1989 and 2003.⁶¹

2016: A new concessioner contract was awarded to Los Angeles Pony Rides, Inc., led by Steve Weeks.

Under the contract agreement, the concessioner was required to make several improvements to the facility, including repair/replacement of water troughs, repair of concrete flooring and footings at the pergola, repair/replacement of the barn's roof and gutters, repainting of the ticket office, pergola, fence, and barn, and new landscaping in the pony corrals.⁶²

The Recreation and Park Commission approved of the construction of a birthday pavilion ("Oak Grove" birthday pavilion, built south of the riding ring).⁶³

2018-19: Per aerial photographs, a second birthday pavilion ("Coyote Meadow" birthday pavilion), located west of the riding ring, was added between 2018 and 2019.⁶⁴

2022: The Department of Recreation and Parks chose to not renew the Pony Ride concessioner contract, and the facility closed to the public.⁶⁵

Dates unk. Chain-link fencing was added around the riding ring.

A wood structure was added around the light pole in the riding ring, sometime after 1991.

A petting zoo attraction was added sometime after 2016.

Wood fencing and guide rails have been replaced in the riding ring, likely multiple times over the years.



New trees have been added to the site over the years. Some species include carrotwood, gold medallion, palm, and jacaranda. Other species such as sycamore and elderberry were removed from the site (see 1956 "Griffith Park Pony Ride Area" site plan, in Appendix C: Historic Drawings).







Physical Description

Site and Setting

The Pony Ride Site is located at the southeast corner of Griffith Park, on the east side of Crystal Springs Drive and just north of Los Feliz Boulevard. A heavily vegetated strip of land provides a buffer between the facility and Interstate 5. The southern end of the site is also heavily vegetated with oaks, sycamores, and other shade trees. The Pony Ride comprises an irregularly shaped site, approximately 3-and-one-half acres in size. The main vehicular entrance is located at the north end of the site and leads to a paved surface parking lot (added in 1957) shared with the miniature train ride. A second vehicular entrance (added in 1957) is located to the south of the riding ring and provides maintenance/park vehicles access to the barn and corrals. A paved pedestrian entrance and walkway provides egress between the sidewalk and the entrance to the Pony Ride.

Most of the Pony Ride buildings and structures are concentrated at the north end of the site, to the west of the miniature railroad tracks. ⁶⁷ The snack stand (constructed in 1960) is the northernmost building in the Pony Ride Site. The building is fronted by two areas of lawn planted with gold medallion trees and containing picnic tables. The lawns are bisected by a paved pedestrian path that accesses a parking lot to the north. The snack stand is surrounded by non-historic asphalt paving. South and southwest of the building are two circular brick planters (added at an unknown date) holding a jacaranda tree (south) and coast live oak tree (southwest).

To the southwest of the snack stand is the ticket booth (built between 1947-1952) and pergola (built 1947). The ticket booth is located directly north of the pergola, and the pergola overlooks the riding ring (built 1947) to the south. To the east of the pergola and riding ring is the pony sweep (built between 1989 and 2003). To the west of the riding ring is another fenced area and pavilion used for birthday parties (added between 2018 and 2019).

A vehicular drive for maintenance vehicles separates the riding ring from another fenced birthday pavilion (added 2016). At the end of the driveway is a gate that accesses the barn (built between 1964-1965) and corrals (built between 1964-1965).






Aerial view of Griffith Park (boundary outlined in dashed red line), with location of the Pony Ride Site noted (Google Maps, adapted by ARG, 2023).

Griffith Park Pony Ride Context Site Plan (ARG, 2023).





Contributing Resources

Following is a description of the buildings, structures, and features that contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. See the below Evaluation of Significance section for a complete list of the site's contributing and non-contributing resources.

Vegetation

The site contains numerous trees, including coast live oak, coast redwood, Mexican fan palm, carrotwood, jacaranda, gold medallion, and Canary Island pine trees (see Tree Identification Site Plan for location of tree species). The coast live oak and coast redwood trees are the only trees that appear to have been present on the Pony Ride Site during the period of significance (1947-1956) and thus contribute to its historic significance. Furthermore, one coast live oak, in a planter to the west of the snack stand, is identified as a Heritage Tree on the City's Navigate LA website. ⁶⁹ See the below Evaluation of Significance section for a complete list of the site's contributing and non-contributing resources.

Pergola

Constructed in 1947, the pergola is original to the Pony Ride Site and contributes to its significance. The structure provided shelter for patrons who waited in line for a pony ride. It consists of an open, hipped roof structure with asphalt composition shingle roofing and exposed rafters and sheathing. The roof is supported by ten wood columns atop concrete footings (five on each side). Surface-mounted pipe conduits, outdoor paging/announcement speakers, and lights with jelly-jar style shades are located at the pergola ceiling. Below the roof are fixed pipe metal stanchions where patrons would queue up. Based on historic drawings and photographs, the stanchions are not original to the structure. Historically there were park benches placed along the north side of the pergola, and a wood picket fence enclosed the south side. The south side was also originally divided by diagonal wood railings into 12 pony stalls, with six to each side and a central pass-through between the pergola and pony area. The benches, picket fence and stall dividers are no longer extant, but the center pass-through remains. Along the south side of the structure are two long metal water troughs sitting on wood framing where ponies would be tethered and given water. A chain-link fence has been installed (date unknown) between the queue area and the water troughs. Metal tube framing with a synthetic covering has been mounted to the south edge of the pergola roof to provide additional shade to the ponies.

Ticket Booth

Built between 1947 and 1952, the ticket booth was part of the original development of the Pony Ride Site and contributes to its significance. The ticket booth sits directly north of the pergola. It is a small one-story building capped with an asymmetrical gable roof with asphalt composition shingle roofing and exposed rafter tails. The south plane of the roof shelters an open porch where visitors buy their tickets. The south edge of the roof is supported by wood posts with a wood railing. The north roof plane covers an enclosed booth. The building is clad in vertical wood siding with a non-historic plywood wainscot (likely covered original horizontal cladding beneath). A service window enclosed by two wood shutters is centered on the south façade of the building. The ticket window consists of a wood-framed opening with exterior shutters and an interior acrylic infill panel. The acrylic infill panel has a vented opening for speaking through more easily, and an arched opening at bottom center to exchange money/tickets. A wood door centered on the north façade of the building leads to the interior of the booth.

The interior of the building consists of a concrete slab floor, painted gypsum board walls and ceiling, and simple wood base and ceiling trim. The ceiling is flat and cants down to follow the roof rafters along the north side. The south side contains built-in lower cabinets with a countertop and opening below the ticket window. The countertop continues along the west interior wall. Open shelving is located on the other walls.

Riding Ring

Originally developed in 1947, the riding ring is original to the Pony Ride Site and contributes to its significance. Located south of the pergola, the ring is horseshoe shaped with its narrower end terminating at the pergola. The inner ring consists of two narrow riding tracks—the inner track was historically used for walking and the outer for trotting. The tracks are divided by three guide rails, which are located approximately 14 inches off the ground and consist of square wood posts supporting horizontal wood rails. A two-foot-tall wood fence surrounds the walking and trotting tracks and forms a third track, which was historically the running track. The running track is surrounded by a 3-foot-tall fence with buggy wheels along the exterior of the fence; this historically formed the buggy track. The entire riding ring is surrounded by a metal chain-link fence (added at unknown date). Based on historic drawings and photographs, the running track fence and buggy fence replaced original fences that were 3'-10" high, with alternating stacked wood railings. The inner track guide rails appear to have been replaced in kind.

Near the north end of the center of the riding ring is a 20-foot-tall metal light pole supporting three spotlights. At the base of the pole is a u-shaped, wood-framed look-out booth where employees stand to oversee the tracks. The light pole appears to be original to the site based on historic photographs. The look-out booth was added at a later date (post-1991, per a historic newspaper image). Low concrete curbs delineate semi-circular planters that are planted with three coast redwood trees and manicured hedges (not original to the site based on historic photographs) within the center of the ring. At the northeast edge of the ring is a metal structure supporting an awning that shades additional water troughs (added at unknown date), and a concrete vault with a wood door (use unknown) is located in the ground next to the light pole.

Non-Contributing Resources

Following is a description of the buildings, structures, and features that do not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. See the below Evaluation of Significance section for a complete list of the site's contributing and non-contributing resources.

Pony Sweep

Based on historic aerial photographs, the existing pony sweep appears to have been added between 1989 and 2003. As a contemporary intervention, it does not contribute to the historic significance of the Pony Ride Site. It is a circular structure of metal tube framing with a mesh fabric roof cover. The structure shelters a metal wheel/carousel (sweep) that ponies get tethered to while walking in a circular pattern. The structure comprises metal pipe framing and is enclosed on all sides by chain-link fencing. There is a single gate at the north side to enter/exit, and an array of metal pipe stanchions for crowd control (similar to stanchions at the pergola). The sweep framing forms a conical roof overhead with lighting, and the structure is covered with canvas mesh and a decorative valance awning at the top edge. The floor of the sweep is raised slightly and covered with a ring of rubber athletic flooring for the ponies, and gravel in the center.

Snack Stand and Restroom Building

Constructed in 1960, the snack stand and restroom building was built after the Pony Ride Site's original development (1947-1956) and does not contribute to the site. The building sits at the north end of the site. It is a one-story building with a U-shaped footprint. It has a flat roof with built-up roofing and is constructed of painted concrete masonry units (CMU). The west side of the building is infilled with vertical wood siding and lined with four large openings where patrons order/pick up food; the openings are enclosed by metal roll-up doors. Hollow metal doors line the other façades. The east side of the building has an enclosed service yard, and the north end of the building contains a commercial kitchen and snack bar; the interior of the yard, kitchen, and snack bar were not accessible during ARG's site visit. At the south end of the building are public restrooms—the women's restroom is accessed from the west side and the men's from the east side. The restrooms have concrete floors, painted plaster walls, exposed steel decking and beams at the ceiling, laminate restroom partitions, and industrial-type stainless steel fixtures.

Barn

Built between 1964 and 1965, the barn was added after the original development of the Pony Ride Site (1947-1956) and does not contribute to its significance. The barn is located at the south end of the facility, on the east side of the miniature train tracks. It is a large rectangular structure with a low-pitched gable roof and corrugated metal siding resting on top of a CMU stem wall. The barn is accessed from the north and south ends via large rectangular openings enclosed by metal roll-up doors with inset pedestrian doors. The interior of the barn is largely open, with partial height CMU stalls along the east and west sides, an employee break area and a tack room with storage loft at the northeast and northwest corners, respectively, and an open turn-out area at the south end. Interior floors at the ground level are compacted soil. The roof's steel framing is exposed at the interior, as is the CMU and corrugated metal wall siding.

Corrals

Originally installed between 1964 and 1965, the corrals were added after the Pony Ride Site was originally developed (1947-1956) and does not contribute to its significance. The corrals are located east of the barn. They vary in size and shape, and are enclosed by metal chain-link fencing. Each corral has one or more shade structures comprising corrugated metal roofs supported by metal posts. Fencing and shade structures appear to have been replaced over the years.

Small-Scale Features

Birthday Pavilions

There are two fenced birthday pavilions on the site—the "Oak Grove" pavilion (built 2016) is located south of the riding ring, and the "Coyote Meadow" pavilion (built between 2018 and 2019) sits west of the ring. The pavilions feature shade structures, tables, and painted backdrops, presumably for photo opportunities. The pavilions are contemporary interventions and do not contribute to the historic significance of the Pony Ride Site.

Freestanding Shade Structure

Near the pedestrian entrance, northwest of the ticket booth and pergola, is a freestanding shade structure with a built-in water trough. The metal trough is clad in wood and supported by metal posts. A retractable awning supported by metal posts shades the water trough on either side. The structure was built after the Pony Ride Site's original development (1947-1956) and does not contribute to the significance of the site.

Masonry Planters

There are two circular planters at the north end of the site—one north of the ticket booth, holding a coast live oak tree, and the other between the snack stand and pony sweep, holding a jacaranda tree. The planters are composed of rubble stone with a brick coping. The exact date of the planter construction is unknown; however, they were built after the Pony Ride Site's period of significance (ending in 1956) and do not contribute to the significance of the site.

Evaluation of Significance

Overview of Significance

The Griffith Park Pony Ride Site contributes to the significance of Griffith Park, which was designated Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument (HCM) No. 942 in 2009. Griffith Park is designated under multiple HCM criteria. It is listed under Criterion 1 as one of the largest urban parks in the country, reflecting the large-scale philanthropy and City Beautiful Movement ideals of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. It is also significant for providing a reliable and secure water source to the City, which was critical to Los Angeles's early 20th century development and growth. Under Criterion 2, the park was determined to be significant for its association with a number of notable individuals, including the Griffith family (Colonel Griffith J., wife Tina Griffith, and son Van Griffith), Park Superintendent Frank Shearer, who oversaw the initial recreational and irrigation developments in the park, and Recreation and Parks Superintendent George Hjelte, who managed the expansion of various recreational activities during the post-World War II era. Under Criterion 3, the park was found significant for containing a number of "intact and expressive examples" of the Spanish Colonial Revival, Moderne, Greek Revival, and rustic "Park Style" designs. Under Criterion 4,70 the park was found significant for containing several buildings and structures designed by notable architects, including John C. Austin & Frederic M. Ashley, in consultation with Russell W. Porter (Griffith Observatory), Peter K. Schabarum (Greek Theatre), William L. Pereira & Associates (former Children's Theater Costume Workshop, now "LA Shares"), and Jones, Emmons & Contini (Griffith Park Girls' Camp).⁷¹

The park was also found significant as a cultural landscape.⁷² According to the National Park Service (NPS), a cultural landscape is "a geographic area, including both cultural and natural resources and the wildlife or domestic animals therein, associated with a historic event, activity, or person or exhibiting other cultural or aesthetic values."⁷³ Griffith Park represents one of the largest municipal parks with urban wilderness in the United States, encompassing 4,210 acres of natural chaparral-covered terrain and landscaped parkland. In addition to its vast undeveloped wilderness, the park includes a wide variety of recreational amenities, from hiking and horseback riding trails and picnic areas to the Griffith Observatory and Greek Theatre. Founded in 1896 and largely developed by the early post-World War II period, the park comprises a vast array of both natural and cultural resources; it thus represents a significant cultural landscape.

Griffith Park's identified period of significance is 1896-1957, beginning with the year Colonel Griffith and his wife Tina Griffith gifted the City of Los Angeles the property for use as a public park, through its early postwar development under the direction of Superintendent Hjelte. The period of significance culminates with the construction of the Interstate 5 and State Route 134 freeways (completed in 1957) through the park and the

development of the landfill in Toyon Canyon (opened 1958), within the boundaries of the park. These events were the result of the city's rapid postwar growth and rendered the park vulnerable to overdevelopment in the mid-1960s and 1970s.

Constructed in 1947, the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site contributes to the significance of Griffith Park for its association with the new and expanded recreational amenities developed in the park in the immediate post-World War II period, under the direction of Superintendent Hjelte.⁷⁴ While the Griffith Park HCM application does not identify a period of significance for the Pony Ride Site, for the purposes of this HSR, ARG has identified a period of significance of 1947-1956. The period of significance begins with the year the facility opened and ends prior to the completion of Interstate 5 (1957), which resulted in a reduction of the Pony Ride grounds and reconfiguration of how the site was approached by the public. Subsequent changes were made to the Pony Ride Site in the late 1950s through the mid-1960s, including the construction of a parking lot to the north of the facility, the addition of a new vehicular/maintenance drive and removal of a grass training ring, and construction of the snack stand, barn, and new corrals.

Contributing and Non-Contributing Resources


The Griffith Park HCM application does not identify contributing and non-contributing resources within the Pony Ride Site. For the purposes of this HSR, ARG has assigned contributing and non-contributing statuses to the buildings, structures, and features within the facility. Contributing resources are those that were built or added during the Pony Ride Site's period of significance (1947-1956) and help to convey the reasons for which the site is significant. Non-contributing resources are those that were built or added outside the Pony Ride Site's period of significance.



Character-Defining Features

Character-defining features are those aspects of a property's design, construction, or detail that are representative of its significant function, type, or architectural style. Character-defining features may include the overall shape of the building/structure; its materials, craftsmanship, and decorative details and features; and the various aspects of the surrounding site. For a historic resource to retain its significance, its character-defining features and spaces must be retained to the greatest extent possible. An understanding of a property's character-defining features is a crucial step in developing a rehabilitation plan that incorporates appropriate levels of restoration, rehabilitation, maintenance, and protection.

Following are character-defining features of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site and its contributing resources.

Site and Setting

- Siting on an irregularly shaped piece of land on the east side of Crystal Springs Drive
- Open developed areas surrounded by dense mature vegetation to the south and east
- Mature coast live oak trees scattered throughout the site and coast redwood trees in the riding ring (see Tree Identification Site Plan)
- Groupings of functionally related areas—public areas to the north (ticket booth, pergola, riding ring) and staff/maintenance areas to the south (barn, corrals)—separated by the miniature train tracks
- Low-scale, vernacular character and relatively small footprints of buildings and structures within the public area

Pergola

- Rectangular footprint
- Hip roof
- Open-air structure composed of exposed wood joists/beams and wood posts on concrete footings (some framing and footings have been replaced)

Ticket Booth

- Rectangular footprint
- Gable roof
- Wood construction and wood siding (some siding replaced/covered up)
- Recessed porch on the south side
- Door accessing the north side
- Service window with wood shutters on the south side

Riding Ring

- Horseshoe shape
- Wood guide rails comprising multiple tracks for walking, trotting, etc. (the rails themselves have been replaced)
- Landscaped center with historic redwood trees
- Light pole

Existing Conditions Assessment

Introduction

ARG has prepared the following architectural conditions assessment for the built features of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site, in order to evaluate the existing materials and determine recommendations for preservation, mitigation, and/or repair strategies. This conditions assessment discusses each structure or feature separately. These include the contributing features (Pergola, Ticket Booth, and Riding Ring), and non-contributing features (Pony Sweep, Barn, Corrals, Snack Bar and Restroom Building, and other small-scale features).

The scope of this report is based on a visual analysis of accessible building materials and features, and includes only those areas immediately available for access. ARG did not survey concealed areas, perform exploratory openings, or remove materials for access. There may be conditions of interest and/or damage in concealed areas which are beyond the scope of this conditions assessment. An analysis of structural systems has been provided separately (see Appendix A: Structural Report).

Additionally, the scope of this report did not include an assessment of the health or condition of historic and non-historic vegetation within the Pony Ride Site. Refer to the Treatment and Recommendations section below for more detail regarding ARG's recommendations related to assessing the site's historic trees.

Contributing Resources

Pergola

The pergola, a contributing feature of the Pony Ride Site, was constructed in 1947. It consists of a single-story covered open space with wood columns and metal stanchions for crowd control, and troughs along the south side for ponies to be tethered and given water. The space is covered by a large, hipped roof with wide overhangs. The pergola roof is supported by 10 equally spaced wood columns, including 8x8 corner posts, and 6x6 interior posts. The columns are embedded in concrete footings and are also attached with steel base plates and bolts. It is unclear if the concrete footings are reinforced. Above the columns are continuous wood beams consisting of two 3x8's sistered together. The columns and beams are tied together with steel plates and bolts forming welded T-shapes. The columns are raised above grade by the footings and appear to remain in good condition. Some concrete footings have cracks, suggesting there may be some corrosion of embedded steel. Column/footing and column/beam connection plates where visible are painted and remain in good condition. At one location on the south side, the steel T-shaped connector is broken, and a surface-mounted strap connector has been added as a repair. The column also appears to have been cut and a wood block added between the column and beam.

The columns and beams support the pergola roof, which consists of 2x8 wood rafters spaced at 24 inches on center and 2x6 wood collar ties at 48 inches on center. The roof cantilevers out 6 feet in all directions to form a wide overhang. The roof is sheathed with 1x6 straight board sheathing and covered with asphalt

composition shingles. The roof eaves have a 2x8 continuous fascia trim, which is partially covered by painted sheet metal edge flashing. Roof drainage is by surface flow to the edges of the canopy; no gutters or downspouts are provided. At the east side of the roof, there a several small penetrations for a metal-framed cable stand, for feeding conduits to an electrical box below. At the pergola ceiling, there are surface-mounted pipe conduits, outdoor paging/announcement speakers, and ceiling-mounted lights with jelly-jar style shades.

The pergola roof is in fair condition overall. The wide overhangs are not braced typically, and in some corners there is minor roof sag. At the southwest corner, a diagonal pipe brace has been added for support. The roof framing and sheathing are typically soiled overall, with localized areas of peeling paint or paint loss. The straight sheathing boards have splits, losses, and open knotholes throughout. Some localized areas also may contain dry rot. The asphalt shingles and edge flashing remain in good condition. The cable stand metal surfaces are corroded, and the roofing tar penetrations appear deteriorated. Along the south side above the pony staging area, a large shade canopy has been added. The canopy is supported by galvanized pipe columns which cantilever out from the south wall and are affixed to the wood columns and beams. It is in fair condition overall, but could be damaging to the pergola framing in high winds.

The entire floor and surrounding area are paved with asphalt and hold stanchions. The metal stanchions are composed of painted metal 1-1/2-inch diameter pipe columns and rails, with half-round end caps; some openings are also closed off by chains. Additional direction and stop markings have been painted onto the asphalt below. The asphalt is in fair condition. It appears to drain sufficiently with no ponding water or low spots observed. There is cracking throughout. The pipe stanchions are also in fair condition. Metal surfaces have peeling paint and light corrosion throughout. Some end caps are also missing at rails.

Both the stanchions and markings are not original to the structure. Drawings and historic photographs indicate that there were park benches placed along the north side, and there was a painted wood picket fence along the south side with short return walls at the ends. The south side was also originally divided by diagonal wood railings into 12 pony stalls, with six to each side and a central pass-through between the pergola and pony area. The benches, picket fence and stall dividers are no longer extant, but the center pass-through remains. It features wood door panels with double-acting hinges and remains in good condition. Chain-link fencing has also been added at the south wall between the pergola and troughs and continues around the riding ring (see below).


The watering troughs are wood framed with stainless steel inserts, and in front there is a pipe rail for tethering the ponies. Water spigots with short rubber hoses are located above the troughs to either side of the columns. The flooring in this area is paved asphalt, and there are two area drains. The troughs remain in fair condition and appear well used. Surfaces are soiled and abraded with paint loss throughout. Trough inserts and floor drains are clogged with leaves and debris.





Ticket Booth

The Ticket Booth, a contributing feature of the Pony Ride Site, was constructed sometime between 1947 and 1952. It consists of a small, one-story, one-room building with an asymmetrical gabled roof. At the south side, there is a covered porch and ticket window, and at the north side there a single entrance door. The building is composed of wood-frame construction, supported on a concrete slab-on-grade foundation. Exterior walls consist of wood 1x8 vertical siding over a modified wainscot base. The wainscot currently consists of a wood 2x sill with plywood cladding below. The plywood is covering possibly original wood horizontal siding. The roof is framed with 2x4 wood rafters at 24 inches on center, supported by 2x6 wood beams. The roof is sheathed with straight board sheathing and covered with asphalt composition shingles, similar to the pergola roof. Drainage is by surface flow to the north and south sides of the building (no gutter). There is one small pipe penetration at the north side above the entrance for security lighting.

The roof is in fair condition overall. A few asphalt shingles appear damaged, and there is heavy sealant or roof tar around the pipe penetration, which is poorly applied. Edge flashings are intact with some dents throughout. The ends of several rafter tails are also heavily decayed (rotted). The vertical siding at the upper portion of walls is in fair condition and appears to be original. The siding is split and damaged in localized areas. At the west façade, a large rectangular opening was cut for installation of a packaged air conditioning unit. The unit has since been removed and the opening covered with plywood. There is also wood rot and peeling paint at the base of boards where they meet the wood sill. Painted surfaces are generally intact but soiled overall with some graffiti noted.

The lower portion of the walls is in poor condition. The wood sill appears to be original. It is damaged in several areas, with notches or losses, some of which have been painted over. Plywood has been installed at the wainscot over what may be original horizontal siding. Where visible near the entrance, the horizontal siding is in poor condition, including heavy wood rot at the base of the building. Some base boards may have also been removed. It is difficult to determine the full extent of damage without removing the plywood covering.

The covered porch at the south side is framed with 4x4 wood columns, and between the columns are 2x4 intermediate and top railings. The railings appear to be replacements. Wood brackets remain at the columns from an earlier installation and at a lower height. The porch is in fair condition overall. There is wood decay (rot) at the base of wood columns and ends of railings. Railing surfaces are generally worn and damaged from use, with heavy paint loss.

The entrance door at the north façade is wood framed, with simple solid paneling at the interior, and wood trim at the exterior simulating a barn door with vertical boards and horizontal and diagonal bracing. The door is hung with decorative strap hinges; it also contains a locking knob entry set, deadbolt lock, and sliding bolt with padlock and heavy chain. Damage around the locks suggests multiple break-in attempts. The door is in poor condition overall. The wood frame is heavily rotted at the base of both jambs. The base of the door is also heavily damaged from rot and moisture infiltration. This is less visible at the exterior since a piece of wood trim has been added at the base of the door to cover the damage; at the interior, the paneling is

warped and water damaged.

The ticket window at the south façade consists of a wood-framed opening with exterior shutters and an interior acrylic infill panel. The shutters are composed of vertical boards with horizontal and diagonal trim at both interior and exterior sides. The shutters are designed to lay flat against the exterior south wall (secured by chains) when the ticket window is open; small notches have been cut into the exterior frame at each side for this purpose. The acrylic infill panel has a vented opening for speaking through more easily, and an arched opening at bottom center to exchange money/tickets. The shutters are hung with decorative strap hinges and secured with a non-original hasp and padlock and heavy chain. The ticket window is in fair condition overall. The shutters have been damaged, including multiple pry marks and losses at the wood, likely from prior break-in attempts. The base of the shutter doors and frame sit against the wood sill and appear to have some dry rot. The base of shutters has also been previously repaired (seen at interior side). The hinges are intact, but two additional hinges have been added at the eastern shutter. The sill and interior trim at the window opening are heavily worn from use.

The interior of the building is of fairly simple construction, including a bare concrete slab floor, painted gypsum board walls and ceiling, and simple wood base and ceiling trim. The ceiling is flat and cants down to follow the roof rafters along the north side. The south side contains built-in lower cabinets with a countertop and opening below the ticket window. The countertop continues along the west interior wall. The west wall also contains an opening for an A/C unit (now removed). Other walls contain open shelving supported on metal brackets. There are some loose furnishings still in the space, including a desk and file cabinet. The space is lit with a single fluorescent light at the ceiling. In general, the interior is in poor condition. Surfaces are heavily soiled and worn from use. There are numerous areas of damage to the base of wallboards, particularly below the ticket window and adjacent to the door jambs. The A/C opening at the west wall has been covered from the exterior (see above); other interior wall panels have been added at the interior east wall (use unknown).



Riding Ring

The riding ring, a contributing feature of the Pony Ride Site, is a horseshoe-shaped area located immediately to the south of the pergola. It was originally developed in 1947. It features four concentric riding tracks, including two narrow tracks at the inner rings for walking and trotting and two wider tracks at the outer rings, one for running and one for horse-drawn carriages (known as the buggy ride track). The rings are defined by wood-framed guide rails and fences.

The walking and trotting tracks have 14-inch-high guide rails consisting of 4x4 wood posts spaced approximately 8 feet on center and 2x4 top rails. The running track has a 2-foot-tall fence consisting of 4x4 wood posts spaced approximately 8 feet on center, and 2x4 wood rails at top and bottom. The buggy track has a 3-foot-tall fence consisting of 4x4 wood posts spaced approximately 8 feet on center, and 2x4 top, middle, and bottom rails. This fence also features wood buggy wheels embedded in the soil adjacent to the fence. The outer limits of the buggy track and riding ring area are defined by chain-link fencing; in some cases, a short portion of chain-link has been added above the buggy track fence. All of the wood posts appear to be embedded directly in the ground rather than set in concrete (further investigation needed to determine). Rails are typically connected to posts with two to three common nails. Based on original drawings and photographs, the existing guide rails and fences are replacements. The original design for the running and buggy ride track fences included 4x4 redwood posts, spaced 6 feet apart, with 2x4 top and bottom rails. The fences were 3'-10" high, and the railings alternated in a stacked fashion (see detail below). The inner guide rails appear to be similar to the historic photographs, just replaced in kind.

The riding ring tracks, guide rails, and fences are in fair condition overall. The ground is relatively flat throughout, but deeper ruts have developed within the tracks, particularly at the buggy ride track. One area at the south end is very deep (see photo below). Wood guide rails and fences are intact, but with localized areas of damage or wear, including peeling paint and paint loss; splits and losses to wood railings at nailed post connections; and heavily warped or sagging boards. Wood posts are set in the ground and prone to wood decay (rot) from moisture and termite damage.

The area in the center of the riding tracks is landscaped with mature trees and hedges and delineated by curving precast concrete curbs. The curbs are generally intact, but are covered with soil and debris. A few units have also shifted in the ground. At the north end of the riding ring is a 20-foot-tall metal light pole with overhead lighting. The pole is set in concrete and appears to be in good condition. Constructed around the light pole is a small wood-framed employee stand, which was added sometime after 1991. The stand has wood corner posts set in cement and is clad on three sides with wood vertical siding. The interior contains two shelves and a rack possibly used for holding drinks. It is in fair condition overall. Wood corner posts are damaged from termites and chew marks. The base of the siding is covered with soil and prone to wood decay/rot. Painted surfaces are soiled and weathered. At the north end of the riding ring, there is a pair of metal gates and an in-ground concrete vault (use unknown). The gates are in fair condition. Metal surfaces have light corrosion throughout. The vault is enclosed with a wood-framed cover which is deteriorated and partially collapsed.


At the northeast corner of the riding ring, there is an additional shade structure with a watering trough (date of construction unknown). It consists of galvanized metal pipe columns and cantilevered shade structure with canvas awning. The troughs are wood framed and lined with stainless steel inserts, and the troughs are supported on pipe columns. The structure is in fair condition. The pipe framing has localized areas of corrosion. The canvas awning is deteriorated and torn in many places and held to the framing with zip ties strung together.

Non-Contributing Resources

Pony Sweep

To the east of the pergola and riding ring, there is a circular structure known as a "pony sweep". Based on aerial photographs, it appears to have been added to the site sometime between 1989 and 2003 and does not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. The structure shelters a metal carousel (or sweep) from which tethered ponies walk in a circular pattern. The structure is composed of galvanized metal pipe framing and is enclosed on all sides by chain-link fencing. There is a single gate at the north side to enter/exit, and an array of metal pipe stanchions for crowd control (similar to stanchions at the pergola). The sweep framing forms a conical roof overhead with lighting, and the structure is covered with canvas mesh and a decorative valance awning at the top edge. The floor of the sweep is raised slightly and covered with a ring of rubber athletic flooring for the ponies, and gravel in the center. At the center is also a metal carousel with arm extensions that can tether up to nine ponies.

The pony sweep is currently in fair condition overall. The metal pipe-framed structure and fencing are intact,

but with localized areas of corrosion. The mesh covering at the roof is soiled and covered with heavy amounts of leaves and debris. The valance awning is heavily faded from UV-light and torn and frayed in some locations. The rubber flooring ring is soiled and deteriorated and has dips and ruts where water can collect. The carousel is operable and intact, but with some localized areas of corrosion. The metal stanchions are set in cement. Pipe surfaces are worn with paint loss throughout, and some decorative end caps are missing. Also, near the pony sweep entrance, there is an underground concrete drainage structure with a unique trapezoidal shaped opening and debris filter. The concrete slab surrounding the opening is heavily cracked, and there is soiling and debris throughout.

Snack Stand and Restroom Building

The snack stand and restroom building was constructed in 1960 at the north end of the site and does not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. It is a one-story building with a U-shaped footprint, including a commercial kitchen at the north end, and public restrooms at the south end. The building is constructed of concrete masonry units (CMU), with a corrugated metal roof deck and built-up asphalt roofing. The roof is generally flat and contains rooftop HVAC units, kitchen exhaust hoods and other penetrations. ARG did not access the roof or kitchen at the time of the survey. The west façade is infilled with vertical wood siding and large openings with roll-up shutters for order and food pickup. Other doors around the building are typically hollow metal doors and frames, some with louvered vents. The east side of the building has an enclosed storage yard and a large opening with a pair of glazed doors and an infill panel. The restrooms are serviceable, and include concrete floors, painted plaster walls, exposed steel decking and beams at the ceiling, laminate restroom partitions, and industrial-type stainless steel fixtures.

The building appears to be in fair, serviceable condition. Based on available access, ARG noted typical damage from age and use, including localized areas of paint loss and corrosion, gouges and graffiti at CMU walls, scratches and graffiti at doors and restrooms, and soiling and stains. At the north façade, there is a large hole in the CMU block. The openings in the rear yard are heavily soiled and weathered. Glazed lights on the doors have been infilled with plywood. A temporary sign reading "Griffith Café" has been placed over the illuminated "Snack Bar" sign; the temporary sign is hanging loose.

Barn

The barn was constructed between 1964-65 and does not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. It is located at the south end of the facility, on the east side of the miniature train tracks. The barn is a large steel-framed building, with a corrugated metal gable roof, and a combination of CMU walls at the base of the building and corrugated metal siding above. Roof drainage is by surface flow to sheet metal gutters and downspouts along the east and west sides. The CMU walls have vented units (breeze blocks) spaced throughout, and the metal siding has openings where clear and green corrugated polycarbonate panels are used as infill to allow for natural light. At the north and south ends, there are pedestrian access doors, inserted within large overhead doors that can be opened for additional light and ventilation. The interior contains partial height CMU partitions which form stalls along the east and west sides. At the northeast corner, there is an employee break area containing lockers and a picnic table. At the northwest corner, there is an enclosed tack room with a wood stair to a small storage loft above. The south end of the barn remains open as a small riding space or turn-out area, with chain-link gates dividing it from the stalls. Interior floors at the ground level are compacted soil. The steel framing, CMU, and corrugated siding and roofing are exposed at the interior. Some finishes are provided in the tack room area, including painted plaster walls, concrete floor at the tack room, and plywood floor at the loft above. The tack room has wood-framed saddle racks along the walls.

The barn remains in fair, serviceable condition. The steel framing appears sound and in good structural condition. Exterior walls and cladding remain intact; although some localized damage was noted including bent and gouged corrugated siding sheets, gouges in CMU walls, and areas of corrosion. A large area of corrosion was noted at the edges of corrugated roofing sheets along the west wall of the loft. Similar corrosion can be expected in other areas along the east and west sides. The roof panels could not be seen from the exterior (no access), so their condition is unknown at this time; however, daylight and pinholes were noted at the interior, particularly near the eaves. The polycarbonate panels remain intact, but their surfaces are heavily soiled. Overhead doors and man doors are operable and in serviceable condition; corrosion was noted throughout, and particularly at the base of doors. The compacted earth flooring has large depressions and stains throughout, and typically at locations where ponies may have been tethered. Urea stains and efflorescence (salt deposits) were noted at the floor and CMU walls. The tack room and loft are heavily soiled with stains and debris. Rodent droppings and insects were also noted at the loft.

Corrals

The corrals, which do not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site, are located to the east and south of the barn. Developed between 1964-65, the area is generally open with some shade trees along the perimeter. It has been divided into several spaces with chain-link fencing and gates. Each corral space has one or more shade structures, consisting of galvanized metal pipe framing and corrugated sheet metal roofs. The fencing and shade structures are in fair condition and show signs of heavy use.

Small-Scale Features

There are various other small-scale features found throughout the site. Existing conditions are as follows:

Birthday Pavilions

The site contains two large, fenced areas for birthdays and other events. These pavilions do not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. The first, titled "Oak Grove", was constructed south of the riding ring in 2016. It features a train theme, with painted train car signage panels. The second event space, titled "Coyote Meadow", was constructed in 2018 -19 to the west of the riding ring, and features a large signage wall painted to simulate a western town. Each space is enclosed with wood fencing decorated with wagon wheels, and there is a temporary pavilion structure with picnic table seating. Both spaces remain in good condition.

Freestanding Shade Structure

Near the entrance to the site, northwest of the ticket booth, is a freestanding shade structure complete with built-in water trough (build date unknown). The structure does not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. It is supported by galvanized metal pipe framing, and features a wood trough with stainless steel insert, a pipe rail for tethering ponies, and a retractable shade awning to each side. The structure is in fair condition overall. ARG did not detract the awnings to see if they remain operable. The wood trough has paint loss. Other finishes are soiled, and there is debris in the trough.

Masonry Planters

There are two larger circular-shaped planters around a jacaranda and historic coast live oak tree at the site, one located to the north of the ticket booth (holding the coast live oak), and one between the snack stand and the pony sweep (holding the jacaranda). The planters do not contribute to the significance of the Pony Ride Site. They are both constructed with stone rubble masonry walls and have brick paver copings. The planters are full to the coping height at the interior with compacted soil and tree roots. The planter near the ticket booth is in good condition, with just eroded stone mortar joints and some graffiti observed. The planter

near the pony sweep is in fair condition and appears to be under stress from the tree roots and/or outward pressure of the soil. The planter walls are cracked and separated in two locations, with large gaps in the stone masonry and two missing brick paver units.

Part II: Treatment and Work Recommendations

Historic Preservation Objectives

Selection of a Treatment Approach

The Griffith Park Pony Ride Site is a contributor to Griffith Park, which was listed as a Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument (HCM) in 2009. Constructed in 1947, the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site contributes to the significance of Griffith Park for its association with the new and expanded recreational amenities developed in the park in the immediate post-World War II period, under the direction of Superintendent Hjelte.

Because the Pony Ride Site contributes to the historic significance of Griffith Park, a designated HCM, the City of Los Angeles requires that any future repair, maintenance, or rehabilitation of the site shall be guided by *The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties* ("the Standards"). The Standards provide general guidance for stewards of historic properties to determine appropriate treatments. They are intentionally broad in scope so that they can be applied to a wide range of circumstances and are designed to enhance the understanding of basic preservation principles. The Standards identify four defined levels of treatment for a property. Each level of treatment is accompanied by its own set of standards that serve to guide the approach to work.

Generally, in planning for anticipated work on a historic property, one of the four treatment levels is selected as the overall approach to treatment.

The four treatment approaches are as follows:

Preservation is the act or process of applying measures necessary to sustain the existing form, integrity, and materials of a historic property.

Rehabilitation is the act or process of making possible a compatible use for a property through repair, alterations, and additions while preserving those portions or features which convey its historical, cultural, or architectural values.

Restoration is the act or process of accurately depicting the form, features, and character of a property as it appeared at a particular period of time by means of the removal of features from other periods in its history and reconstruction of missing features from the restoration period.

Reconstruction is the act or process of depicting, by means of new construction, the form, features, and detailing of a non-surviving site, landscape, building, structure, or object for the purposes of replicating its appearance at a specific period of time and in its historic location.

Based on ARG's understanding of the Pony Ride Site's significance, its existing conditions, and its potential for future use, ARG recommends the **Rehabilitation** approach to treatment. The Standards for Rehabilitation recognize that change is often necessary for the adaptive reuse or continued use of a property and thus allow

for compatible, contemporary interventions through alterations, additions, and change in use, so long as the historic character⁷⁵ of the property is preserved.

To comply with the Standards for Rehabilitation, all interventions to the Pony Ride Site should be designed and constructed with a minimal loss of historic material. Additionally, they should be designed with an eye toward restoring altered or missing features from the site's 1947-1956 period of significance.

The Standards for Rehabilitation apply to all buildings, structures, and features within the Pony Ride Site, including non-contributing features, to the extent necessary to ensure their removal/replacement or alteration does not impact the historic character of the site.

Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation

Following are the Standards for Rehabilitation. These standards guide all treatment recommendations made herein and should inform all future work on the Pony Ride.

- 1. A property will be used as it was historically or be given a new use that requires minimal change to its distinctive materials, features, spaces, and spatial relationships.
- 2. The historic character of a property will be retained and preserved. The removal of distinctive materials or alteration of features, spaces, and spatial relationships that characterize a property will be avoided.
- 3. Each property will be recognized as a physical record of its time, place, and use. Changes that create a false sense of historical development, such as adding conjectural features or elements from other historic properties, will not be undertaken.
- 4. Changes to a property that have acquired historic significance in their own right will be retained and preserved.
- 5. Distinctive materials, features, finishes, and construction techniques or examples of craftsmanship that characterize a property will be preserved.
- 6. Deteriorated historic features will be repaired rather than replaced. Where the severity of deterioration requires replacement of a distinctive feature, the new feature will match the old in design, color, texture, and, where possible, materials. Replacement of missing features will be substantiated by documentary and physical evidence.
- 7. Chemical or physical treatments, if appropriate, will be undertaken using the gentlest means possible. Treatments that cause damage to historic materials will not be used.
- 8. Archeological resources will be protected and preserved in place. If such resources must be disturbed, mitigation measures will be undertaken.

⁷⁵ Historic character refers to all those visual aspects and physical features that comprise the appearance of a historic property.

- 9. New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work shall be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment.
- 10. New additions and adjacent or related new construction will be undertaken in such a manner that, if removed in the future, the essential form and integrity of the historic property and its environment would be unimpaired.

Treatment Recommendations

Introduction

ARG understands that there are no specific plans for reuse of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Site at this time, and that the Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) seeks to understand historical conditions when considering feasibility for reuse of the property that should be called out in any future Requests for Proposals.

ARG has provided the following treatment recommendations related to the site's rehabilitation, repair, and maintenance. The items detailed below are primarily to address material distress or damage in order to prolong the life of the materials and to prevent further damage or more costly interventions in the future. Other recommendations are associated with returning some historic character-defining features to the property or renovating spaces or features for contemporary use. All of the below recommendations are in keeping with the Standards for Rehabilitation. Any future plans involving reuse of the Pony Ride should undergo further review by a qualified historic architect meeting the *Secretary of Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards*, to ensure consistency with the Standards for Rehabilitation.⁷⁶

Similar to the Existing Conditions Assessment section, Treatment Recommendations have been grouped into general recommendations as well as by structure or feature. These include the contributing features (Pergola, Ticket Booth, and Riding Ring), and non-contributing features (Pony Sweep, Barn, Corrals, Snack Bar and Restroom Building, and other small-scale features). Recommendations regarding the treatment of vegetation are included under the general rehabilitation and maintenance recommendations. Structural recommendations have also been summarized in this section; see Appendix A for the complete structural report. In general, recommendations are listed in order of priority (high to low).

General Recommendations

- New construction within the Pony Ride Site should be reviewed by a qualified historic architect to ensure consistency with the Standards.
- Consider a comprehensive code analysis to review for conformance with applicable codes related to egress, fire protection, occupant loads, etc. when a new use for the Pony Ride facility is determined.
- Consider conducting an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility study when a new use for the Pony Ride facility is determined.
- The following maintenance items should occur annually:
 - o Clean and maintain existing roofs and drainage systems. Remove leaves and debris from roof surfaces, gutters, and downspouts. Inspect roofs at minimum annually, and following large rainstorms, high winds, or seismic events.
 - o Clean and remove debris from floor drains, area drains, in-ground structures or vaults, and troughs.
 - o Clean exterior building surfaces and remove graffiti if necessary; sweep out interior spaces and monitor for leaks or other damage.
 - o Maintain protective paint coatings at character-defining features and/or vulnerable historic materials or locations.
 - o Maintain existing building systems where they exist; shut-off exterior water spigots, piping, etc. if no longer needed. Clean and lubricate hinges, rolling doors/shutters, carousel, and other moving parts.

Recommendations: Contributing Resources

Contributing elements of the Pony Ride Site should be retained to the extent feasible and should undergo repair and maintenance (see above), as needed, in consideration of the specific recommendations provided below. Any future work proposed on contributing resources should be reviewed by a qualified historic architect to ensure conformance with the Standards.

Historic Vegetation

An evaluation of the health and condition of historic trees was not within the scope of this HSR. ARG
recommends that an arborist conduct a comprehensive evaluation regarding the condition of trees
throughout the Pony Ride Site, particularly the coast live oak and coast redwood trees, which were
present on the site during the period of significance (1947-1956) and thus contribute to its
significance.

 When determining new plantings for the site, consider reinstating species (sycamore, elderberry, maple) that were identified in the 1956 "Griffith Park Pony Ride Area" site plan (see Appendix C: Historic Drawings).

Pergola

- Remove existing pipe brace at southwest corner, and perform repairs per structural report. Replace existing 2x8 members at each corner with new larger rafters. Provide temporary shoring until repairs can be made.
- Provide additional wood blocking between roof rafters per structural report; paint to match existing.
- Repair cracks at concrete column footings.
- Replace T-shaped steel plate connection between column and beam (1 location). Strengthen any other connections with new fasteners/hardware as required.
- During next roof replacement (approx. 10 years away), inspect sheathing boards thoroughly, and replace damaged boards as needed.
- Optional tasks:
 - o Consider removing cable stand at roof and roofing over penetrations; electrical power could be re-routed underground.
 - o Consider removing non-original shade structure at south side of building; this awning can be damaging to the historic roof and column framing during high wind events.
 - o Non-original metal stanchions and directional markings may be removed if desired.
 - o Wood benches and wood picket fence may be reinstated, per original drawings and historic photographs.
 - o If desired, a historic finishes analysis may be conducted to determine original paint colors for future repainting work.

Ticket Booth

- Repair damaged asphalt shingles and re-seal around light pole penetration at north side of roof.
- Replace heavily decayed (rotted) wood rafter tails (end splice).
- Infill opening at east façade (old A/C unit opening) with new wood studs sistered to existing studs, and new vertical siding; paint to match.
- Remove existing plywood wainscot covering, and thoroughly inspect and document condition of horizontal siding concealed below; repair or replace siding boards and deteriorated wood stud framing as required.

- Repair existing wood sill above wainscot; infill notches, gouges, splits, and other damage with wood-compatible epoxy and repaint.
- Repair deterioration at base of porch columns with wood-compatible epoxy and repaint. Consider
 installing column base plate or other connection to raise wood above grade and prolong life of wood
 columns.
- Replace heavily deteriorated wood door and frame at north façade; new door should be of similar style using barn-door style trim and decorative surface-mounted hinges. Provide new hardware, including hinges, entry/lock set, and dead bolt.
- Repair existing ticket window at south façade; remove non-original hardware, repair gouges, splits and losses in wood shutters with wood-compatible epoxy fill, and repaint. Provide new hardware to lock opening securely, such as cane bolts top and bottom mounted at the interior.
- Clean interior to remove remaining abandoned items, trash, and debris.
- Repair damaged areas of existing interior wallboard (sheetrock) as rodent-proofing measure.
- During next roof replacement (approx. 10 years away), inspect sheathing boards thoroughly and replace damaged boards as needed.
- Depending on future use, rehabilitate interior finishes and furnishings.
- Optional tasks:
 - o If desired, a historic finishes analysis may be conducted to determine original paint colors for future repainting work.

Riding Ring

- Re-grade and/or fill areas with large ruts or depressions to prevent standing water and improve site drainage.
- Secure underground concrete vault at north end of riding ring; vault may be backfilled if no longer used, or replace existing deteriorated wood cover with new locking vault door.
- Replace heavily decayed/rotted or termite-damaged wood posts with new to match (approx. 10% of total). Consider replacing with naturally rot- and insect-resistant wood species or preservativetreated lumber.
- Replace warped/sagging or otherwise deteriorated wood railings (approx. 10% of total).
- Replace corroded nails/fasteners at railings, and re-fasten where loose.
- Repaint guiderails and fences.
- Optional tasks:
 - o Non-original shade structure and trough at northeast corner may be removed if desired.

- o Non-original employee stand at light pole may be removed if desired.
- o Running and buggy ride track fencing may be replaced and reconfigured to match original fencing, per original drawings and historic photographs.
- o Track fencing may be replaced with taller fencing to accommodate a new use so long as the multi-track configuration and horseshoe shape is maintained.

Recommendations: Non-Contributing Resources

Non-contributing elements can be treated with greater flexibility in terms of alteration or removal within the Pony Ride Site. However, major changes, such as the addition of square footage, should be reviewed by a qualified historic architect to ensure compliance with the Standards as related to potential impacts to the historic character of the Pony Ride Site. Should the RAP choose to retain any of the following non-contributing resources, optional repair and maintenance recommendations have been provided to prolong their useful life

Non-Historic Vegetation

• Non-historic tree species (those added after the Pony Ride Site's period of significance), including gold medallion, carrotwood, palm, and jacaranda, may be removed from the site, if desired.

Pony Sweep

- Remove heavy amounts of collected leaves and debris at roof covering, and trim overhanging trees.
- Provide lock at gate to prevent unauthorized entry and playing on carousel.
- Alternatively, because the structure is not historic and does not contribute to the historic significance of the Pony Ride Site, the pony sweep may be removed if no longer needed for future use.

Snack Stand and Restroom Building

- Repair large hole at north elevation CMU wall (rodent-proofing).
- Reattach sign in more permanent manner to prevent falling.
- Alternatively, because the building is not historic and does not contribute to the historic significance of the Pony Ride Site, the snack stand may be removed if no longer needed for future use.

Barn

- Clean existing corrugated metal roof and inspect for damage. Replace corroded sheets at eaves; seal over exposed fasteners; and seal all pinholes, gouges or penetrations.
- If desired for new use, remove urea stains/smells and salt deposits by excavating the earthen floor to a certain depth, and backfilling and compacting new soil.

- Undertake rodent-proofing measures, such as closing up holes in walls or ground around building, provided baited traps, etc.
- Alternatively, because the building is not historic and does not contribute to the historic significance of the Pony Ride Site, the barn may be removed if no longer needed for future use.

Corrals

 Because the corrals are not historic and do not contribute to the historic significance of the Pony Ride, they may be removed if no longer needed for future use.

Small-Scale Features

- Repoint stone masonry walls at planters, including cracks and separations. Replace missing brick paver units. Monitor for further stress or damage related to tree roots and reassess.
- Alternatively, as the planters are not historic/contributing to the significance of the Pony Ride, they may be removed if not needed for future use.
- The freestanding shade structure and birthday pavilions are not historic and may be removed if desired.

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INTRODUCTION

The Griffith Park Pony Ride facility is a historic, 2.32-acre area of Griffith Park on Crystal Springs Drive in Los Angeles, California. Included in this facility is:

- An 8,000 square foot barn,
- Six outdoor corrals of various sizes,
- A fenced-in horseshoe shaped track with three separated lanes (known as the Riding Rings),
- A small pony ride sweep under a covered canopy,
- Two fenced birthday party and gathering areas,
- A 1,500 square foot solid wood canopy for queuing pony riders (known as the Pergola),
- A 225 square foot wood Ticket Booth,
- A snack bar.




Figure 1 Site Plan of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Facilities (North Oriented Right)

Figure 1 shown below depicts the location and components of the facility as outlined above.

Silman has been retained to perform a structural assessment of the Pergola, the Ticket Booth, and the horseshoe shaped track as part of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Historic Structures Report (HSR).

As part of the structural assessment, existing and new documentation was reviewed, and an onsite investigation was performed. On July 26th, 2023, Nathan Hicks and Amber Sutherland went to the site to better understand the facility structures, and their conditions. Based on the provided documentation and observations made, Silman has identified conditions requiring repair, and recommendations to best protect and preserve each structure.

An outline of Silman's specific services, and the purpose of the report herein, is provided below:

- Review of available documentation,
- Structural condition survey,
- Limited structural analysis for primary components, where existing structural information is available,
- Structural recommendations consistent with the building's historic character for repairs,
- Identification of structural limitations and opportunities for future planned expansions and/or modernizations.

Building History

Limited documentation pertaining to the structural history of the Griffith Park Pony Ride Facility exists. The Pergola and Riding Rings were completed in 1947, the year the Pony Ride began operations. The Ticket Booth was added by 1952. The only noticeable structural change made since construction is the addition of steel tubes at the cantilevering roof of the Pergola (see **Figure 2**). It is unknown when this change was made. All other structural changes are unknown. Note that while this section focuses on the facility's structural history, a general history can be found in the overall HSR.

Investigation

The investigation herein is based on site observations, combined with a review of past photos and drawings made available to the design team. While on site, observations were made at both the interior and exterior of the structures. In general, the Pergola and Riding Rings were readily visible, and access was possible for almost all building areas. At the Ticket Booth, Silman could only observe some of the existing structure where finishes were not present.

Note that existing structural drawings were only provided for the Pergola. Based on what was observed on site, the Pergola framing is well documented, and aligns with the provided drawing noted below. All foundations were not accessible for review.

The following pertinent structural documentation was made available to the structural team at the time of the investigation:

- 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing: includes a single sheet PDF with a plan view of the pony ride, and structural plans, elevations, and details of the Pergola.
- 1977 Site Plan Griffith Park Pony Ride drawing by the City of Los Angeles, Department of Recreation and Parks: a single sheet PDF containing a plan view of the Griffith Park Pony Ride facilities.
- 1993 Griffith Park Pony Ride Site Plan by the Department of Recreation & Parks: a single sheet PDF outlining the key features of the Pony Park facility.
- 2008 Historic-Cultural Monument Application by Griffith J. Griffith Charitable Trust: a 350 page report including structural descriptions of the Ticket Booth, Pergola and Riding Rings.
- 2023 Griffith Park Pony Ride Assessment and Community Feedback Scope of Work: includes a description and brief history of the Pony Ride facilities and grounds.




Figure 5 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola.




Figure 6 1977 Site Plan – Griffith Park Pony Ride drawing by the City of Los Angeles, Department of Recreation and Parks.

STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION

Pergola

The Pergola is a single-story, open canopy composed of wood columns and roof framing. As shown in **Figure 7**, this structure is rectangular in shape with large roof overhangs at the perimeter.

Foundation




Figure 8 Plan view illustrating the locations of the Pergola column foundations (1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola).

Although the foundation was not accessible during Silman's site visit, based on the 1946 Department of Parks City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola, each column is embedded into a 1'-3" x 1'-3" x 1'-10" concrete column, that frames into a 2'-0" x 2'-0" x 0'-8" concrete pad footing (See **Figure 8** to **Figure 10**). It is unknown whether the footings contain reinforcing steel.




Figure 9 Section through the Pergola showing the assumed foundation (1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola).

Columns




Figure 11 Plan view of the Pergola illustrating the column locations on the 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola.

Ten equally spaced columns support the Pergola roof and serve as the lateral force resisting system. The corner columns are 8x8 (nominal) wood posts, while the interior columns are 6x6 (nominal) wood posts. See **Figure 11** for the location and size of each column.

Roof Framing




Figure 12 Plan view of the Pergola roof framing illustrated on the 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola.




Figure 13 Section through the Pergola showing the roof framing from the 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola.

The roof framing consists of north-south spanning 2x8 (nominal) rafters at 24 inches-on-center and 2x6 (nominal) collar ties at 48 inches-on-center (see **Figure 12**). Each rafter cantilevers 6′-0″ beyond the columns as shown in **Figure 13**. The rafters support 1x6 (nominal) straight sheathing and asphalt shingles. Supporting the rafters are (2) 2.75″x8″ wood beams spanning between the columns.




Figure 15 View of the Pergola roof collar ties, rafters, and beams.

Troughs & Posts

At the south side of the canopy are troughs spanning approximately 8'-6" between the columns, three feet above the ground. The troughs are composed of (2) 2x6 (nominal) beams and interior metal liner (see **Figure 16**).

Adjacent to the troughs are 1/8" thick, 3.5" diameter steel posts at 8'-6" on center as shown in **Figure 17**.

Ticket Booth




Figure 18 View of the Ticket Booth.

The Ticket Booth is a single-story structure composed of wood bearing walls and wood roof framing. As shown in **Figure 18**, this structure is rectangular in shape with a roof overhang at the south elevation. Note that no drawings exist documenting the framing of the Ticket Booth. All structural descriptions are therefore based on observation of framing not covered by finishes.

Foundation

Due to inaccessibility, Silman could not observe the foundation for determination of material and constructed dimensions.

Exterior Walls & Columns

Four load bearing walls frame the Ticket Booth office and serve as the lateral force resisting system. Each wall appears to be 6 inches thick and composed of wood. The exterior faces of the walls have 1x8 (nominal) vertical siding on top. The bottom 40 inches of the walls are clad with horizontal wood siding, concealed beneath wood panels (see **Figure 19**). The panels were likely added at some point after the original construction.

At the south side of the Ticket Booth, four 4x4 (nominal) columns support the roof overhang (see **Figure 20**). Each column is approximately eight feet tall.




Figure 21 Plan view of the Ticket Booth columns and walls.

Roof Framing




Figure 22 Plan view of the Ticket Booth roof framing.




Figure 23 View of the Ticket Booth roof framing at the south roof overhang.

The roof framing is largely obscured by ceiling finishes at the interior of the Ticket Booth. Based on the roof framing visible at the south overhang, it appears the roof consists of 1.5"x4" wood rafters at 24 inches-on-center (see **Figure 22**). Each rafter cantilevers over a 4x6 (nominal) wood beam. The rafters are connected to the wood beam via a 1-inch-deep notch at the base (see **Figure 23**).

Riding Rings

The Riding Rings are composed of Internal Guide Rails, a Running Guide Rail, a Buggy Guide Rail, a light post and a trench. Note that no structural drawings exist documenting the Riding Rings. All structural descriptions are therefore based on observations. A key plan has been provided below to help orient the reader.




Figure 24 Site plan of the Riding Rings highlighting each element inspected.

Internal Guide Rails




Figure 25 View of the Internal Guide Rails.

The Internal Guide Rails consist of three horseshoe rings of wood posts and beams, spaced at approximately three feet-on-center (see **Figure 25**). Each ring is composed of wood posts and rails (see **Figure 26**). The 4x4 (nominal) wood posts are spaced at 8'-2" on-center and are about 14 inches tall. Spanning between the wood posts are 2x4 (nominal) rails. Two to three nails at each rail end connect the rail to the posts. Due to inaccessibility, Silman could not confirm if there is a foundation beneath the guide rails. Given the size and composition of the guide rail, it is likely the posts are simply embedded into the ground at an unknown depth.

Running Guide Rail

Located ten feet away from, and surrounding the Internal Guide Rails, is the Running Guide Rail (see **Figure 27**). The Running Guide Rail consists of wood posts and rails. The wood posts have a 4x4 (nominal) cross section and are 2'-0" tall. At the top and bottom of the wood posts are 2x4 (nominal) rails spanning 8'-0" between wood posts (see **Figure 28**). Two nails at each rail end connect the rails to the posts. Due to inaccessibility, Silman could not observe if there is a foundation beneath the Running Guide Rail. Given the size and composition of the guide rail, it is likely the posts are simply embedded into the ground at an unknown depth.

Buggy Ride Guide Rail

Located 10 feet away from and surrounding both the Internal Guide Rails and the Running Guide Rail, is the Buggy Ride Guide Rail (see **Figure 29**). The Buggy Ride Guide Rail consists of wood posts and rails (see **Figure 30**). The wood posts have a 4x4 (nominal) cross section and are about 3'-2" tall. The posts have three rails at the top, middle and bottom that span seven feet on center. The bottom and middle rails have a 2x4 (nominal) cross section. The top rail has a 2x6 (nominal) cross section. Two nails at the end of each rail attach the rail to the post. Due to inaccessibility, Silman could not observe if there is a foundation beneath the Running Guide Rail. Given the size and composition of the guide rail, it is likely the posts are simply embedded into the ground at an unknown depth.

Light Post

Located within the Internal Guide Rails is an approximately 20-foot-tall light post (see **Figure 31**). The light post is composed of a four-inch diameter steel pole. This pole looks to be embedded in a circle, concrete foundation (see **Figure 32**). The depth and reinforcing of the concrete foundation could not be observed and is therefore unknown.

Trench

Near the light post is a 28"x72" trench opening. The interior of the trench is composed of concrete. In between the concrete walls of the trench, wood boards slope downward (see **Figure 33**).

CONDITIONS ASSESSMENT

A conditions assessment of the Pergola, Ticket Booth and Riding Rings has been performed by Silman to characterize the structure and identify current conditions. During our visit, detailed photo documentation of the building was completed to understand the identified conditions.

Pergola

Overall, the Pergola appeared to be moderately deteriorated. While the columns, rafters and collar ties looked to be in good condition, the items below will need to either be replaced or repaired, as specified in the Recommendations portion of the report.

Straight Board Sheathing




Figure 34 View of straight board sheathing deterioration.

Deterioration of the straight sheathing spanning between the rafters was observed (see **Figure 34**). The wood is likely deteriorating due to exposure to temperature changes, water damage and insect damage.

Cantilevered Corners of Roof Framing

Each corner of the Pergola appears to be deflecting (see **Figure 35**). It appears the south-west corner was retrofitted with a steel pipe as highlighted in **Figure 2**. This does not meet the structural code requirements and will need to be removed.

Ticket Booth

Overall, the Ticket Booth appeared to be in good condition, apart from a few items noted in the following locations.

Horizontal and Vertical Wood Siding

Both the ends of the vertical wood siding, and most of the horizontal siding located beneath the wood panels, are deteriorated (see **Figure 36** & **Figure 37**). This is likely due to water and insect damage over time.

Rafters

A few of the exposed rafter ends at the north and south faces of the Ticket Booth have deteriorated due to insect and water damage (see **Figure 38**).

West Wall

At the West Wall, a 3'x2' opening looks to be improperly patched with a thin wood board (see **Figure 39**).

Base of Columns

At the base of the columns, some of the wood appears to be deteriorating due to biological growth and insect damage (see **Figure 40**).

Riding Rings

Overall, the Riding Rings appeared to be in good condition, apart from the few items noted in the following locations.

Posts & Rails

While most of the wood at all the posts and rails looked to be in good condition, approximately 15 percent is deteriorated. This was especially noticeable at the post and rail ends, where chunks of the wood have fallen off (see **Figure 41**). This deterioration is likely caused by water and insect damage.

Connections

Several connections between the Guide Rail posts and rails looked to be significantly deteriorated. At numerous locations, nails have fallen out and are missing (see **Figure 42**).

PROBES & TESTING

No probes or testing was performed as a part of this project scope. Silman recommends that wood material testing be performed at a future date to confirm the analysis outlined in the following section.

ANALYSIS

This section includes a preliminary analysis of the existing roof framing at the Pergola, in addition to outlining the governing codes, material property assumptions, and design load assumptions used within the analysis, and to characterize the other structures composing the Griffith Pony Ride Facility.

Applicable Codes & Standards

This project will be governed by the following code:

- 2023 City of Los Angeles Building Code
- 2022 California Historic Building Code

The following standards will be followed as specified by the governing codes:

- ASCE 7-16 Minimum Design Loads (and Associated Criteria) for Buildings and Other Structures
- NDS-2018 National Design Specification (NDS) for Wood Construction

Material Properties

The material properties below are based on conservative lower end values appropriate for the time of construction. These properties are appropriate for the framing at the Riding Ring, Ticket Booth, and Pergola. Material testing is recommended to refine both the material values, and the corresponding Pergola analysis results.

<u>Timber</u>

The existing timber is assumed to be Douglas Fir-Larch #1. Douglas Fir-Larch #1 has the following material properties:

•	Allowable Bending Stress	$F_b = 1,000 \text{ psi}$
•	Allowable Tensile Stress (Parallel to Grain)	$F_t = 675 \text{ psi}$
•	Allowable Shear Stress	$F_v = 180 \text{ psi}$
•	Allowable Compressive Stress (Parallel to Grain)	$F_c = 1,500 \text{ psi}$
•	Modulus of Elasticity	E = 1,700,000 psi

Design Loads

The loads presented below assume the Pergola and Ticket booth are Risk Category II, and the Riding Ring is Risk Category I (ASCE 7-16, Table 1.5-1).

Dead Loads

• Wood Roof Framing (Pergola & Ticket Booth) = 5 PSF

Live Loads

The following live load values are specified by the applicable codes and standards:

Analysis Results

Live Load Capacities




Figure 43 Analytical model of the Pergola showing which members are overstressed.

A preliminary live load capacity analysis was performed for the Pergola roof framing members using analytical modeling. The analysis results indicate only some members meet the current code requirement for dead load and live load (20psf capacity). The members that do not meet the code requirement for dead and live applied loads are shown in red in **Figure 43** below.




Figure 44 Close up of the analytical model showing the hip rafters are 83 percent overstressed.

As shown in **Figure 44** above, the hip rafters are approximately 83 percent overstressed. This aligns with what was observed on-site, where some of the hip rafters appeared to be deflecting. No evidence of overstress was observed at the beam supporting the roof rafters (marked as the 1.29 member in red in **Figure 44** above). It is therefore likely that the material strength assumptions made do not align with the actual properties of the wood material. Material testing is recommended to refine all analysis results.

Lateral Load Assessment

While the structure may have been designed for wind loads, a high-level review of the members indicates the framing may be able to handle seismic loads. A preliminary review of the connections indicates they are likely adequate. Further analysis is recommended to confirm.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The recommendations herein are based on site observations and subsequent structural analysis. As mentioned previously, field observations were limited to readily visible elements, since the site visit did not include removal of any finishes or destructive probes.

Overall, the Pergola structural repairs should be prioritized and occur as soon as possible. Repairs to the Ticket Booth are of intermediate priority and should be addressed in an approximate 3-year timeframe. Repairs to the Riding Ring are of the lowest priority and could be addressed in a 5-year timeframe. As part of future repairs wood species identification is recommended as it will help to refine material property assumptions and future repair specifications.

Pergola




Figure 45 Plan view of the Pergola roof highlighting which members should be replaced with larger framing (illustrated on top of the 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola).

As indicated by the analysis section of the report, the cantilevering hip rafters are failing. Silman recommends replacing the existing 2x8 (nominal) members with new, larger rafters (see **Figure 45** for locations). In the temporary condition it is recommend that shoring posts be installed below the four corners until repairs can be made.




Figure 46 Plan view of the Pergola roof framing showing the potential location of blocking (illustrated on the 1946 Department of Parks, City of Los Angeles drawing of the Pergola).

Given the large spans of the roof rafters, Silman also recommends adding blocking between each rafter to provide additional structural stability (as shown in **Figure 46** below).

In general, a portion of the straight wood sheathing appeared to be deteriorated. Silman recommends the wood be cleaned and repainted. During re-roofing all boards that are split, rotted and/or damaged should be replaced. Overlaying the straight board sheathing with plywood does not appear to be required but would help to improve the seismic performance. This would need to be balanced against the weight the plywood would add. Even this minimal increase could result in additional members stressed beyond their capacity for gravity loads.

While all not connections have been reviewed in this preliminary analysis it should be assumed that some will require strengthening with new fasteners/hardware.

Ticket Booth




Figure 47 Interior view of the opening in the west wall of the Ticket Booth.

At the west wall of the ticket booth, a 3'x2' opening has been improperly repaired (see **Figure 39** and **Figure 47**). Silman recommends closing this opening by adding in new studs to sister the existing studs and attaching new siding to match the existing siding.

At the exterior of the ticket booth, wood deterioration was observed at the rafter ends, base of the columns and on the original horizontal siding concealed beneath the wood panels. All wood minorly deteriorated should be cleaned and painted. All significantly deteriorated wood should be replaced in kind. To address the deterioration of the original horizontal siding (see **Figure 37**), Silman recommends removing the exterior wood panels to expose the wood beneath.

Riding Rings

Several areas of significant wood deterioration were observed at the railing. Silman recommends addressing the deterioration by replacing approximately 10 percent of the wood in kind. Additionally, all wood should be cleaned and painted, and all fasteners should be replaced. Where wood framing in contact with ground is replaced, it should utilize a naturally rot-resistant species or PT lumber.





CONTEXT SITE PLAN





TREE IDENTIFICATION SITE PLAN






FLOOR PLAN - PERGOLA




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - PERGOLA - NORTH




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - PERGOLA - EAST




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - PERGOLA - SOUTH




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - PERGOLA - WEST





FLOOR PLAN - TICKET BOOTH




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - TICKET BOOTH - NORTH




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - TICKET BOOTH - EAST




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - TICKET BOOTH - SOUTH




EXTERIOR ELEVATION - TICKET BOOTH - WEST


